Announcement That Prosecutor of Teapot Dome Case Is to Oppose Smith and Reed Caps Week of Much Activity.

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, March 3 (AP)—Senator Thomas A. Watson, Kentucky, has entered the expanding field of Democratic candidates for the presidency with an announcement that he will oppose the political foe of Governor Smith, New York.

Like Smith, the senator is a Roman Catholic. Unlike the New York governor, he is committed to the "dry" cause.

Announcement that the widely known prosecutor of the sensational Teapot Dome investigation would be joined by Senator Smith, Missouri, and other Democratic presidential aspirants in California and some other states, capped a week of much activity in political camps of both parties.

SHOSHONE, March 3 (Special to The News).—The finals of the class A district basketball tournament being staged here will be played Monday night between Rupert and Twin Falls. Affairs took an unexpected turn this morning after Rupert had eliminated the Oakley entry, 36 to 28, and Twin Falls had defeated the Cascade team, forcing Rupert and Filer to play this afternoon to decide which team would advance into the final.
