## WINDY SHOPPERS REGISTER DELIGHT IN TWILIGHT NIGHT

Citizens of City and Hundreds From Out of Town Crowd Streets; Variety of Programs and Decorations Pleasing

To strains of martial and popular band music the people of Twin Falls turned out last evening for the opening of the spring season. The streets were thronged by hundreds from the surrounding country and neighboring towns who came to see what the Magic City had to show window shoppers in the way of handsome things artistically arranged. The occasion was planned by the merchants bureau of the chamber of commerce.

The wide reputation attained by Twin Falls merchants on similar occasions in the past led to high attendance from the part of outside visitors, which, they declared, were more than realized.

Three establishments had living models displaying the latest in the lines shown. One firm gave a play that was highly attended. Others devoted their energies to getting up beautiful window displays which attracted the attention of shoppers and many stopped to scan each display with critical and favored attention. Some of the stores opened their doors and gave away to the public. They referred to allow those interested to study the effect of decorative handwork for themselves. In cases where the stores were closed to guests, sales were made.

Souvenirs and donations were distributed at some of the stores which were open. The variety of programs, attractions and entertainment exceeded that of any similar previous event in the history of the city.

The opening will continue today and tomorrow, during which time the merchants expect to demonstrate to visitors within the city gates that the motto of the Magic City is "Come to see, stay to buy."

## SENATE COMMITTEE TRACES MORE BONDS

Eckhart's Secretary Reveals Disposition of \$2000 of Sinclair's Gift of \$160,000.

CHICAGO, March 15 (AP)—Examining more than a dozen bills introduced at the opening day of the inquiry here, the senate Teapot Dome subcommittee today traced disposition of some more of the Sinclair bonds. The United Trading company bonds and uncovered some Republican party financing which had been traced to the Chicago office of Nye, North Dakota, and Norbeck, South Dakota.

From Miss Flora Johnson, secretary of B. A. Eckhart, who twice was examined in Washington, the investigators learned that \$2000 worth of the \$160,000 of Sinclair bonds which Will H. Hays sent to the late Fred H. Upham, went to Eckhart on December 28, 1927. This was before the Republican national committee met at Washington to select the platform for the party.

## PLANE TAKES FOOD TO ISOLATED TOWNS

Aircraft Lands on Ice With Load of Provisions for Snow-bound Residents of Michigan

SAYLIT STE. MARIE, Mich., March 15 (AP)—An army transport plane capable of bearing one ton of freight landed on a patch of ice on the St. Marys river here late today to join two other planes seeking to relieve the suffering snow-bound residents of upper peninsula villages.

The large plane piloted by Lieutenant Joseph J. Boper, Belvidere field, fought its way through a fierce storm range 20 miles across of the land and sea ice. In the party was Oscar O. Glander, commissioner of state police, and a pilot, Fred W. Green to take charge of operations in the snow beset region. It is hoped the plane can be loaded with provisions and make the trip before the ice melts.

## RUSSIA CAUSES STIR AT GENEVA MEETING

GENEVA, March 15 (AP)—There was some commotion in the ranks of old time peace advocates today when the preparatory committee of the disarmament conference met today for the second time. This stir was caused by a proposal of the Russian delegation, Count von Bernstorff, Germany, the Russian ambassador to Belgium, and head of the American delegates.

## BORAH ASKS PARTY FOR 'REPUTIATION'

Idaho Senator Sets Out in Lone-Handed 'Endeavor' to Raise \$160,000 Fund to Cover Donation by Oil Man.

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, March 15—Calling upon Republicans over the country to "reputate" the \$100,000 contribution of Harry W. Sinclair, oil operator and lessee of Teapot Dome, to the Republican campaign fund, Idaho Senator Borah, Idaho, set out tonight in a lone-hand endeavor to raise the funds to pay off Sinclair.

Acting independently The Idahoan announced his course after submitting a request several days ago to the Republican national committee to collect the money and return it to Sinclair. He said tonight he was going ahead independently because "the committee has not acted."

In lieu of his earlier appeal to the party leaders, including Chairman William H. Butler, of the national committee, to wipe out the Sinclair contribution, the independent action of Borah was not regarded tonight as without political significance. However, he did not make any attack on the present party leaders in a formal statement which he issued outlining his program.

### UTAH COMMON POINT RATES ARE DEMANDED FOR SOUTHERN IDAHO

Representatives From Various Towns Agree on Plan to Present to Representatives of Union Pacific Railroad.

Demand for Utah common point blanket rates over the Wells railroad territory extending from Minidoka on the west to Bliss on the west.

In the event that satisfactory adjustment can be reached at the meeting in Paris on the 22nd of March 26, it is assumed that the railroad officials will return for another conference, accompanied by representatives of the Southern Pacific.

