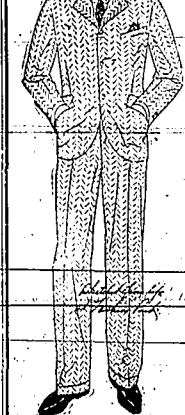

Dancer Is Not One of Flood.

Proper Is Not Damaged; Water Loss Reported Negligible.

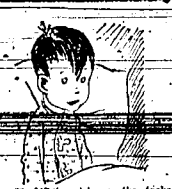
Leakage through the damaged central tower at Magic reservoir on Wood river has been reduced from 250 cubic feet to about 100 cubic feet of the present time following repair work yesterday by a diver team. San Francisco, stated Foster C. Walker, Twin Falls insurance man who for 10 years was the engineer in charge of the distribution of water at the reservoir, who returned last night from a two-day investigation of the situation at the dam. Engineers from several southern Idaho towns and sites attended have been at the dam since the repair of the damage.

Lee Causes Break Expansion of dam in the reservoir caused the central tower behind the dam to crack near the base and to swing backward toward the dam breaking the chains which regulate the gates. The diver was not one of flood, Mr. Walker stated, but of a shortage of water. The dam proper was not damaged and was not in danger of sliding away.

When the tower swung out of plumb, the chains controlling the gates parted and dropped to the bottom of the tower. Water poured through the break in the walls making the recovery of the chains and the opening of the gates impossible without the aid of a diver. Until the chains are recovered, it will be impossible to secure the amount of flow needed when the springing season opens.

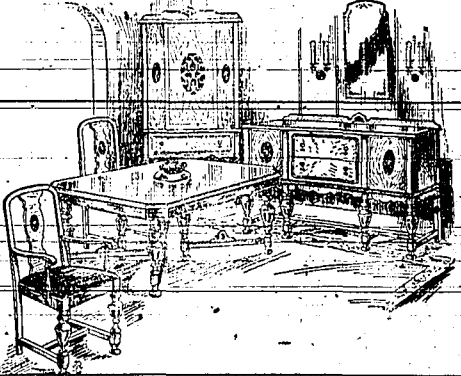

SMALL TURKEY FLOCK MAY LEAD EVENTUALLY TO ALL-YEAR MARKET

Experiments indicate Can Be Raised Successfully in Close Confinement; Still Room for More Improvement.

WASHINGTON, March 14.—Experiments which indicate turkeys can be raised successfully in close confinement have opened the possibility as yet a very remote one, government specialists say, that present market conditions favor the raising of turkeys in an inadequate supply and seasonal high prices.

It is economic to raise turkeys in the small turkey house, which is a little higher than chickens and other fowls raised in an inadequate supply and seasonal high prices. Dr. M. A. Jull, chief of poultry husbandry in the department of agriculture, explains that there is nothing about a turkey's nature or disposition which makes it necessary for him to wander about in the open air.

He has prevented that turkeys must have wide range, when in truth the entire thing they need is sanitation.

While it is reasonably safe to assume, Dr. Jull says, that strict sanitation will popularize the small turkey flock, views expressed at this time must be taken as representing no more than possibilities. There is some question whether the highest industry will be in the least profitable in the east. Since turkey raising was almost wholly abandoned because of blackhead, the east has developed intensive production of chicken eggs and has prospered to such an extent that it will be difficult to establish the turkey. Work incident to production in close quarters may be considered unprofitable, and the meat of coop-raised turkeys never as firm as that of range fowls, may not entirely suit the public fancy.

Dr. Jull makes those observations in discussing the possible attempt to raise turkeys as generally as chickens, a circumstance which he says is wholly contingent upon numerous economic influences. So far as individual enterprises are concerned, the new method of raising turkeys has been described as profitable and rapidly increasing.

Producers in Wisconsin and Minnesota have had marked success in raising turkeys in close confinement. Dr. Jull says, "and the practice is spreading to Wyoming and the Dakotas. For sanitary purposes the small pens are covered with loose gravel. As the turkeys grow older they may be moved to clean, grassy plots. If well fed, shaded and watered, they may give very little trouble in trying to escape. Flocks sometimes are kept under control by tying a light board over the back of the fence which develops a habit of fence-jumping, thereby handicapping the use of his wings and eventually discouraging his efforts.

