Senate Finance Committee Begins Work on \$290,000,000 Measure Passed by House

Apprehension Now Apparent

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, April 3.—Faced with warning from Secretary Mellon that the bill for the relief of the Rogers-Wells... will probably cost \$182,000,000 and not more than \$200,000,000, the senate finance committee... has agreed that it will not give its approval on the \$290,000,000 measure passed by the house.

Increased Expenditures

Income tax collections and other government receipts will hold up next year on the basis of the present estimate, the secretary informed the committee, but increased expenditures necessitate a paring down of the original limitation of \$225,000,000 set by the treasury last fall.

Instrumental in securing from the Utah Construction company's reduction of \$3000 in the price of freight. Why Mr. Nevson was the first witness at the hearing. He was interrogated by J. M. Lampert, Boise, attorney for the Idaho commission. Witnesses agreed that the Idaho contention is for reduction only on a distance basis to give to Southern Idaho the advantage of rate reductions commensurate with the reduction of more than 300 miles in distance between Twin Falls and San Francisco over the Oregon-Wells line compared with the route via Ogden. Witnesses were cross-examined for the railroad by attorneys: H. H. Omaha, assistant commercial counsel, and Dana T. Smith, Salt Lake, assistant general attorney for the Union Pacific, and A. J. White, San Francisco, attorney for the Southern Pacific.

PEACE WITH MEXICO
There is reason for much satisfaction in both countries, over the final settlement of the long old controversy between the United States and Mexico.

A remarkable thing has happened in the negotiations of the two governments. Note-writing stopped. Intelligent representatives of both countries got together in a spirit of good will to thrash out their differences and come to agreement on fundamental points which they had never previously been able to reach.

Each country yielded on some non-essentials. The Mexican supreme court helped by timely decisions upholding at the same time Mexican constitutional provisions and American rights. The Mexican Congress provided some friendly, clarifying legislation. It developed that Mexico never really meant to enact retroactive and confiscatory laws, never meant to take from American or other foreign investors any property rights which they really possessed.

So the confusing situation is now cleared, in a new set of oil regulations signed by the Mexican government. Those regulations are satisfactory to the United States government, and are held to give our investors adequate protection. American owners of oil-bearing properties will be credited to acquiesce.

Present owners of Mexican oil lands. It is agreed, never mind the oil on the ground, unless they took definite steps to extract it before the new constitution was adopted in nineteen hundred and seventeen. But apparently it is still possible for such owners to get out their oil, by adopting the proper procedure within a year.

According to Walter Lippman, writing from Mexico City, "The United States government has made up its mind that law and regulations protect every legitimate American right." That should end the matter. It is a "fortunate outcome" for two nations that must be friends.

DRY DRINK
This might be suspected of being propaganda for the coffee industry. If so, let the propaganda fall where it may. Professor Ralph H. Cheney of the biology department of New York University has been studying the effects of coffee on men and animals, with results cheering to coffee-lovers.

"The properly prepared beverage," he concludes, "is highly advantageous to over ninety per cent of normal individuals." It would take one hundred fifty cups to produce acute injury through caffeine poisoning to a normal person. He credits the coffee cup with producing mental effects of "amiability, good cheer and a sense of well-being" which "accrues with regular use." The physical effects, he says, are "non-injurious and gratifying." He speaks particularly of temporary relief from hunger and fatigue. "Coffee is a drug," he admits, but not a habit-former. "The quantity doesn't have to be increased. The drinker who likes his coffee weak continues to like it weak. It serves as a mild stimulant of heart, brain and muscles, thereby accomplishing greater power and coordination in the system and physical endeavors." There is an unwholesome reaction or let-down after the stimulation, as in the case of most stimulants. These facts have an obvious bearing on the liquor question. Coffee is a natural substitute for alcohol, and is

being liked to an ever-growing quantity since the outlawing of the liquor industry.

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FAIR-GROUNDS WILL GET BUILDING FOR POULTRY SHOW

County Lumber Orders Purchase of Lumber Before Budget Goes into Effect—Totals Unchanged—Alterations Made

No chance in the total amount set out for the final budget for Twin Falls county was made as a result of the work of the county commission and a few members of the advisory committee who remained until the close of the public hearing on the budget yesterday. The clerk was ordered to the department as accepted in accordance with the statute governing the case. Several changes in detail were made in the hospital and fair appropriations but the totals remained as in the tentative budget.

Over New Building

Frank Keenan, secretary of the fair board, reported that early estimates of revenues for the fair were likely to be found considerably too low. Construction of a poultry house and an addition to the office, doubling its size, which had been brought in, necessitated a change in the estimate. In his opinion, if the budget could be increased according to increased receipt estimates. It was pointed out that it was impossible to raise the total estimates of the preliminary budget.

L. Dan Connor, Democratic budget committee member, urged construction of the structures if possible. P. J. Prince, Republican budget committee member, said he believed the improvements should be made. He stated that the funds for the fair could be increased by the sale of the land. Lumber bids had already been received and if the board would order the purchase of the lumber and the purchase of a needed axe today it could be done under the present law. In the event that the receipts should be greater than the amount of the original estimates, it would mean a surplus. By adopting this budget the fair could be financed fully with the \$24,025 named in the preliminary budget. The board ordered the construction and ordered the purchase made.

Another Fair Building

A merchant fair building is provided for in the budget and will be constructed provided the merchants purchase space enough for two years. It is indicated that the expenditure is warranted. In the event that a merchant shall rent space for two years and later sell out, the space will be among his assets.

The site of the poultry exhibit building ordered erected will be 32 by 60 feet. The office will be doubled in size.

Feeding the Animals

Another shift in the fair preliminary budget was made by reducing the cost for care of animals from \$1000 to \$340. This was done in view of the fact that the land beside the race track will be planted in timothy this year and will supply feed for the race animals. The balance of \$660 was divided equally among pelting, extra private auto transportation and water maintenance. Total animal care cost last year was only \$554 with no timothy grown.

Cut Hospital Salary

Reduction of salary allowance in the hospital budget was made in the hospital budget. It was voted that this sum be set aside as a maximum expense for making of a four-year audit of the hospital books and business if a business continuity check was ordered to issue a call for bids for such audit.

Plan for providing extra and outside home for indigents making room for an indigent ward in the present building was suggested by Commissioner J. L. Mater. It is believed that there is material enough around the hospital and elsewhere owned by the county to make the needed improvements. Expenses with part cost of the hospital was discussed. It was felt that without definite information, the board could not safely cut the budget below present estimate.

Dean Ruby spoke to the entire class about the advantages of the small college. He also explained the system of selection employed by Whitman college in limiting its first year student enrollment.

Following the conference with the entire class, the dean and Mr. Pittman, a freshman at the college, met with a number of students who were particularly interested in Whitman college. In this session Dean Ruby and Mr. Pittman were questioned by the students, and Mr. Pittman told of his experiences in earning his own way through college and of the possibilities offered to students in that matter.
