PROMINENT RANCHER DIES FROM INJURIES

Meals Beaton, 61; Three-Creek Stockman, Succumbs Following Fall From Horse.

Meals Beaton, 61, a prominent ranchman, died at the Twin Falls county general hospital at 7:30 o'clock last night as a result of injuries received at his home last Sunday morning. Mr. Beaton, who had operated the Three-Creek for the past 25 years, fell from his horse last Sunday morning to a band of water. When he was started, he was found lying in a nearby field in an unconscious state. While the exact nature of the accident is not known it is believed that Mr. Beaton was either thrown from his horse, or that both the horse and rider fell, the horse kicking the victim in the head in its attempt to rise. It was found that Mr. Beaton was suffering from a fractured skull and contusion of the brain, and an operation performed at the hospital here this morning confirmed the diagnosis. The patient was in an unconscious state much of the time from the accident until his death last night. The deceased is survived by his wife, two daughters and a son. He was widely known throughout southern Idaho. The body was taken to the Twin Falls mortuary.

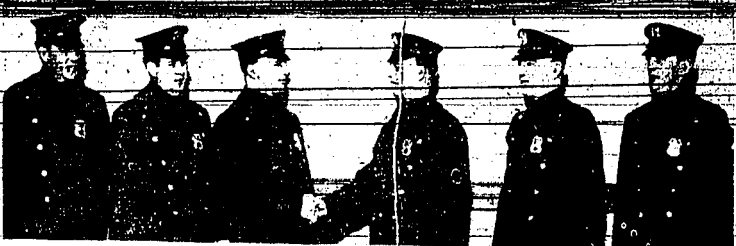

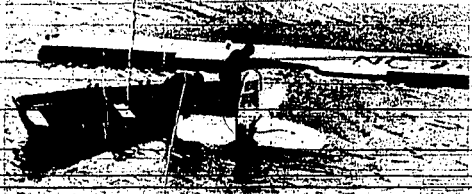
