REVIEW OF POTATO SITUATION FAVORS IDAHO CROP SALES

shipped from eastern producing sections, in addition to shortages in such states as New York and Pennsylvania where most of the crop moved by truck to nearby markets.

States from Michigan to Maine parents have one-fourth fewer potatoes than a year ago, according to the latest statistics and the North Central states one-eighth less. The net result from the national marketing standpoint would indicate that such surplus stocks as are on hand in the recent Idaho shipments throughout the eastern producing sections, it is likely that the remainder of the present crop will meet with a good demand.

Likely to Equal Shortages in East; State Moves 164 Cars a Day to Set New Record.

IDAHO PALMER: Market trading on the Idaho potato market was practically at a standstill during most of last week, following the activity of the previous week.

Shipping point prices sagged slightly below the recent high levels, but offerings were few and sales were accordingly slow. According to the weekly review issued by the Idaho potato growers' association, the Idaho potato department of agriculture at Idaho Falls, shipments continued to be very heavy and established new high record at the end of the week.

Movement from other sections of the country also increased. The Idaho potato growers' association reported that States potato shipments averaged more than a thousand cars a day, compared with 700 per day a week or more. These heavy shipments and increasing arrivals in the terminals, a weaker tendency toward several days of the week-end, with track holdings running unusually heavy for this season of the year.

Shipping point prices advanced and shipping point demand was brisk at the open of the present week. Such a quick recovery was rather unusual for the week-end and would seem to indicate a general confidence in the future of the market.