High prices for turkeys at Christmas and Thanksgiving, together with the fact that frozen turkey meat is shipped to the United States from Austria and Argentina to supply the market when native turkeys have been exhausted, leads specialists to believe this country has an excellent opportunity to increase its production.

Each market prices were materially lowered by greater production, authorities point out, lower prices in themselves might stimulate a materially heavier demand for turkey and by making it an all year food, open constantly widening avenues for profits to the small producer who takes advantage of new sanitation systems to insure rapid and cheap marketing to his flocks.

MODERN EDUCATION COSTS MORE BUT ACCOMPLISHMENTS GREATER

(By The Associated Press) NEW YORK, March 14.—Modern education is higher and more costly than the education of a few years ago, but its accomplishments are superior. The school which cost \$100 in 1900 now costs \$1000 and averages \$1000 for the year. The restricted and privileged school population of an earlier day, whether the vast growth in enrollment has been accompanied by an increase in pupil accomplishments is harder to answer than when education had more than doubled and the expenditures still a survey of modern eighth grade work in Boston schools compared with those of 1900. The Massachusetts report of 1920 is one of the most valuable pictorial educational documents yet issued. It was kept \$22.00 per pupil enrolled in 1900, but in 1920 the number of pupils had more than doubled and the expenditures per pupil had increased to \$22.25. The report is crowded with evidence that education and training are getting closer together, that education is better and not merely bigger and more costly. Measurements show that even with our large numbers of relatively unselected pupils the fundamental subjects are gaining in quality of work accomplished.

Notwithstanding of trying to raise the highest a bit higher, education has undertaken to raise the whole mass. In that alone is evidence of accomplishment. The older school did not help most children for most of them did not go to school. Now they are all enrolled, from the child scarcely more than fit to enter the building citizen and even the adult.

United States Sends Big Gun to Panama

WATERTOWN, Mass., March 14.—A monster gun that will hurl a ton of steel 29 miles is on its way from the government arsenal at Watertown to the Panama canal.

The gun is a 14-inch coast defense rifle, 70 feet long, of the second large caliber in use in coast defense installations.

A special car was fitted out with heavy machinery to haul the monster gun 29000 miles. The gun alone weighs 231,000 pounds and its carriage 378,000 pounds. Additional parts weighing 80,000 pounds have been shipped along with the huge rifle.

A naval vessel will take the gun aboard at the Brooklyn navy yard for transportation to the canal.

BETTER SCHOLARS AIM OF NEW RHODES PLAN

OXFORD, England, March 14 (AP)—The Rhodes trustees are preparing a bill for submission to parliament authorizing a change in the method of selecting Rhodes scholars, particularly from the United States, so as to improve their standard.

The plan proposed by the trustees with respect to the United States would abolish the present method of each state selecting two Rhodes scholars during a period of three years and would group the states into eight districts of six states each each district to select four Rhodes scholars every year.

The idea is to make competition keener and thus make it possible to select a higher type of American student to carry out Cecil Rhodes' ideal of international friendship.

The present basis for choosing Rhodes scholars, by college credentials, letters of recommendation, proof of athletic ability, of participation in college activities and finally a personal interview, will be left unchanged.

When thousands of workers are gathered in poorly lighted office buildings, it is not surprising to wonder that their efficiency is impaired and their dispositions soured."

"Brick and stone buildings with narrow slits for windows are medieval and things of the past and the whole emphasis of the future will be placed upon light and air. The American skyscraper will be one of the health wonders of the world."

PLAN TO PROTECT NAMES OF RADIO PROGRAM HOURS

WASHINGTON, March 14 (AP)—The United States Trade Mark association has informed the federal radio commission that it is planning to take steps for the protection of radio trade marks.

The association points out that manufacturers sponsoring programs which incidentally advertise their products, open and close their hours on the air with designations that may be termed "radio trade marks" and that these marks merit protection from infringement. The association plans to take up the matter with the federal trade mark commission.

