CHAMPION OF FARM INTERESTS

PRESIDENT COOLIDGE

Chief Executive and Cabinet Taken to Task by Indiana Senator; Recalls Republican Platform; McNary in Fight

(By The Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, April 2.—Issue with President Coolidge and his cabinet was taken in the senate today by Senator Watson, Indiana Republican, in championing the controversial equalization fee provision of the McNary-Haugen farm relief bill.

Opening debate on the bill seeking addition of the long standing controversy over farm relief, Senator Watson declared that he had solved into the feasibility of the equalization fee, by which it is proposed to raise funds for marketing surplus crops.

Recalls Platform

The Indiana senator, who is opposing Secretary Hoover in his state for presidential delegates, recalled that the Republican platform called for farm relief. President Coolidge vetoed the McNary-Haugen relief bill because of the equalization fee among other reasons.

President Coolidge, Secretary Mellon and Secretary Hoover were present.

Watson said, "I admit the presence of this problem and all have suggested a solution. The McNary-Haugen bill was the floor to lead the fight during the several hours of discussion which the new measure provoked. He explained that virtually all objections of Mr. Coolidge to the McNary-Haugen bill of last session had been met in this measure.

Even the equalization fee has been modified so as to make it applicable to all commodities produced in the state and to have it brought into effect only after an emergency situation has arisen. Senator McNary, Republican, Idaho, an opponent of the equalization fee, which he regards as unconstitutional, was somewhat critical of the powers invested in the farm board under the bill to resort to the equalization fee.

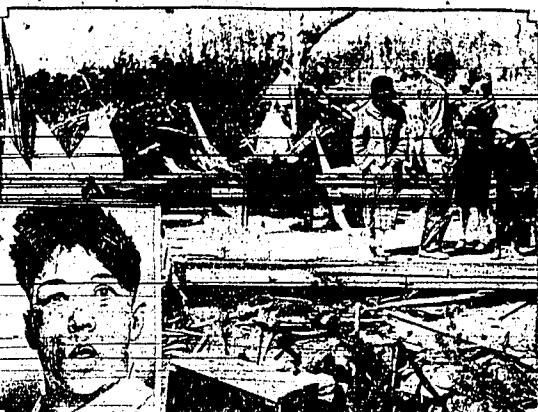

### BEEKEEPERS OBTAIN INSPECTION MONEY IN BUDGET REVIEW

County Commissioners at Public Hearing, Make Very Few Expenditures During Year.

Appropriation of \$300 for bee inspection was reduced to \$200 in Twin Falls county budget for the current year by vote of the county commissioners at public hearing yesterday. The vote was recorded in view of representations made to the commissioners that the beekeepers' maintenance of the county's honey industry which last year shipped out between \$4,000 and \$50,000 worth of its products.

The commissioners also voted to increase by \$100 the county's annual contribution to the National Beekeepers' association for the year ending last year. It was stated, admitted 29 patients from Twin Falls county increase made the total donation \$300.

During the day the commissioners received the budget of various departments for the current year. The budget for the department of public health, which was presented by Dr. J. E. Stump, was approved by a vote of 4-1. The budget for the department of public health, which was presented by Dr. J. E. Stump, was approved by a vote of 4-1.

Without altering the total of the tentative appropriation for the sheriff's department, the commissioners, after considering some other proposals, voted to reduce allowance for operation of automobiles and feeding of prisoners and eliminate the office of sheriff's clerk for employment of three regular deputies, each to be paid an annual salary of \$1750. Elimination of the clerk yielded \$1080; automobile expense was reduced by \$200 and allowance for feeding prisoners was reduced by \$400.

This program was proposed by J. L. Barnes and adopted by unanimous vote of the board after he had advanced three other proposals that failed.


The first of these proposals provided for elimination of the state and curtailment of automobile expense and feeding of prisoners funds to yield a surplus that would increase the allowance for extra help to \$2180. M. C. Ware, Twin Falls, commissioner, proposed an amendment to limit cost of feeding prisoners to 20 cents a day. This cost for the first quarter was 90 cents and had been reduced to 10 cents for the rest of the year. This amendment was adopted but the original motion was voted down.

