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POLITICAL CAMPAIGN HOME-TAKING PARTS

Conventions for Selection of Delegates to Kansas City and Houston Held in Several States Recently in Mid-West.

By The Associated Press. WASHINGTON, March 10.—The political campaign, with the presidency at stake, is reaching the stage where the taking at home are beginning to be heard from.

Conventions for the selection of delegates to the Kansas City and Houston conventions already have been held in some states, chiefly in the territory just west of the Mississippi. Next week the first of the state-wide presidential primaries, which are voters a more direct method of indicating their choice, is to be held.

Primary elections and primaries will be held with increasing frequency, and will even the keener of political forces are being built up as to what will happen in June, they expect to have something more definite a month hence on which to base predictions.

In less than a dozen states, all of them in the West or South, definite indications have been handed down to the nominating conventions. Primaries will be held in New Hampshire and North Dakota before the end of March. Several are in the books for April—and a like number for May.

Republican party "chieftains" are awaiting with particular interest the primary results in Ohio, April 24, and in Indiana two weeks later. Hoover is looking for a "favor" in each state. Willis in Ohio, and Senator Watson, Indiana, and even the commerce secretary, friends concede that his chances at Kansas City will be enhanced to a large extent by the primaries there.

The Democrats who have been striving for party harmony have their eyes on the primary results in California, April 2, and in Florida, May 1. The state-wide election of a Smith-Roosevelt ticket is the one on the political stage of these three candidates.

THOUSANDS OF TONS OF EARTH AND ROCK DESCEND UPON CITY

Buildings in Path of Slide Crumple and Are Buried; 2,000 Men Engaged in Rescue; Early Morning Catastrophe.

By The Associated Press. SANTOS, Brazil, March 10.—Eighteen bodies had been taken late today from the debris of the avalanche which crashed down today near Serra at dawn today, burying, it is believed, 200 beneath it. Three others who were rescued today were still alive and were rushed to hospital.

Work was frantic tonight in an effort to recover others buried beneath the mass of earth and rocks, some of which, it is believed, may have slipped death. Mobility of the sliding earth was still striking tonight, however, hindered work.

Bodies Mutilated. The bodies which were recovered in the morning were covered in recent heavy rains which undermined the foundations of one side of the mountain, said officials. The cause of the disaster, the only warning of which was the precipitation of a huge boulder down the mountain side into the Santa Rosa hospital. A moment later the whole side of the mountain gave way, smashing first the hospital, where two patients had been buried, and then the town, burying 14 other houses, aid dancing numbers of others on the fringe of the village.

All business in the city was at a standstill today as shops closed and citizens joined in the rescue efforts.

LOS ANGELES, March 10 (AP)—William Edward Hickman was convicted of his second murder today. The jury also found him sane as did a former jury that convicted him of kidnaping and slaying Marilyn Parker, 12-year-old daughter of a Los Angeles banker. Hickman and his former pal, Wells Hunt, were found guilty in superior court of the slaying of C. Ivy Tom, 37, a Los Angeles druggist, on Christmas eve, 1926. The jury recommended life imprisonment for both.

Formal sentence will be imposed by Judge Elliott Craig on Tuesday, March 12. Under the California law Hunt cannot be sentenced to death as he is under 18 years when he committed the crime. Hickman is 22. Hickman already is under sentence of life imprisonment for the kidnaping of a woman in Los Angeles in 1925. The case was given to the jury yesterday afternoon.

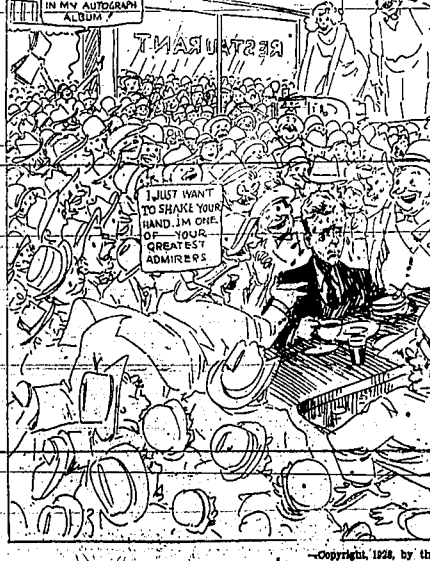

BUDGET COMMITTEE BLAZES TRAIL FOR REDUCING EXPENSE

Representatives of Five Organ-
izations Complete Scrutiny of
County Government

Under vigorous attack that was brought to a conclusion late last night, estimated expenditures of Twin Falls county offices for the fiscal year 1928, as taken from a front-line total of \$250,000 with a loss of approximately \$25,000 to occupy a new position within the limitations of the county's estimated \$195,000 current expense fund for 1928.

Members of a budget committee composed of representatives of the county organizations of the Republican and Democratic parties, Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce, Twin Falls county grange and Twin Falls Business and Professional Women's club, were the attacking forces before which estimated expenditures reviewed in the closing phases yesterday of a drive launched by the committee last Thursday.

In yesterday's battle, the budget committee blazed a trail for the guidance of the county commissioners who must this week actually make the final financial budget totals to fit income.

In a preliminary survey of the subject, the committee estimated that a reduction of \$25,000 in the total of estimated expenditures would be necessary.

On Casualty List
Listed among the casualties in yesterday's drive on the budget totals were the deputy prosecuting attorney, county sanitation inspector and two of the four deputies of the sheriff's office. These officers were sunk without a trace in the committee's recommendations, and for a time the county agent's department was subjected to inquiry with a possibility of abandonment in the offing. In the windup, however, the committee decided against offering any recommendation regarding the county agent's department's \$2000 budget appropriation.

The committee denied each and every proposed increase in salary for deputies in county offices, but did not recommend salary reduction as compared with last year's pay rolls.

It declared against county ownership of automobiles except two cars for the sheriff's office, one of which should be a "high-topped" car and the other a light car, and it declared for policy of paying eight instead of 10 cents a mile for use of privately owned automobiles for county business. It recommended that payment should be made for use of privately owned automobiles only when the claim should be accompanied by a detailed statement of the use to which the machine had been put.

Believe Hospital Fund
Not only were the county's estimated current expense fund expenditures beaten down by the huns yesterday, but it was announced last night, "the

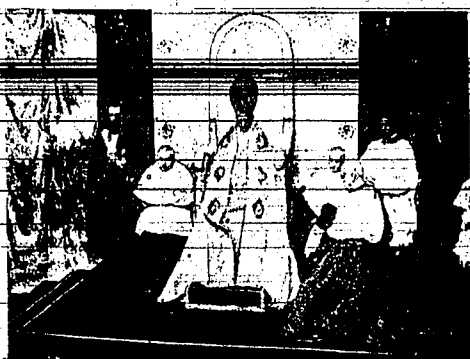

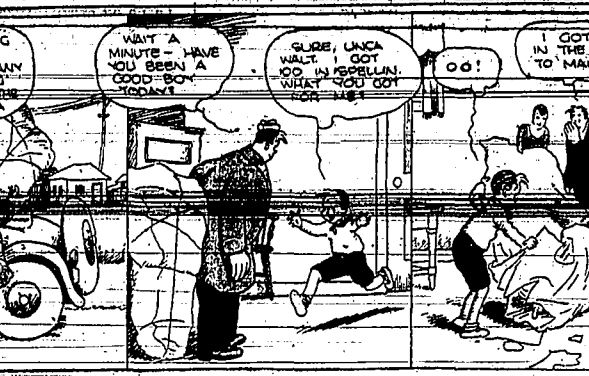
