Counsel for Dr. S. Oliver Nettleton Will Bring Up Murders of 45 Years in Court

In the family of Mrs. S. O. Nettleton over a period of 45 years will form part of the defense of Dr. S. Oliver Nettleton, his counsel announced today at the preliminary hearing of the noted physician charged with slaying his wife February 24 last.

Shot to Death Mrs. Nettleton was shot to death in the basement of her home on a fruit farm near here. Her husband reported finding her body after his return from a trip to Olathe.

He expressed the belief that a tramp who was reported to have been turned away from Mrs. Nettleton's home the day she died was responsible for the killing.

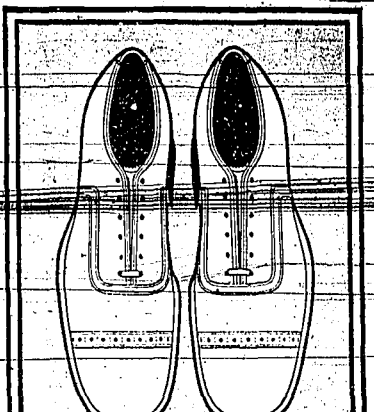

Less Credit Needed "A nation-wide survey of credit and collection conditions clearly shows that it takes more than huge bank reserves to make money plentiful in the hands of the average business man and retail consumer. We have reports I am receiving it would be pretty hard to make the average man on the street believe that money is easy. We are just waking up to the fact in this country that there is a vast difference between money and credit. "Business men and individuals have already had more credit extended to them than is for their own good. What the average merchant would like to see is less credit and more cash. The workman is more interested steady work than in the pleasures of luxuries on easy terms. "The manufacturer can't keep for himself up with bank notes. What he wants is to get the product at a price which will pay the cost of production and leave him some profit. "That is, therefore, more interested in getting people to pay their back bills. "The fact that we in this country have one-half of the world's gold supply does not seem to have prevented scarcity of money in the pockets of the average householder. Other factors than money reserves are controlling the situation in industry and commerce. "Productive capacity is so great and consumption is so active that the more efficient manufacturers or merchants can make a satisfactory profit.

Collections Generally Slow "Reports coming to me from different parts of the country indicate that collections are either slow or fair. Cities reporting collections 'good' or 'excellent' are few and far between. No doubt the slackening in employment has influenced activity to a considerable extent in the past two months, especially in the Eastern and Middle Western States. "Out of 50 leading cities of the country, practically 40 per cent state that collections are from nearly 100 cities and of this number only 20 per cent showed collections to be much better than the average. "Of the 30 cities reported as good to excellent, whereas now only nine cities state that collections are good to present, 40 per cent of cities describe collections as fair. There are of course a few bright spots in the reports. Cities reporting better collections than the average are Cincinnati, Denver, Oklahoma City, Des Moines, Birmingham, Charlotte, Memphis and Wilmington. "Instalment buying is, of course, widespread having been extended to a number of lines of merchandise, which a few years ago knew nothing of. Recently, however, I note a slowing up in the mad pace of instalment purchases that was set during 1926 and 1927. Reports from 20 leading cities recently received show instalment buying increasing in 10 cities, and either decreasing or showing no change in a similar number of cities. Three cities show instalment buying on the decline. "Push Collections "It seems to me that the credit department of a business should study general business conditions intensively. Many concerns have been following a wasteful policy in ignoring the changes that occur in business conditions in different localities. "At times it has been the practice to set up the pressure for collections during times of good business and to increase the pressure drastically in the times of poor business. It should be the other way round. The psychology of this is simple. When business is good and your customer has

plenty of money he does not resent demand for payment. When, however, your customer is broke, insistence on payment very often makes him your enemy, and moreover, you do not get the money. Wise credit men look for the signs of such a condition, and try to increase pressure at times when business is prosperous, and as best as possible when business is depressed. "The same thing applies to localities. Credit men must study business conditions in various cities when they have customers and regulate their credit policy with the trend of conditions in those cities.

