Sportsmen are making progress with the construction of the new rearing ponds at the Snake Creek hatchery of the Fish and Game Association. The ponds are being built by the association and will be ready for use in about 300,000 little fish in the trout.

It will require \$1000 to carry out the permanent construction program and to feed the fish. Practically all the eggs are hatched and there will soon be about 300,000 little fish in the trout.

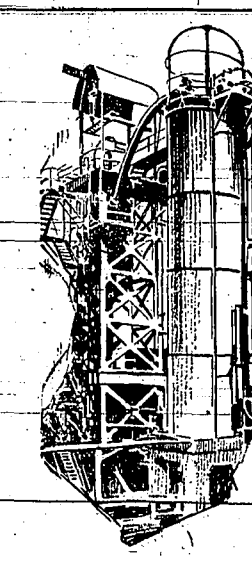

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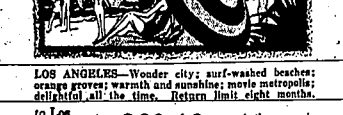

### COLLECTIONS FAIL AS CREDITS EXTEND

Survey by National Magazine Shows Conditions in Some Ways Worst in Ten Years.

Survey conducted by the National Retail Credit association, as shown by the magnitude of that organization, indicates that credit sales are increasing in this country and that collections in the country as a whole are the worst they have been in ten years.

He was a lover of good music and was an accomplished violinist, and was fond of outdoor life, sports, hunting and fishing. At one time he served as a deputy game warden in Twin Falls county in the interests of good sportsmanship and preservation of game birds and animals.

Born in Ohio Mr. Fisher was taken by his parents while still a boy to Nebraska, where his father was engaged in the nursery business. As a young man, Mr. Fisher entered the profession of pharmacy in Omaha, later becoming prescription man for Dr. Woodruff, one of Omaha's prominent eye specialists.

Falling health caused him to leave Omaha and go to Wyoming. Paralysis of the legs forced Mr. Fisher to walk with the aid of crutches at the time of his arrival in Wyoming. Two years in the open about a sheep camp brought about his complete recovery.

Moving to Ogden, he established a drug store which he maintained for a number of years. Mr. Fisher married Mrs. Fisher in Ogden. At the time of the gold rush to Nevada, Mr. and Mrs. Fisher moved to that state where Mr. Fisher again entered the drug business. After the mines closed down, Mr. and Mrs. Fisher moved to Twin Falls where they have remained.
