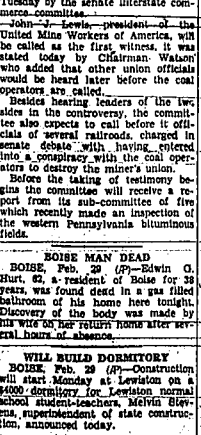

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PICTURE INDUSTRY OPPOSING MEASURE

Counsel for Producers and Distributors Appears Before

WASHINGTON, Feb. 29 (AP)—Deputy Director Brockhart's suggestion that Will Hays might use his political influence in connection with the motion picture industry, C. Pettibone, general counsel for the Motion Picture Producers and Distributors of America, Inc., today opposed before a Senate committee the "Brockhart" bill to control "black book" and consolidation by motion picture producers.

"Black book" is the system by which proponents of the Brockhart bill contend motion picture exhibitors are forced to accept "black book" films in order to get out "black book" exhibitors. Pettibone defended merely the wholesale selling of pictures.

No. Petition Appeal.

"Until the federal trade commission signed their decision on it, there was no opposition to the Brockhart bill," the motion picture industry, he said, adding that the real opposition to the system comes from exhibitors who are afraid there is a trade fight on against American made goods.

This change of threatened monopoly, he contended, is to say the least absurd. There is keen and intensive competition. The real trouble will be found to be the result of overproduction. There are too many pictures and too many theaters.

As for political manipulation, he added that Mr. Hays has never read the Brockhart bill and I have never discussed it with him.

Idaho Falls Holdups

Barnett made no denial of his activities here and returned with Deputy Prater without resistance. During extradition proceedings, Sheriff C. F. Childs of Bonneville county, and Chief Johnson of the Idaho Falls police force, accompanied by a pharmacist of that city who had been held up last week, met Prater and his man at Pocatello. At first the pharmacist was doubtful but finally identified Barnett as the man who robbed him. Their Barnett said, "Yes, I was the man who stole your money, but I'm not a thief. I was just a driver."

LATE SPRING WOULD IMPROVE BEET CROP

Walter Carter, Federal Entomologist, Reports on Results of Insect Pest Investigation

Large numbers of the insect can be found on the wild plants of any warm afternoon such as we have been experiencing. These insects are eating and feeding with normal weather conditions for the rest of the season. An enormous population of the fly can be expected on the beet crop and that, therefore, has shown that this is the case, serious results follow.

fly went into hibernation for the winter. The winter has not been severe enough to reduce these numbers sufficiently. Large numbers of the fly can be found at the present time and feeding on the wild plants. With normal weather conditions between now and the end of the season, very large and dangerous populations of the insects can be expected. An extremely late spring with heavy precipitation during the spring and early summer months might cause the fly to hibernate again.

Study Continued. The department of agriculture does not presume to advise whether to plant or not to plant beets. It is, however, commencing with next year's forecast, to give farmers all the information available by the end of February each year and it is in pursuance of that policy that this forecast is issued. Farmers who decide to plant, notwithstanding present indications, may feel free to call upon this office for further information which may become available between now and the time when they must decide whether or not to continue with the crop. All present indications, however, are distinctly unfavorable.

With usual weather, very late planting and heavy precipitation during the spring and early summer months might cause the fly to hibernate again. This has not happened before, but probably happened in 1921 and this possibility is the only thing we have to offer the decidedly unfavorable prospects for a good beet crop which we are faced with at the present time.

Undoubtedly, at least, some patches will make good yields, but might be expected to happen on the average beet-growing area between Rupert and Huhl including the North side tract, and this forecast is not applicable to any other beet-growing area. In this area all the indications at the present time are decidedly unfavorable. 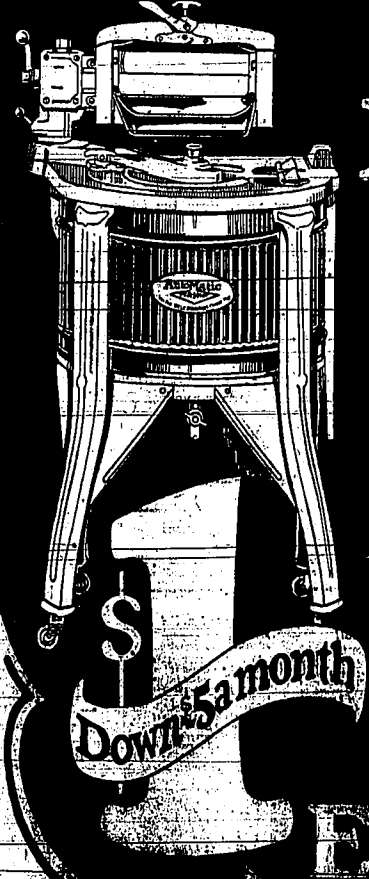