"While the credit situation today is admittedly somewhat unsatisfactory, there are some encouraging features. The credit situation appears to be better in the North Western sections where good money for crops has been received, also the Pacific Coast reports collections fairly good. Improvement is noted in some of the Southern states. Inasmuch as collections are directly affected by general business conditions it is reasonable to expect improvement as general business improves. "In this connection the good building figures for February are encouraging also increasing activity in the automobile and steel industry are helpful factors. 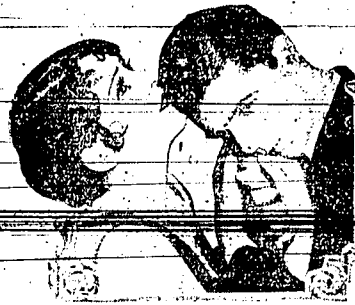

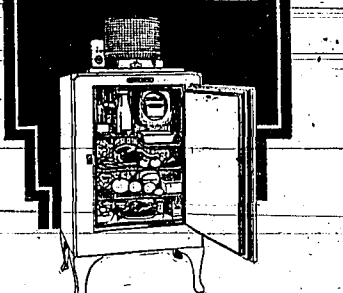

GRANGERS CALL FOR CHANGE TO VOTE ON CONTINUING HOSPITAL

Masters and Past Masters of County's Farm Organizations Devote Evening to Study of

Grangers of Twin Falls county want an opportunity to vote on the proposition of continuing operation of the county hospital. The proposition is to be voted on at a special election to be held on the 15th of next month.

The meeting which brought together the grangers of Twin Falls county was held at the home of Mrs. J. H. Umbaugh, president of the county grangers' association. The meeting was held at 8 o'clock and was attended by a large number of grangers.

Defending the proposition for continued operation of the hospital on the grounds that there is no other completely equipped hospital in the county. The speaker, Mr. J. H. Umbaugh, stated that the hospital is a public utility which should be maintained.

Should the county hospital be closed to pay patients, Mr. Barnes suggested it would be possible to use the nurses' home as a poor house, and the main building as quarters for county charges needing hospitalization.

Hospital expenditures last year totaled \$88,000. Mr. Barnes stated that total amount of business if all had been collected in cash, would have amounted to \$74,934. The hospital levy for the year of which nearly 25 per cent is still delinquent, would have brought in \$16,000. Cash collected from patients was approximately \$32,000; charity work amounted to \$2000, and care of indigents in the nurses' home cost \$2787.

Explains Tax Dollar
Discussing the relationship of county expenditures to the general tax expenses, Mr. Barnes stated that out of the total of \$814, exclusive of special improvement assessments, assessed against each \$100 property valuation in Twin Falls in 1928, the county actually spent only one cent. State tax is explained—accounted for 40 cents; city tax \$3.00; highway district, 81 cents; school district, \$2.00, and general, 51 cents. Dividing the county's 55 cents, Mr. Barnes showed that 25 cents went for current expense, 8 cents for bond redemption, 8 cents for county hospital, and 3 cents for county fair.

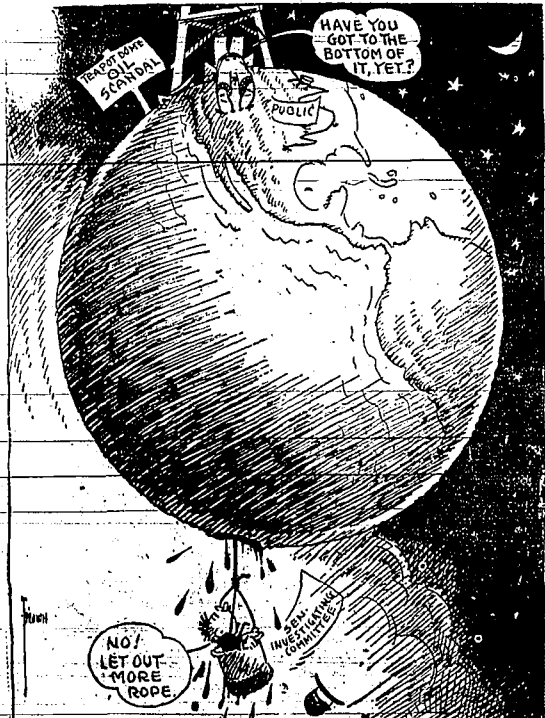

"Penny Shares" on Curb Market Graduate or Are Cut Off List

(By The Associated Press)

NEW YORK, March 24—There are those in the "Street" who say the curb market is getting "high" and who mourn the passing of those "penny cats and dogs," the "penny shares" because their price range was in cents rather than dollars, have passed with the days of regular trends, general movements and explainable markets. Some 350 of them were created from the "little boards" last year, most of them old and pinned stocks, and few remain to dispute the curb market's effort to make the culture of traded securities and the trend of both "big" and "little" boards toward higher ground.

