

OWMAN GOING AROUND

Former Representative James W. Good Will Have Many of Powers of Manager; to Spend Most of His Time in Capital.

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, April 4.—As a step toward conducting a more effective presidential movement, former Representative James W. Good, Iowa, has joined the group of business men who are directing the campaign of the commerce secretary. He plans to spend most of his time in Washington until the next convention.

In a statement today Good, who at one time was chairman of the House appropriations committee, said that he was in charge of the management of the Coolidge pre-convention campaign, and he was in "no sense" to be "managing" for Mr. Hoover. It is understood, however, that he will have many of the powers of a manager.

Good is simply a volunteer with orders in an effort to aid the Republican nomination of Hoover for president when a great majority favor. Good explained in his statement, "There are and I believe there are many who are not as yet convinced that Mr. Hoover cannot and should not be drawn away from the campaign. He is fully conversed with his duties as secretary of commerce."

Good is a continuation of the Coolidge policy and no man knows those policies better or has had a larger share in their effect than has the secretary of commerce, Good declared. "His nomination will insure the continuation of the Coolidge policy like Coolidge, short on words and long on work and big in accomplishment."

The name of Senator Peas, Ohio, who was selected yesterday to be keynote speaker at the Republican convention in Kansas City, was drawn into the presidential picture during the day by Representative Thompson, Ohio. This was the first time before leaving for a vacation in Florida, that Mr. Peas was mentioned as a candidate for the nomination.

Senator Peas' selection as Republican keynote provoked the comment today from Senator Wheeler, Democrat of Montana, that he was an "Irish Republican keynoter."

MOVIES ENTER INTO FIELDS OF TELEPHOTO

Realm of "Spot" Newly Opened to Motion Pictures; Initial Demonstration Successful.

NEW YORK, April 4 (AP)—The "spot" news of the first demonstration of transmitting moving pictures regular by telephone. Ten feet of film, taken this morning in Chicago was put on the wires in New York and received in New York offices of the American Telephone and Telegraph company. It was explained that the New York office had received simultaneous telephoto with New York by the six other telephone offices of the company, situated in Boston, Chicago, Atlanta, St. Louis, Los Angeles and San Francisco.

The pictures were transmitted at the rate of seven minutes for each foot and a half of film, the 10-foot strip with some intermission being transmitted in something less than two hours.

Alicia News Beels, Communist, said the telephoto movies was expected to affect chiefly the news report companies which in the past have had to depend on newspaper correspondents for their pictures.

The cost of the new service will be approximately a foot of film sent by any one of the eight telephone offices at all the other seven.

BORAH COLLECTIONS MAY GO FOR MINERS Fund for Purging of Republican Party May be Turned Over to Destitute Workers.

WASHINGTON, April 4 (AP)—Money raised by Senator Borah, Idaho, in his campaign to purge the Republican Party of the contributions of Harry F. Sinclair, which now amounts to more than \$200,000, may be turned over to the destitute miners.

Responding to the suggestion of Mrs. D. P. Langworthy, president of the Chicago Women's club, the Idaho senator said he had communicated with a number of the contributors to the fund and that they were agreeable. He will try to reach all of the contributors.

Will Continue Collection Senator Borah said he would continue to collect money from members of the Republican party and then probably will consult with Republican leaders at the state Republican convention as to raising the remainder.

"While we deeply appreciate your splendid effort to pay off a debt of honor which states the Republican party," Mrs. Langworthy telegraphed to the senator, "I do not believe the money contributed should be returned to Sinclair because he is not entitled to any restoration whatever."

Offer Suggestion "We therefore respectfully suggest that with the consent of the subscribers you turn over the fund to a body of men who are doing the best for the poverty stricken families of the Pennsylvania coal miners or to some other destitute group of the nation."

"We sincerely believe that the use of the contributed money for such a humanitarian purpose is the best and greatest possible statement the Republican party could make for the cause of the poverty stricken."

In his reply Senator Borah said: "I am glad to consult parties in the coal fields of Pennsylvania and West Virginia. The situation in the coal mines is almost intolerable and it is my duty to do what I can to help."

BOURBOIS FIGHTING FOR \$200,000-000

WASHINGTON, April 4 (AP)—The Republican majority of the Senate Finance Committee lined up solidly behind Senator Mellon's tax reduction program today, but the Democrats of the committee in a meeting held today decided to fight for a \$200,000,000 slash in minimum.

After voting unanimously to report a tax reduction bill of some nature, the committee agreed to the proposal of Senator Mellon to cut the 13 1/2 percent corporation tax only to 12 percent rather than 11 1/2 percent.

Democrats opposed this and asked for a larger figure but both proposals were rejected on strictly party lines.

Under the \$200,000,000 program argued to the minority conference today, the Democrats would reduce the 11 percent corporate rate to 10 percent.

The administration strongly opposes repeal of the automobile tax which is the rate and Secretary Mellon insisting this is demanded largely by the manufacturers.

The committee also decided to ask for a 3 percent auto levy in order to permit the automobile manufacturers to present their case and give the number of congressmen of the United States an opportunity to answer Mr. Mellon.

GERMAN PLANE READY TO FLY ON SHORT NOTICE; CAN CRUISE 4500 MILES

DUBLIN, April 4 (AP)—The German plane in the wings of the German plane, Bremen, were filled today, and the aircraft was pronounced ready to fly on short notice.

Authorities at Baldern airport said, however, that they do not expect to see the aircraft before the end of the week.

Twin Falls Batter Defeats Kid Rupert in Second Sleep Producer in Second.

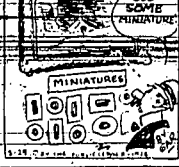

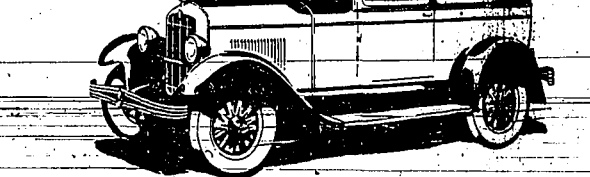

What Idaho needs most is the friendly co-operation of the Railroad interests in the development of this entire section of Idaho and Nevada, along the line of general railroad service, with a rate schedule which will enable this section to gain a reasonable degree of benefit from its natural advantages.

There can be no justifiable quarrel with the contention that Southern Idaho is entitled to, and should have advantage in the rate reduction made by the Rogerson-Wellis line in the distance to and from Coast centers.