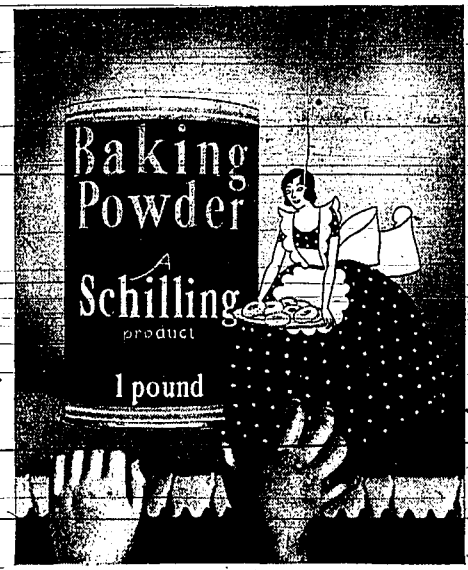

ARMY WILL MOTORIZE WHOLE UNIT TO SEEK SPEED AND MOBILITY

Military Organization Without Horse or Mule Will Be Developed for Experimental Purposes by War Department

The Army's experimental program of motorizing its units is being carried out at a rapid pace. The War Department is developing a new type of military organization which will be entirely self-propelled, and which will be capable of operating in any terrain. This new organization is being developed for experimental purposes only, and will not be used in actual combat.

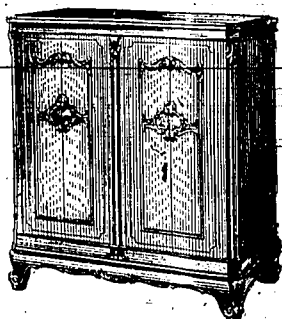

EDUCATION ASSUMES FIRST PLACE AMONG NATION'S INDUSTRIES

on System an Existing Present Time; Discusses Importance; Makes Suggestions.

(Special to The News) DABSON PARK, Feb. 14.—In view of the lively discussion on educational problems recently held at the National Education Association's meeting, Mr. Babson's views on the educational system as it exists today, Mr. Babson discusses the importance of education in the future, and suggests ways in which it may be made to play greater returns both from a business and from a social point of view.

Time Turns for Education The American people are spending about \$2,000,000,000 a year on public school education. One-quarter of that in 1910 we spent \$426,000,000. That means an increase of 370 per cent in 17 years. Some of the reasons for this increase are due to rising prices of school equipment and salaries. Also school attendance is much greater than in former times—buildings and equipment, teachers, etc., necessary. The question, however, is not so much whether we are spending too much on public education, but whether we are getting returns proportionate to the investment. This people have a right to expect good dividends on this huge investment—dividends in the form of better citizenship and character education, as well as the raising of general intelligence standards. Are they getting them?

If we want to know whether a corporation is carrying its way we examine its profit and loss statement and balance sheet. Applying the same method to public education, we find that school education here is what we find: 1—Practical elimination of illiterates during the past 20 years and raising general level of intelligence. 2—Supervision of pupils' physical health and safety to a much greater degree than ever before. 3—Americanization work. Had it not been for education, we would not have absorbed the great flood of immigration. 4—Valuable work done in vocational education, i. e., preparing young people for specific trades. 5—Increased earning power of educated and uneducated men. 6—Advance in material prosperity can be ascribed at least 40 per cent to higher educational level of the masses. These items are all fine. They justify optimism for the future. However, there is a debit, or failure, side of education's profit and loss statement which is serious. On the debit side we find: 1—Lack of real character building as evidenced by the fact that crime costs this country \$100,000,000 a year, which is about three times the amount spent on public school education. The school may argue that character building is primarily the function of the home and the church. I maintain that it is also very greatly the function of the public school. One-half of our children's waking life is spent in school rooms. 2—Failure to keep pace with the rapid advance in industrial and business progress. There is much in the school curriculum today that could well be dispensed with to make place for other things that bear more directly on the business of making a living. 3—Failure of many of our secondary schools to properly prepare students who intend to go to college. This is a source of complaint on the part of many prominent educators, and results in loss to the individual and to the college. 4—Tendency to spread out too thin. By that I mean trying to crowd too many subjects, some of which are inconsequential, with the result that no one thing is learned well and the child comes out with his mind confused. The crying need of today is not more cultural and scientific knowledge, but more spiritual knowledge.

What Business Expects Too many educators have a false idea of what business really wants from the college. Business men are not asking for more diplomas. They want graduates who are equipped with the qualities of reverence, obedience, willingness to do hard and unpleasant tasks, respect for law, integrity, and a general impression of public education's profit and loss-report is that there is room for much improvement. The public, who are the stockholders, have a right to demand it.

