Nebraska Metropolis Is Kept in Touch With World by Way of Radio and Wireless; Snow Falls Heavy in Broad Area.

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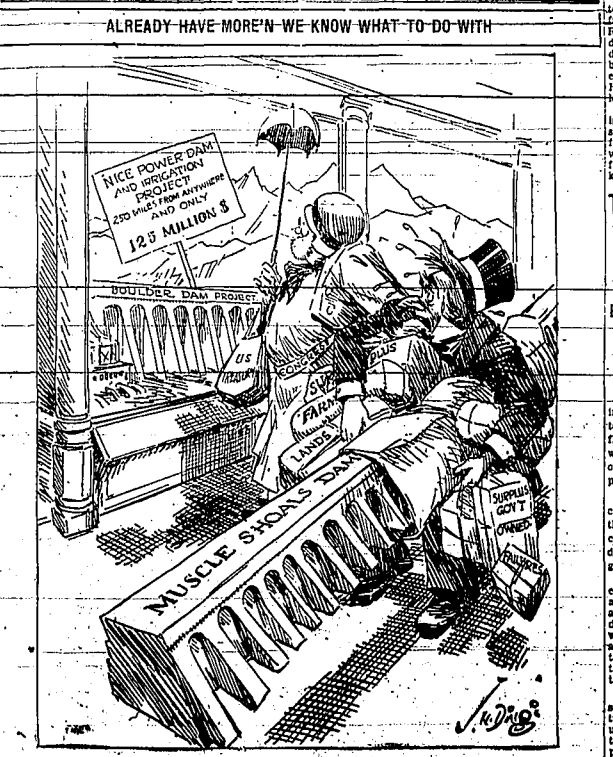

THE LONGEST FLIGHT. More aviation progress is registered by the achievement of Edward Braddock and George Hamilton, in bringing the airplane endurance record back to the United States.

Not that the possession of the record itself is important, aviation, like science, is international. It would be just as significant if pilots of any other nationality succeeded in remaining in the air continuously for fifty-three hours, thirty-six minutes and thirty seconds.

Every time this endurance record is pushed a little higher, man's mastery of the air increases just so much, extending the range of flight. If a plane can fly for fifty-three hours and a half on an oval course thirty miles long, it can fly other things being equal, for a similar length of time in a straight line.

No hop over land or sea of such duration has yet been made. It exceeds the time from New York to Paris by many hours. A little more speed in planes capable of carrying fuel for the flight, and the Pacific might be bridged in that time.

SECOND IN ROME. King Victor Emmanuel of Italy is said to be thinking of abdication. He may try first some aggressive step to restore the Italian constitution to working order. Then if that fails, as it probably will, he may step down.

CELESTIAL BALLYHOOD. A thirty-day aerial advertising campaign is being conducted in southern Illinois, in the form of a national plan worked out by manufacturing companies with a net gain in publicity.

Two aviators in a big plane fly over small towns, addressing the inhabitants from the sky, setting forth the merits of their goods through a loud-speaker.

"Sky-writing" has been tried, and apparently discarded. It will soon be known whether this new method has more appeal. The idea is sensational enough. It is as if the angel Gabriel were to appear and address a whole city through his doomsday trumpet.

