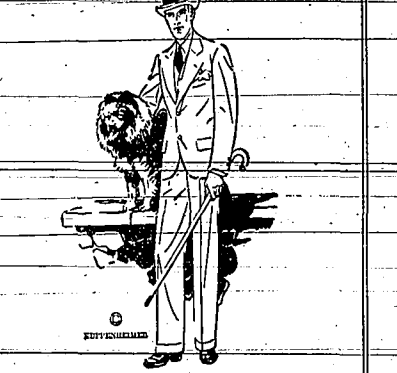

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

Faultless Material In "After Six Days"

The Bible, the Old Testament, for all its sterling possibilities, its original historical interest and its value, has virtually been untouched heretofore by any motion picture production.

REED OF MISSOURI STRIKES AT HOOVER

Democratic Candidate for Office Blames Republicans for Farmers' Post-War Plight

MILWAUKEE, Wis., March 31 (AP)—

In a speech here tonight, William Reed, Republican party for the national plight of American farmers. He centered his attack particularly on Herbert Hoover, contending that "the farmer has been held down the price paid farmers for their wheat."

"Congress never gave to Herbert Hoover or any other man, the right to limit the price to which wheat might go above \$2.50," said the Milwaukee candidate. "The government's ill-considered policy, which distinguished expatriate the power to license all dealers in grain and all millers."

Cries Regulations.—"He notified every grain dealer in the United States that if they failed to meet the \$2.50 per bushel, he would to contract business would be revoked and his business utterly destroyed. He notified every miller that he must buy from the grain dealers and at the stipulated minimum price, plus a small differential of profit."

"The export grain corporation was formed, and no wheat could be shipped abroad save through it, and that corporation, dominated by the interests of the grain and wheat demands, fixed the same price for export grain as he had fixed in the domestic market. He notified every farmer that no farmer had any price he could sell wheat, except at the price arbitrarily fixed by Mr. Hoover."

"Hoover and his cabinet," Mr. Reed Hooper and charge that it was the Wilson administration that fixed the price of grain. The Wilson administration, he said, had guaranteed the minimum price. Congress never authorized the fixing of a maximum price.

Restrictions Not Confined.—Declaring that the "restriction upon the farmer's prices was not confined to wheat alone," the Milwaukee speaker asserted that "it was extended to all or substantially all his products and must have mounted into the billions."

"At the same time," Mr. Reed continued, "he was compelled to buy practically everything he purchased upon the prevailing high war levels. The inevitable result was that he came out of the war a cripple. He had nothing to sell and no market for the right to sell upon the same level where he was obliged to buy."

While Smith, Walsh and Reed all are entered in the Wisconsin democratic primaries of Tuesday, and Smith is on a different footing and for this reason there will be no conclusive test of strength.

The Missouri senator, only one of the three who is delivering speeches in the state before the voting, also is the only one entered in the preferential primary. He has no committee of delegates. Two states are allotted to the New York governor, while in an intangible state of delegates favors Walsh's nomination. Under the Wisconsin law the preferential primary, an adviser, not binding as is the case in many other states.

First Show-Down Seen.—The first real show-down in the Walsh-Smith-Reed contest will come in California. All three have complete delegations in the state. The Democratic primaries there, and there will be no doubt as to the significance of the vote.

In Wisconsin, on the Republican side of the political fence, there is a camp between La Follette and anti-La Follette Republicans which will come to a head on Tuesday. The La Follette faction is supporting a delegate slate pledged to Senator Norris, Nebraska. 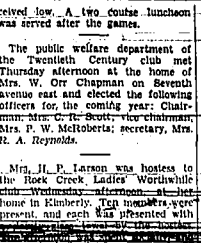

SPOKEN WORDS WING WAY ACROSS GLOBE AND AID FRIENDSHIP

Wires Help Cement Relationship Between Nations - Development Is Rapid in Seven Years

(By The Associated Press) NEW YORK, March 31.—Winging its way along the lines stretched across the world by telephone, the spoken word is following the trail blazed by America's "good will ambassadors" to cement commercial and political relations between the United States and other nations.

Within seven years, a period which covers the development of the international telephone and telegraph corporation, those lines have reached out to 47 countries and five continents and have told the story of a real romance of American business to Cuba, Porto Rico, Mexico, Chile, Uruguay, Brazil, Spain, France, England, Italy, Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Austria, Argentina, China, Japan, Australia and New Zealand.

Through the medium of the Postal Telegraph-Commercial Cable company, recently announced, the corporation expended the development of a 200,000,000 communications system, the greatest known to man. Messages will cross virtually every country by land and the oceans by submarine cables and jump natural barriers as well as national boundaries by radio.

Eight years ago the International had offices in three countries. The four continents which in 1922 had grown to 31, manufacturing, selling and operating equipment to provide the world with the means to have its voice across 10,000 miles. In 1921 a thousand employees comprised the organization. Today there are 21,000.

Net income has bounded from \$555,000 seven years ago to \$4,414,414. The telephone business in 1922 was \$164,199,400. In seven years the parent company alone has paid \$14,250,582 in dividends.

But the remarkable growth of the company was not achieved without a struggle. Powerful international competition from manufacturing interests of other nations was met in 1925 by the purchase of the factories of the International Western Electric company, including its rights to manufacture abroad under the Bell patents. Today that subsidiary is the largest distributor of electrical products throughout all the world, with the exception of the United States and Canada.