The business men of the country are demanding merely that the colleges train men in the fundamentals of life—developing proper habits, habits of concentration, hard work, integrity, and initiative. Mere knowledge can always be purchased. However, for \$2000 a year a business man can get an expert on almost any technical subject. Habits and character, however, cannot be purchased. The young man who went to college 40 years ago had learned, when he entered college, to do almost anything he did not want to do, with a large number of the young men who go to college today this is a lost art!

I believe in scientific business education for those who intend to enter business. The recent establishment of many new colleges of business administration is a fine thing. However, a diploma from one of these institutions does not mean anything to the business man unless it is accompanied by character. He knows that while education makes skill, it takes costs to make men.

It seems to me that President Kennedy's bill of Bowdoin college made one of the most trenchant and prophetic statements possible when he said at the opening exercises of the National Educational convention just closed: "The teacher who is teacher or instructor about spiritual things has any place in the public schools of America. If we bring up a generation without religion we must reap the whirlwind."

Importance to Madness The right sort of education has a tremendous bearing on the future of business and investments. The ethical factor cannot be ignored. Think of the large sums of money that are being spent to purge business of dishonest practices. If character building were 80 per cent efficient in our educational system we would not need the many state and federal business bureaus, or other agencies whose work is to uncover the fraudulent and dishonest companies. Valuable work is being done by associations within industries and financial groups to clean out the "undesirable" elements. How much more effective this work would be if it had its beginning with the school and home training of the young people who will in future conduct the nation's financial and business affairs. With regard to current business conditions, the Babson chart now stands at 4 per cent above normal.

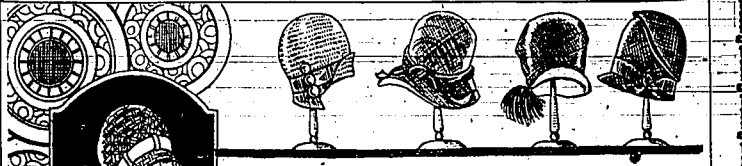

THE FIRST LADY OF THE LAND, Mrs. Grace Coolidge, in returning to her former place of residence in Northampton, Mass., March 14, was received without great ceremony.

It is easy for her to do so, for her preferences are well to attempt any unwarranted demonstration. They show her anxiety over the condition of her mother, Mrs. C. C. Dickinson, whose health has gradually been failing since she was stricken with influenza early in December. Daily visits have been paid to the Coolidge-Dickinson hospital by some of Mrs. Coolidge's closest friends since the 28-year old patient was taken there on the night of December 11.

But when Mrs. Coolidge herself visits her mother, she is accorded all possible privacy. On her first trip here in January, her neighbors, and close friends, Mrs. D. Hills, met her at the station with "buddies" Hills, as Mrs. Coolidge calls him, driving the car. Mrs. Coolidge kissed them both and her second trip to Northampton she was accompanied by Mrs. Hills who had been a guest at the White House.

Mrs. Alice Reeklin, the Coolidge's housekeeper, cares for the needs of the nation's first lady in the modest two-family house on Massachusetts street, which is located about a mile from the Northampton railroad station, up Elm street, just the Smith college campus.

The Coolidge-Dickinson hospital is only a quarter-mile away and there the room of Mrs. Coolidge's mother is kept cheerful with flowers from the White House and from Northampton friends.

Only the nurse and the doctor know what transpires at the rooms of mother and daughter. Friends are aware, however, that the bond between them always has been a close one. For the summer that Mrs. Coolidge visits have done Mrs. Coolidge an infinite amount of good.

Mrs. Coolidge spends several hours at the bedside of her mother, staying as long as the doctors deem advisable, and then returns either to the Massachusetts street home or to the White House, under the arching elms, to the hills residence, a few doors distant.

Nothing forms in the meals served while Mrs. Coolidge is a guest. "It just seems like old times," as her neighbors put it, "to have Grace back with us again."

And the other friends who know her as Mrs. Coolidge are glad that the first lady of the land has not changed in her attitude toward them. She is as friendly and unpretentious as when she lived here, the wife of a young lawyer, doing her own housework and devoting herself to her two boys.