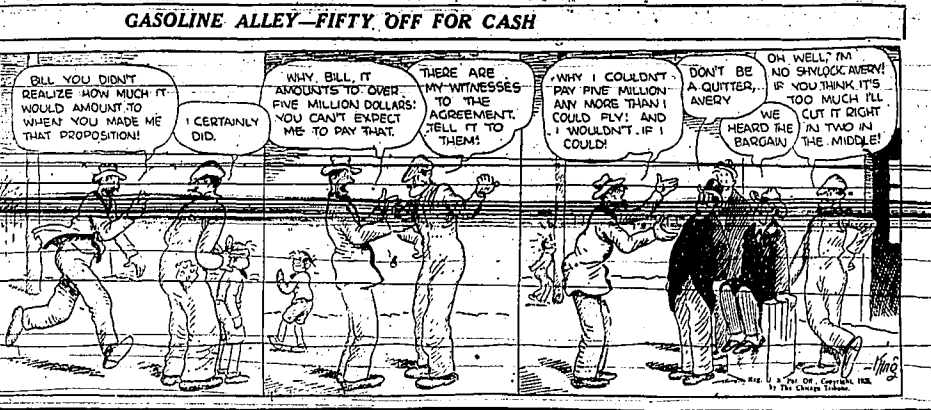

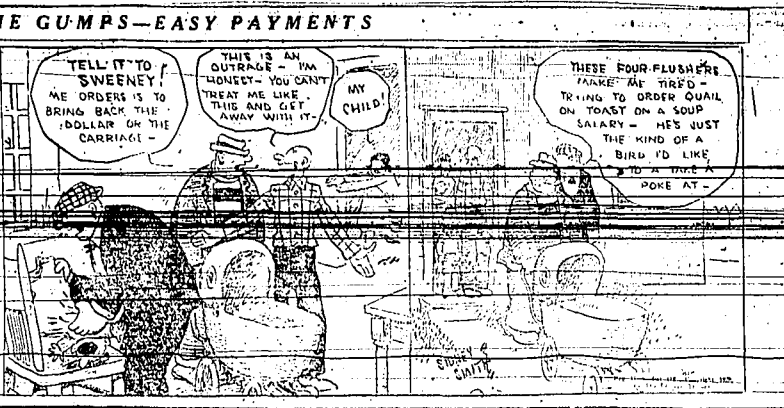
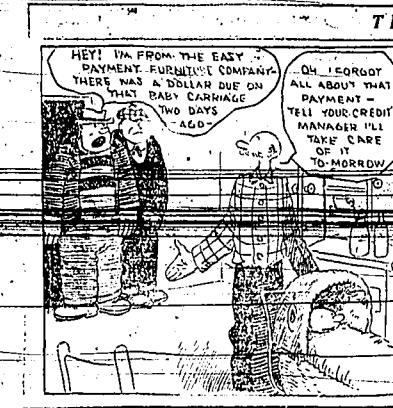

CHAMBER APPROVES DEFINITE PLAN FOR TWIN FALLS AIRPORT

Investment of Less Than \$7000 Necessary to Provide Standard Commercial Landing Field With Many Advantages

A definite proposition for establishment of a standard commercial airport at Twin Falls has been approved by Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce directors in session last evening.

The proposition, which represents the result of many weeks investigation on the part of a committee headed by F. W. Waring and involves an investment of less than \$7000, consists in the purchase of 34.3 acres of land located on the south side of the Lakes boulevard, approximately 1/2 mile and a half miles north of Twin Falls. Purchase price of the property at the rate of \$190 an acre, is to be approximately \$6513. This price is regarded as being low for the acreage involved and its proximity to Twin Falls, and membership of the committee and the directors accord to Mr. Waring and full credit for an unusual opportunity now presented to give Twin Falls a satisfactory airport.

The site, it was stated, was selected after investigation of a number of proposed locations.

At the meeting, approved by general representatives, and favorable reports has been given on it by W. E. Kaine, Salt Lake, executive of the department of commerce airways.

Commenting on the proposition, Mr. Kaine said "in a letter recently received he stated that he is very pleased to see this office to note the spirit behind the promotion of this airport and he believed that it would be successful in obtaining it, that the city as a whole will benefit thereby."

Only minor improvements in the proposed location were recommended by the engineer. There is natural drainage. It is pointed out that the call, being of a sandy formation, will not become muddy in any season.

Surveys of the proposed airport have been completed, providing for an east and west runway 2600 feet long and 240 feet wide, and a north and south runway to be used only in an infrequent emergency, 1000 feet long and 250 feet wide.

Advantages of a commercial airport, such as proposed to be established here, are that it may be used for private or commercial airplane operators, Government emergency fields, such as are being considered for the route between Salt Lake and Boise, are available for use only in emergencies, it is stated, and are not to be used by private or commercial airplane operators.

In line with progress impetus to the movement for establishment of a commercial airport in Twin Falls has been given recently by the present showing rapid development of airplane transportation. In this connection, the committee and directors referred last evening to announcements of plans for a 30-days tour to be made by a party of aeronauts leaving Washington next month with a stop at Boise on its itinerary, and also to announcement of the formation of an air passenger line with headquarters at Portland operating planes on the Pacific coast and as far east as Chicago with New York as an eventual destination.

In 1908 Miss Sprague graduated from the Deaconess Training School of the Episcopal church at Philadelphia and from that date until her death she has been active in identifying with the work of the church in various capacities. Her first position following graduation was at Buffalo, New York, where she was engaged in settlement work, later being transferred to Hartford, Connecticut, where she remained for several years as Deaconess and parish worker in that church.

She followed the fall of the late Bishop Huston to the Idaho mission field in 1915 and has ever since resided in this state.

Miss Sprague assisted in establishing the work of the church in Boise, being sent there to Boise where she took charge of a local mission later she spent a year at the Indian mission at Fort Hall, returning to Boise with the outbreak of the first influenza epidemic in 1918.

Miss Sprague joined the staff of St. Luke's hospital as a volunteer worker and nurse where she served throughout the period of the outbreak. It was immediately following this period that her health first began to show signs of breaking and she was confined in an operation from which she never fully recovered. She resided here for a few years, however, and had completed two years of service at Wallace, Idaho, and was stationed at St. Maria when she suffered the attack which, in December, 1926, brought her active career to a close. On December 1, Miss Sprague was in Spokane for the purchase of Christmas supplies in connection with the church Christmas program when she was stricken with encephalitis or sleeping sickness. She was brought to Boise at the end of a few weeks and taken at once to St. Luke's hospital where she remained up to the time of her death.

Among the immediate surviving relatives of Miss Sprague's family are her two brothers, George P. Sprague of Twin Falls and Jesse B. Sprague, well known magazine contributor of New York. There are a number of relatives in the home of her mother, Mrs. W. A. Babcock, at near LeRoy, New York.