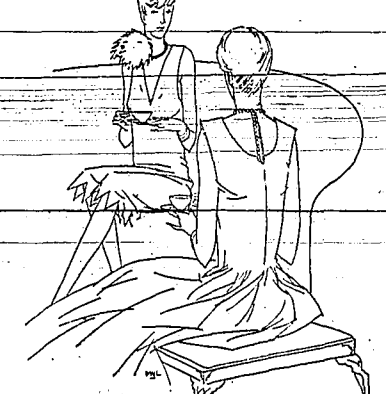

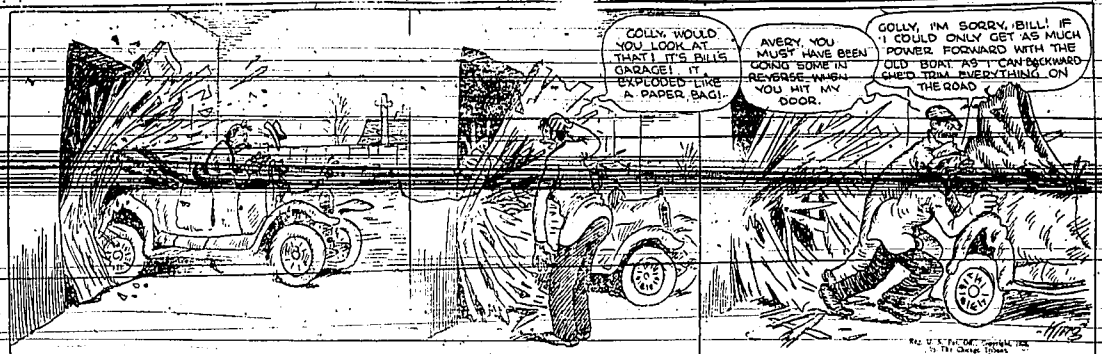

European wheat market situation. European crops condition appear to be fairly satisfactory although damage from winter killing is reported in some areas. The outlook in North Africa continues generally favorable. An increase of about 2000 acres in the winter wheat acreage in Russia is shown in the latest estimate with a decrease of about 100,000 in the winter wheat acreage. Under continued large shipments of wheat from the Russian hemisphere the European market developed a slightly easier tone. Prices of native wheats declined 1 to 2 cents per bushel at the principal markets. Good milling wheat testing 58 to 59 pounds was quoted at Hamburg at \$1.70, Paris \$1.70, and Milan \$1.77 1/2. Quotations on foreign wheat in Liverpool held about unchanged. Number 3 Manitoba for April shipment being quoted at \$1.56 1/2, 64 pound rosie from Argentina at \$1.52, and Australian wheat for March shipment at \$1.57.

Domestic wheat markets developed a firmer tone with soft winter wheat showing a further advance as a result of the diminishing supply and urgent demand. Receipts of this class of wheat are very limited and supplies are practically exhausted. March loaded 81 carloads of products and other freight for shipment to other points, records of George Trull, Oregon Short Line agent here, showed. Outward shipments for the month included 32 carloads of potatoes, 10 of wheat, two of beef, one of lamb and three of sheep. Incoming freight shipments during the month totaled 21 carloads, and included one carload of immigrants' movables.

The strength in the central western markets was also reflected in the markets of the Pacific Northwest where no active demand for flour from the southeastern states advanced the prices of soft and western white wheats to well above an export basis. Good milling grades of these wheats were quoted at the close of the week at Portland at \$1.42 to \$1.44 compared with export bids for western red wheat of \$1.37 to \$1.38 per bushel. Spring wheat markets advanced upwardly. Receipts were of moderate volume at the principal markets and premiums held steady influenced by the advance in winter wheat and a continued demand for good-milling quality spring wheat. There was per cent premium for No. 1 dark northern spring wheat quoted at Minneapolis \$1.62 to \$1.65 1/2. Lower grades were also firm. High protein Montana wheat advanced about 3 cents, being quoted at Minneapolis \$1.74 to \$1.82 1/2 which would compare in general with quotations of No. 1 northern Manitoba at Winnipeg at \$1.50. The demand for durum was steady with offerings only moderate. Prices were advanced about 1 1/2 cents for the week No. 1 amber being quoted at the close of the market March 30 at \$1.32 to \$1.37 at both Minneapolis and Duluth.

The corn continued firm influenced materially by the advance in the wheat market. Receipts were slightly larger at the principal markets and demand was only moderately active. Elevators desiring to dispose of their stocks before the germinating period were finding a limited outlet for their grain according to trade reports. Feeders and industries were the principal buyers and shipments from the central western markets were distributed over an unusually wide area ranging from the Atlantic to the Pacific coast and to the Gulf. At the close of the week No. 3 yellow corn was quoted at Kansas City at 93 to