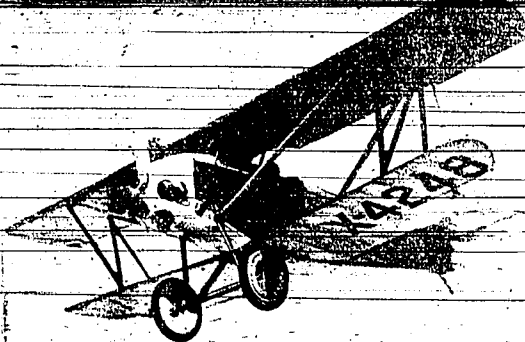

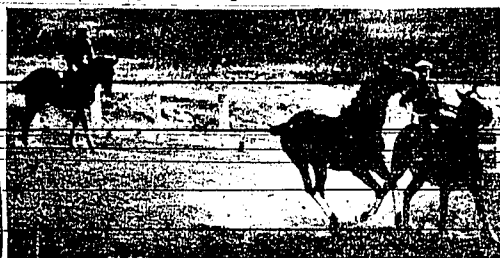

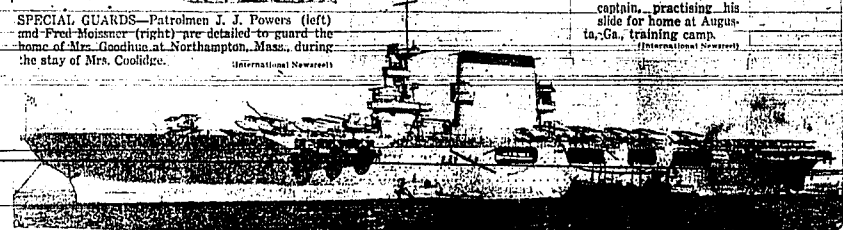

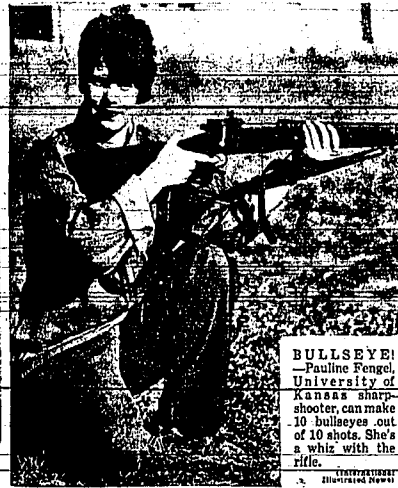

NEW NORMAL SCHOOL BUILDING COMPLETED

Administration Hall for Albion Institution One of Finest Structures of Its Kind.

BURLEY, March 14.—With the completion of the new normal school building, the school is equipped and equipped with exception of the assembly hall. This structure is one of the finest educational institutions built in the west, and is strictly modern in every respect. It is about 100,000, 200,000 feet of material, that has been used in its construction. The arrangement is such that every room in the building is reached with facility. The sun light and most approved method of ventilation is used; warm air being distributed during the winter months and cool air in the summer. A system of automatic temperature regulation has been installed, and a balance on the radiator, which is controlled by an automatic thermostat.

The library reading room is 94 by 22 feet. This room has a high ceiling, permitting a mezzanine floor and balcony with space for reading shelves. There is an elevator to the library floor. Reading chairs and tables in the library room are of modern oak, the finish in all the other rooms being walnut. All floors are laid with thick battlement tile, making the tread noiseless on the floors of this building and some other buildings on the campus, 24 tons of linoleum were used. In a wing of the administration building not yet completed and equipped a modern auditorium is being built. Parts of this room not yet covered with wall finish show the striking appearance of its construction. A complete stage is part of the equipment, with four dressing rooms. The auditorium will seat 750.

The new building is a masterpiece of architecture. The building is plain and modern, with no curves or ornamentation, and with a wealth of big windows.

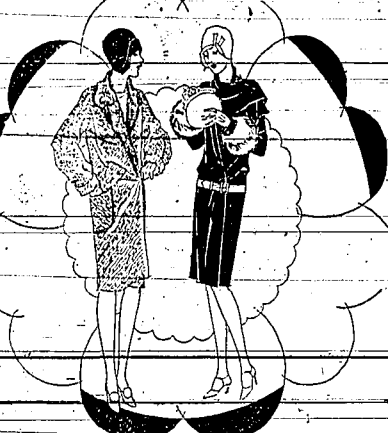