Their disappearance was not entirely a matter of climatic change, however. Many of them graduated into the "seasoned" security class and the exclusive circle of higher priced stocks.

Six years ago when the curb market had the key for its roof and the broad-based payment for its trading floor a rough, considerable haul among and depended upon nimble fingers, these to whom a collection of pennies like lumps, window peelers and a means dollar, a few well are left, but the curb market has been a medium of business—these low-priced penny shares were popular. United States Cutter Bear Bids Farewell to Adventures of Arctic

HISTORIC CRAFT OF NORTH SEA LIES IN HARBOR AT OAKLAND

Fate of Vessel Credited With 40 Dashes Into Waters of Northland Unknown; Craft Is 54 Years Old; May Be Saved

(By The Associated Press)

OAKLAND, Cal., March 24.—The cutter Bear, historic craft of the North Pacific, lies in the Oakland harbor, facing an unknown fate.

On June 20, the vessel's fifty-fourth birthday, the coast guard will be forced to make some disposition of the vessel that has made 40 trips to Arctic waters to rescue stranded vessels, including that of the Greeley Polar expedition in 1884. Funds for its maintenance will be available only after that date, since congress has refused an appropriation to fit it with new boilers.

Arctic quarters officials, temporarily attached to the end cutter, say it faces one of three fates. It may be scrapped, awarded a major of honor in a museum, or relegated to a bit in the interest of science.

The Bear, built in Scotland in 1874 and used first as a seal, was known by the United States government in 1884 for use in the Greeley relief expedition. It was the Bear, under command of Lieutenant William H. Emery, that located the useless canyon where search for the North Pole had been so disastrous.

In 1897 the cutter set forth in the winter against the warnings of experienced Arctic seamen to go to the rescue of eight vessels of the whaling fleet, caught in the ice in the vicinity of Point Barrow. The whalers' crews were facing starvation and the president McKinley for aid. The danger was so imminent and serious, and the necessity for relief so urgent, that the president immediately ordered an expedition to be fitted out.

The party was put in command of Captain Francis D. Nichols, and crew were all volunteers, and although the Bear had just returned from a six months cruise in Arctic waters, she was fitted out and sailed from Seattle just three weeks from her arrival from the north.

Ten months later she returned, again, bringing the crews of four wrecked whalers, and having car-

ried out eight without loss of a single life.

AMERICAN FALLS, March 24.—Use of the American Falls reservoir as an impounding reservoir thereby enabling the bureau of reclamation to control the level waters of the Snake river is expected to greatly relieve the Millner dam and to reduce the danger to that structure from erosion. Lays rock in the river bed at that point is intended to eroding away, and the bank of the falls now is said to be less than 50 feet below the dam. Under normal conditions the process of erosion is so gradual that it will be years before the dam is endangered, and this year it is hoped to prevent any damage from high water.

In recent years the falls immediately below the dam have been rapidly working their way upstream, and it has been found that the greatest danger to the structure of the river bed has been done during the spring run-off.

Last summer, when the American Falls dam filled to its maximum capacity of 1,000,000 acre feet, the American Falls project, a dam on a tributary to the falls, was required to use the lake for flood control purposes. Accordingly the gates have been kept open allowing an overflow ranging from 800 to 9000 second feet. In this way the spring water has been reduced to 1,250,000 acre feet at which point it is held back in the reservoir.

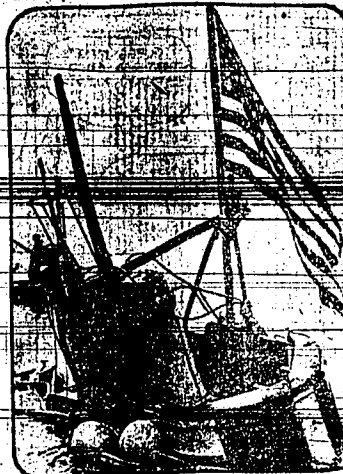
