### SECURITY PACTS IN GENEVA DISCUSSIONS

Geneva, Switzerland, March 16.—The Russian delegation, led by the official representative of the Russian government, took the offensive against the old French theory of security pacts, demanding that immediate discussion be held on the only way to firm peace.

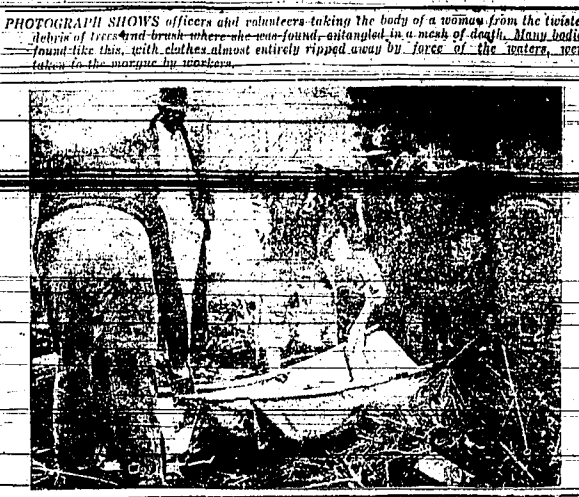

### JURY FINDS WOMAN GUILTY OF KILLING

#### Mrs. Jeannette Benoy, 65, of Grangeville, Convicted on Manslaughter Charge in North

GRANGEVILLE, Idaho, March 16.—Mrs. Jeannette Benoy, 65, who shot her husband, Thomas Benoy, in Grangeville, Idaho, yesterday, was found guilty of manslaughter by a jury here tonight.

The jury was out for four hours.

The "widow" woman had pleaded self-defense, saying that her husband, a blacksmith of Grangeville, had come home intoxicated and attacked her. She shot him twice through the chest.

Mrs. Benoy will be sentenced tomorrow by Judge Miller to a term of 18 months in the state reformatory.

The jury in an eloquent address in which he pleaded for leniency, said he believed her guilty. The penalty for first degree murder in Idaho is death or life imprisonment.

Prosecutor E. E. Foght had addressed the jury for three hours, pressing the character of the defense, and called four state witnesses who had testified that Mrs. Benoy intended to kill her husband, and pointing to a photograph of the woman's face.

The elderly widow, who is somewhat deaf, had asked the stand in her own defense, and responded readily, but in an emotional way to the questions of the prosecutor.

There was a loveless home, she had testified. Her husband had been drunk, and attacked her with a gun. She had fled covering her face with her hands, and shot a revolver in the bedroom, and shot Thomas Benoy as he stood in the kitchen.

Testimony of previous witnesses had developed that the husband had been by just the disorder house to rights, cleared away the bloodstains and arranged "clotted" men in a "pie" before she called the neighbors and told them of the killing.

### HOUSE SEES NEEDS OF ARMS MEETING

#### Without Debate Amendment to Warship Construction Program Is Quickly Adopted

The House today passed an amendment to the \$274,000,000 naval construction program to request the president to urge the necessity for another international conference for the limitation of naval armaments.

The proposal sponsored by Representative Sprague, Republican, Kansas, was adopted without a vote, shortly after its adoption an effort to reach a final vote before night adjournment was blocked by Representative Dillman, Democrat, Texas, and the measure was carried over for disposition tomorrow.

Accepts Amendment

The House also accepted by a vote of 115 to 102 an amendment by Representative Dillingham, Republican, Massachusetts, to provide that eight of the proposed 16 ships should be constructed in government yard.

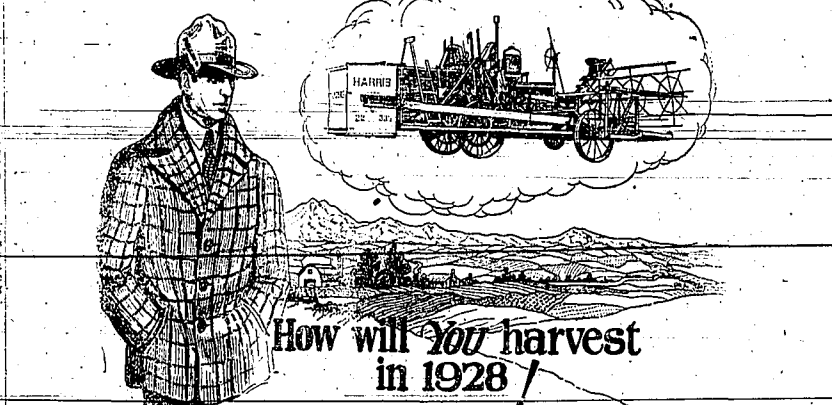

### COOLIDGE HOPES CONGRESS KEEPS ECONOMY IN MIND

WASHINGTON, March 16.—President Coolidge hopes that congress will keep its economy plans in mind as it considers the many bills calling for federal expenditures. He feels that the general welfare in the public calls for minimum governmental expenses and that congress in line with that thought, should weight necessity against expediency in passing money measures.

Mr. Coolidge does not mind himself, however, to the fact that many bills pending, such as the food bill, measure "appropriating" large sums of money, are necessities but that there are many other bills that he classifies as "padding" in the bill between expediency and necessity. It is in this case he hopes congress will do some padding, but so far as he is concerned, he expects to decide in favor of the wishes of congress whenever any doubt should exist in his mind as to whether bills are really necessary or merely expedient.