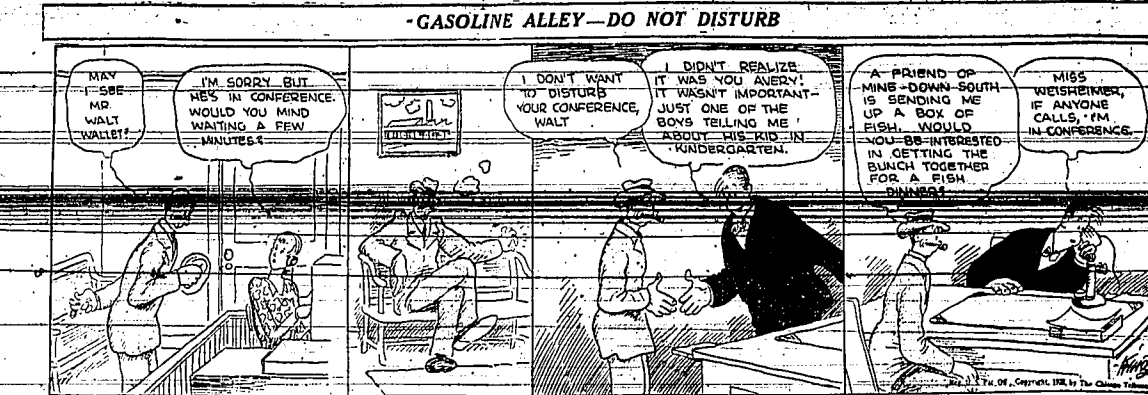

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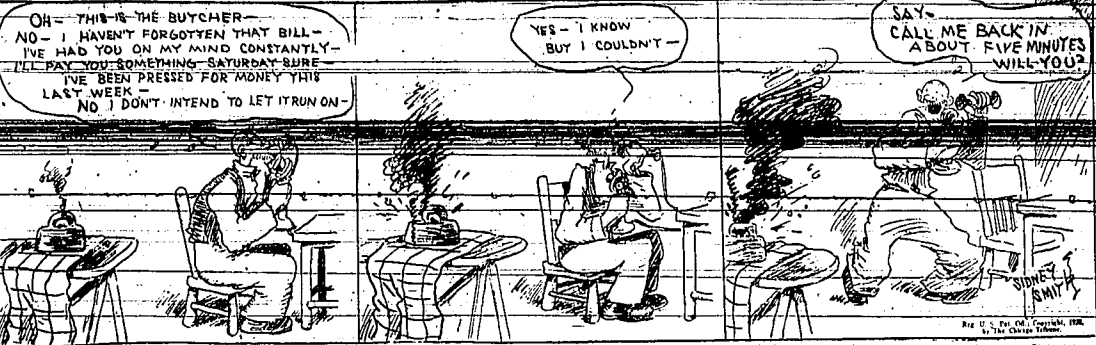

Bernhart Peterson, 65, Dies

Death Note Shows Suicide; Minnesota Relatives Wired.

With a bullet through the heart and a 20 caliber automatic pistol ripped in his left hand, Bernhart "Bip" Peterson, aged about 65 years, was found dead in his room at the Waverly hotel here at 7:30 o'clock last night by Henry Harris, owner of the hotel. Harris, proprietor of the hotel, Peterson, who was of Danish descent, left a note in which he stated that he died by his own hand, because he was losing his sight.

Peterson's body was found lying on the right side on a heavy fur coat in pool of blood, the forefinger of the left hand still crooked about the trigger of a 20-caliber Colt automatic pistol. A mirror lying near the body indicated that the man had drawn a bead on his left temple with the aid of the glass. The bullet entered the head at a point about two inches back of the left eye, passed entirely through the skull and out at the top center of the right side.

Death-Examiner's Report: County Coroner P. J. Grossman stated that the death was quite evidently suicide. This was indicated by the death note, the position of the body, and by the fact that he had left the revolver with which he shot himself lying on the dresser in his room for several days previous to the shooting. He was never known to keep a revolver about the room in this manner previously during the five years he has been a resident of the hotel. No inquest will be held unless other features develop.

The coroner stated last night. Apparently the suicide occurred shortly after noon yesterday. He was last seen alive when he ate lunch with two other residents of the hotel. He left the table early, as was his habit, and went to his room on the east side of the main corridor leading from the parlor and office to the dining room and kitchen at the rear. Shortly after Peterson left the dining room, Mrs. Harris, who was in the kitchen, smelled something very burning and went to investigate. She investigated several rooms along the hall, thinking that someone had left a burning cigarette in a table dresser. Mrs. Harris did not enter Peterson's room.

After the dinner hour last night the man with whom Peterson usually

played cards during the evening. He told him, Henry Harris, went to Peterson's room to see if he had fallen asleep or had left town to go to his ranch, two miles west and one-quarter mile south of South Park, as he sometimes did.

Upon the discovery of the suicide, County Coroner Grossman and Twin Falls police were summoned. An examination of the body indicated that death had come some hours earlier. Chief of Police E. Z. Leighton and Coroner Grossman agreed that the coroner's report on Harris' death would be made shortly after noon could have been powder smoke.

No one about the hotel heard the report of the shot. Investigators of the case stated that the bullet would not be likely to be heard above noises in the kitchen, particularly where both the door and window of Peterson's room were closed. Workmen were taking upstairs rooms and any noise they would probably be attracted to that source.

Leaves Final Note: A note was found in a tablet on the dresser near the body. In the note Peterson stated that death was dealt by his own hand. The note reads: "I am blind or nearly so. Death is all I got to say there is nobody to blame for this. I am tired of it all and am now going to Hell or home or what you want what I got in my room there is not". Peterson was granted a divorce from his wife, Emily Peterson, in district court here on September 8, 1922. The four minor children, Mildred, Doris, Gladys and Kenneth, were sent into the custody of the mother. The youngest is now about 10 years of age. It is believed that they are now residing in Clearwater, Minnesota. At the settlement after the divorce, the real property was left to the children with W. E. Ketchum, Twin Falls, as trustee.