Before leaving last evening, the railroad officials stated that when they returned on March 22, the Southern Pacific officials would have authority to bind the roads.

The railroad company was represented at the meeting here yesterday by L. A. Auger, assistant traffic manager of the Union Pacific; H. E. Godwin, general freight agent, and Dan T. Smith, assistant general attorney of the Oregon Short Line.

At a conference held in the morning between the representatives of the various communities the demand later formulated was agreed upon. The railroad officials expressed regret that they were unable to pass on the matter without consultation with the Southern Pacific committee, which could not be present until March 21.

Many questions asked of the officials regarding rates. O. H. Shearer of Filer wanted to know why it cost 10 cents more per hundred pounds to ship vegetables than it did to ship other goods.

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Relative to certain Utah rates, the officials said that they were affected by the competition of the Denver and Rio Grande. Mr. Coffin argued that the situation here was not fundamentally different from that existing in Utah. He said it was his understanding that some years ago Twin Falls was encouraging construction of an independent railroad which the Union Pacific asked that the community secure the right of way from the independent company, and promised that it would construct a line in the event this was made.

He said that the independent line had been constructed, it would have been a competing concern. People here had a right to assume that the Union Pacific built the road, they would be in as good position as if the competing company built it.

Deny Coffin Claim. The railroad officials vigorously denied this contention so far as the effect of the independent line was concerned. They said that the company here had not run successfully, and would have to connect with the Southern Pacific. Mr. Coffin replied that it was generally reported that the independent company was interested in the proposed independent road. The officials again denied this statement.

Relief Organization. In response to call of what is termed a desperate need, organizations cooperating through the Associated Charities of Twin Falls are accumulating resources for relief of a number of persons and families who are stranded here awaiting the opening of the season for work on farms. It is stated, however, that relief during the next two or three weeks.

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### BOARD WANTS VOTE ON WHETHER TO SELL OR LEASE HOSPITAL

County Commissioners Decide to Submit Question at Election. Advance Charges to Meet Institution's Costs.

Whether Twin Falls county's general hospital should be retained or sold or leased is to be voted upon by the county's electors at the general election next November, according to a decision reached by the county commissioners yesterday.

After the meeting the commissioners decided to meet the institution's cost, and in this end the commissioners voted unanimously to fix the charge for private rooms to \$7 per day, making an advance of \$2 per day, and for beds in wards to \$3.50 per day, an advance of 50 cents per day.

Analysis of the hospital's costs, the commissioners stated, showed the cost for each bed per day to be \$6.75. The referendum vote on what to do with the hospital and decision to raise rates was agreed upon by the commissioners in the course of examination of the hospital fund budget for the current year.

At the next meeting of their labors on the budget, the commissioners reduced by \$29,250 a \$128,766 estimate of expenditures to make tentative budget providing for expenditure of \$144,416 on the hospital account this year.

They cut \$4000 from an estimated \$51,220 expense for salaries, and reduced a \$102,249 maintenance and operation estimate by \$7,150. They took \$10,000 of the estimate for hospital care of indigents, and they added \$2000 for new construction and \$200 for laboratory equipment.

Net reductions made by the commissioners came within \$476 of the allowance recommended by the budget committee composed of representatives of the chamber of commerce, Republican and Democratic county organizations, farmers and business and professional men.

Adopt Committee's Views. In declaring for the referendum vote on disposition to be made of the hospital the commissioners adopted outright one of the recommendations of the budget committee which said: "We find that the cost of maintaining the hospital is increasing from year to year, largely caused by the care of indigent poor, and by others who refuse or are unable to pay their hospital bills. We think it would be good business, and one of economy to purchase a small tract of land for a poor farm, which would not only care for those located at the hospital, but others who are receiving aid from the county which amounts to about \$50,000 annually. This amount includes the indigent pensioners.

We would also recommend to the county commissioners the advisability of selling or leasing the hospital, keeping in mind hospital care for the indigent sick in this transaction. It is further recommended that...

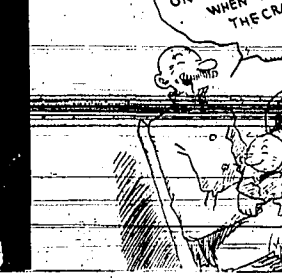

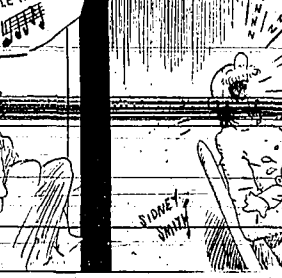

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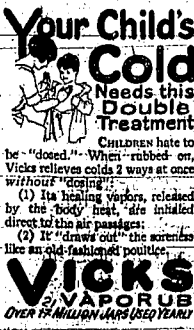