It was in 1924 that a program of rapid expansion began. The company then absorbed the telephone system of Spain. In 1924 King Alfonso inaugurated Madrid's automatic telephone service. At the end of that year Spain had in service 114,280 telephones.

In 1925 the Mexican Telephone and Telegraph company was taken over. Its obsolete equipment and 50 miles of long distance wires were modernized and extended between Mexico's principal cities. International telephone conversations now may be carried on between these cities and any of the 18,000,000 telephones in the United States, Canada and Cuba.

These afforded a direct link between the United States, Central and South America. Additional cable lines added 3,000 nautical miles to the total and an overland route was opened between mountain United Chile with Buenos Aires. BUDGET HEARING AT COURT HOUSE FOR FINAL CHECKING UP

Commissioners Prepare for Big Delegations With Suggestions for Administering Financial Program

Whether the tax paying public of Twin Falls county will turn out en masse tomorrow to fill the district court house for a budget hearing on the county budget will take place, or whether the hall of justice will resemble one of the great open spaces that are frequented in motion pictures, is something that time only will reveal. The hearing is set for 10 o'clock on the first Monday of April, at which time the board of commissioners will listen to suggestions from the people.

The tentative general fund budget to be discussed tomorrow is \$198,105, against the general fund and \$144,146 for the hospital fund.

The only indication of what may be expected is the fact that up to last night at least three of the commissioners had gone to the office of the auditor to check up on the final findings of the commissioners according to H. C. Francis, county auditor.

Board Makes Reduction
The estimates of probable expenditures originally submitted to be paid out of the general fund of the county amounted to \$250,705 to meet which county income available according to estimates would be \$195,505. It was necessary therefore to reduce the expenditures.

A budget committee composed of representatives of the chamber of commerce, the Republican and Democratic parties, Finance and Business and Professional women's club made recommendations cutting the budget to \$182,741. The county commissioners consulted with this committee and later gave study to its recommendations. It is reported that the committee estimate that the hearing tomorrow will take place. It is possible to shift appropriations from one office to another, and possibly to reduce the total, but the total of the tentative budget cannot be increased above that agreed on at the final meeting by the board in making compilations March 15.

The commissioners' budget appropriation, which is to be subjected to consideration tomorrow is as follows: County clerk, \$12,575; sheriff, \$16,875;

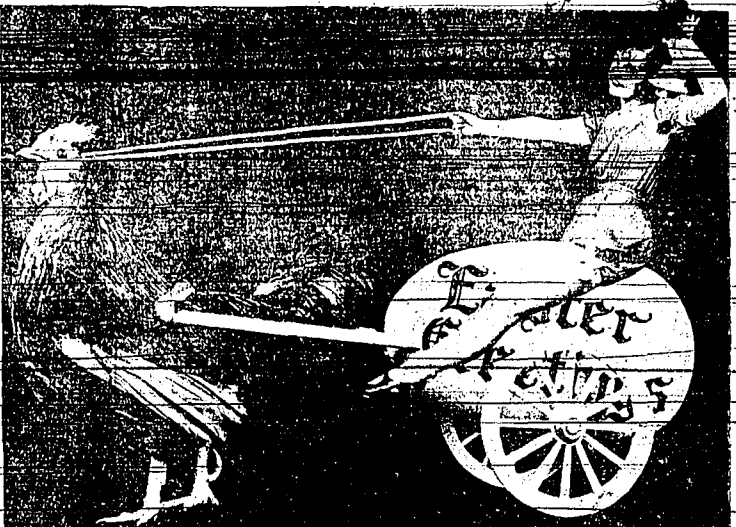

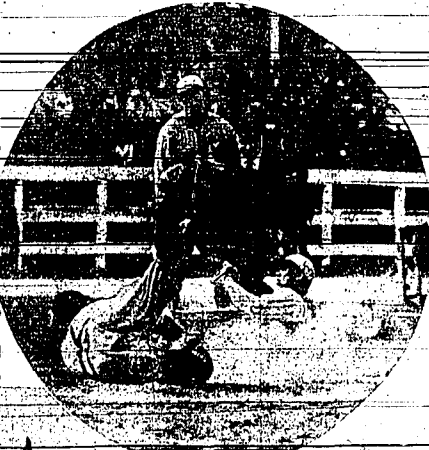

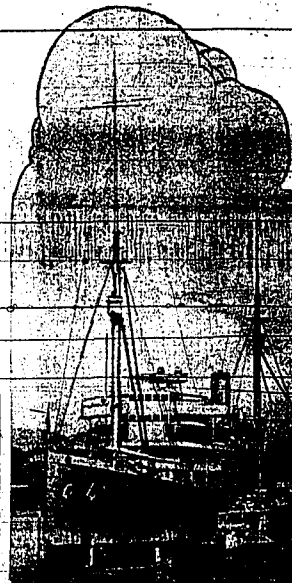

PRODUCTION RECORDS REACH NEW HIGH POINT

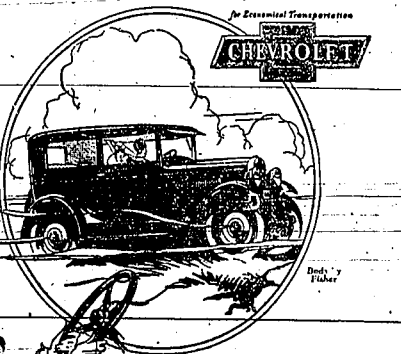
