## ATHLETICS DIRECTOR GOES INTO DISCARD

Training of High School Teams Would Be Delegated to Teachers by Proposal Reported Favored by Board Majority.

Work of the director of athletics in Twin Falls high school which during the past six years has devolved upon one man, will be delegated to three or four teachers, serving as coaches, according to a reorganization program which is reported to have been approved by a majority of the members of the school board. The proposal, however, has not yet been voted on at a board meeting.

Members of the board who endorse this program believe it will effect a considerable saving of money without sacrifice of efficiency in the training of athletic teams. It is further stated that the new program will make possible an extension of the benefits of athletic competition to include a greater number of students through participation in intra-mural contests.

Other Uses for Money Salary of the director of athletics for two years past has been \$200 a year. Under the reorganization program, as explained yesterday by one of its advocates on the school board, the amount would be distributed among three or four full-time teachers to compensate them for additional work and responsibility in the coaching of athletic teams. Money thus saved would be available for use in purchase of equipment now needed in the chemistry and physics laboratories, or in meeting the expense entailed in automatic increases in salaries of teachers resulting in the present two-year periods of years. Salary increases on this account last year approximated \$2500 and it is expected, will total about \$1000 next year.

Program Faces Test Advocates of the new program assert that it would be subject to a severe test during its first season with six out of 12 first string football players being lost to the school by graduation.

Graduation will take three regular players and a first substitute out of the backfield and two from the line. The backfield will have Tim Robertson, quarterback; Burton Perine, head footed ground runner and punter; Dean Wahl, reliable passer; and Dibble. The line will lose Tom Lucas, last season's captain, and Earl Kempton.

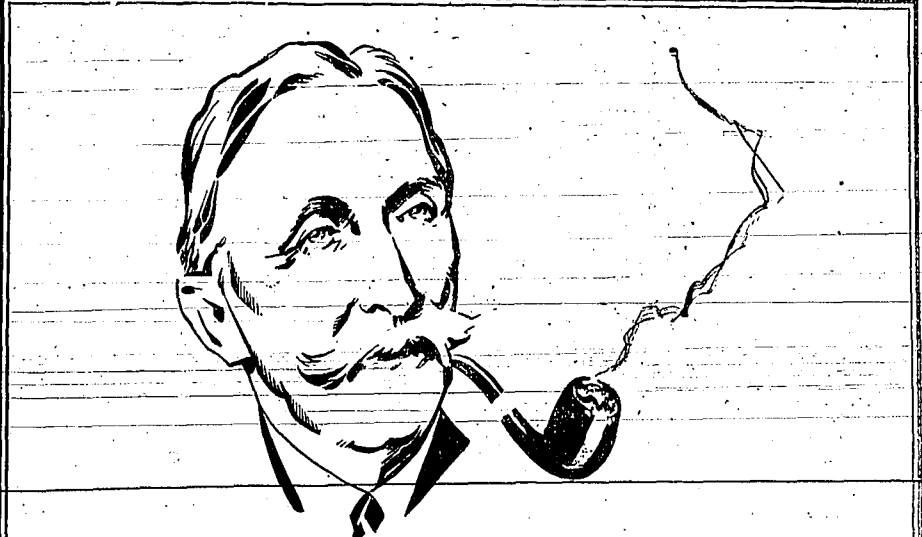

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### ROBERT MEN INJURED WHEN TRAIN HITS CAR

Jack Mast and James Frogley in Critical Condition Following Freight Yard Crash.

The accident, which occurred Monday night at eight o'clock in a local freight yard, resulted in the death of one man and the injury of two men.

Jack Mast, 34 years old, of Pocatello, Idaho, was the first to be killed. He was struck by a freight car and crushed to death.

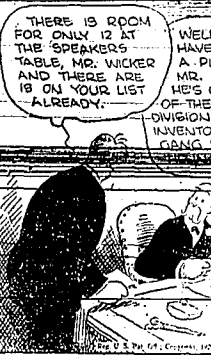
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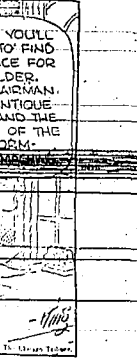

WHEAT PRICES HOLD  
FIRM WITH DEMAND  
EQUAL TO SURPLUS

World's Requirements Cause  
Market Buy and Feed Grains  
in Less Active Demand.

SALT LAKE CITY, March 26.—The wheat market, although unsettled during the week ending March 24 but at the close of the market for both wheat and flour continued to hold their firm position while the demand for feed grains was less active and the market had weakened, according to the weekly grain market report of the United States bureau of agricultural economics. The flour market also declined slightly during the week but cash offerings were few.

With the smaller supply wheat in the southern hemisphere more than offsetting the larger supply in the north America and prospects for very little more wheat being supplied by Russia it now appears that the world's requirement for bread wheat will be nearly equal the prospective surplus in the exporting countries that was estimated earlier in the season. This situation has brought about a firmer market for bread grains, which has been reflected in an advanced price not only in the United States but in the principal foreign markets.

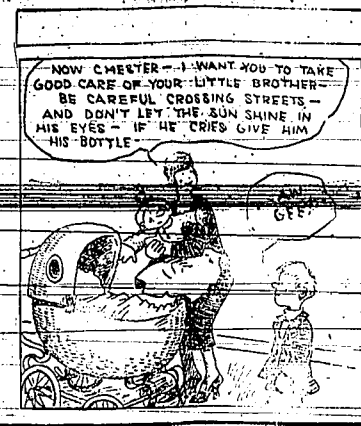
Wheat for March delivery in Liverpool advanced three cents for the week in closing March 24 at \$1.21. Prices at Buenos Aires were about one cent higher. Native wheats in Berlin advanced nearly two cents and in London about 45 cents and at Milan about 34 cents per bushel. No. 3 Manitoba wheat from Canada for March shipment was quoted at Liverpool at \$1.50, 64 pound Rosalie from Argentina at \$1.57 and Australian wheat from at \$1.61. Argentine shipments continued fairly heavy.

Wheat about 100,000 bushels for the week. Australian shipments are small but the North American shipments, principally of Canadian wheat are of good volume.

The domestic wheat market continued firm but cash prices were not higher. It changed except for select lots of high protein hard winter and some quality of soft winter wheat. Offer of which were higher. The supply of soft winter wheat increased in practically all of the principal export markets and prices are expected to curtail this buying in the near future.

Hay Market Weaker  
Hay market somewhat weaker. Supply of alfalfa hay is abundant. Reports from Ohio and Indiana indicate that considerably more wheat than usual is being plowed under to the ground and winter wheat. Choice car of No. 1 red winter sold as high as \$1.80 per bushel at St. Louis. Winter wheat is being sold at Chicago at \$1.72, Cincinnati \$1.69 to \$1.70 and Toledo \$1.66 to \$1.67.

Soft winter wheat mills are having difficulty in getting a full supply of hard winter wheat mills in sales of flour because of the high price of red winter wheat and the small purchases to immediate needs. Protein premiums for hard winter wheat remained firm and mills were talking in terms of milling.

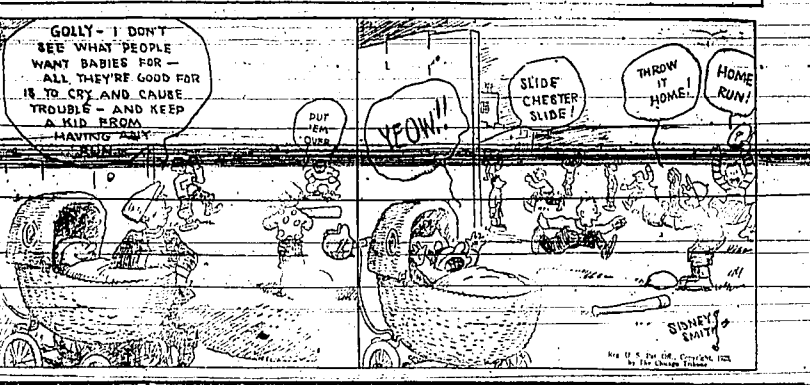

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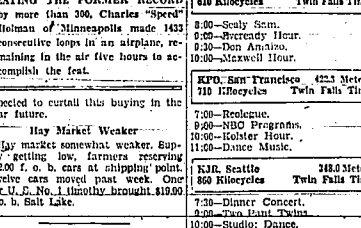
