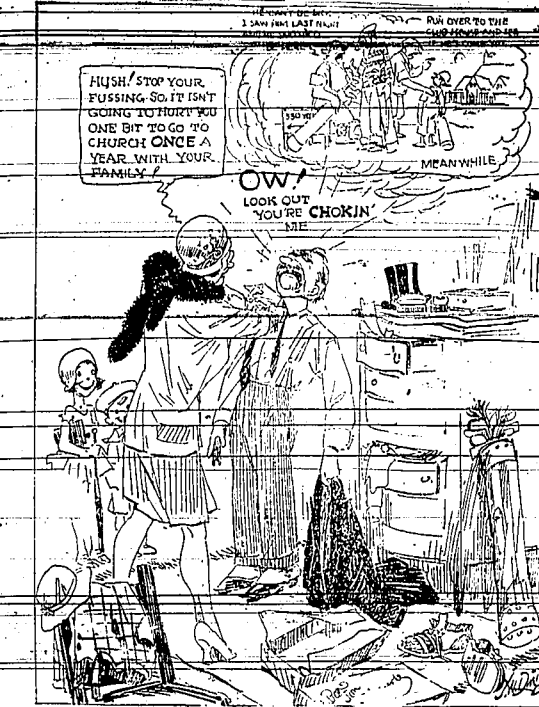

TOKYO, Sunday morning April 8 (AP)—The French aviators, Coates and Lebriz, hopped off at 7:25 this morning on the last of a long non-stop flight to Hanoi, capital of French Indo-China.

The distance from Tokyo to Hanoi is approximately 2500 miles. An airline between the two cities would save many hours of travel toward the full length of the Japanese archipelago, across the East China sea, and along the coast of China, to the French colony, less than half of the distance.

BOURBONS MAY HAVE PROHIBITION PLANK

TEXAS DEMOCRATIC LEADERS AT 'HARMONY' CONFERENCE GO ON RECORD FOR 'DRY' LAW PLANK

DALLAS, Texas, April 7 (AP)—Texas Democratic leaders at a "Harmony" conference today agreed on a record in favor of a strong prohibition plank in the national platform and recommended that the state's delegates be instructed to vote for presidential candidates who support such a plank.

Governor Al Smith, New York, served as the largest speaker from several speakers, including Governor Dan Moody, Texas, who had voiced his opposition to the candidacy of the New York executive.

His candidacy, as expounded by his chief supporters, is based upon the belief that it is opposed to prohibition and upon the theory that his opposition to prohibition will carry certain votes which would otherwise be Republican, said Governor Moody.

In other words, it is the hope of his candidacy to produce a result in the Republican party, as against which he had hoped to have a threatened revolution within the Democratic party in the South.

Wants Binding Plank "I am sure that the attitude of prohibition would obscure the main issue, that of the national platform," said Governor Moody.

M. M. Crane, Dallas, who delivered the keynote speech declared he wanted a platform which would bind the federal government to prohibition enforcement.

Bennett, Vermont secretary of agriculture, believes that the normal forces of nature plus good farming practices will restore the fertility of Vermont from the mere floods of Vermont from the mere floods that have poured over them by the regions of the Vermont mountains.

FARMERS WELCOME TREE LIFE ON ONCE DESOLATE PRAIRIES

Science of Arboriculture Purposes Now to Work Its Magic in the Treeless Area of the Southwest, Residents United.

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, April 7.—With thousands of shelter belts and windbreaks to be erected in the treeless Great Plains region, the science of arboriculture purposes now to work its magic in the treeless areas of the Southwest.

Working with the government's district experiment station at Mandan, N. Dak., Iowa, has been making studies to provide tree life on the prairie. Interest has spread to southern Colorado, Nebraska, Texas, Oklahoma, Arizona and New Mexico, all of which would be affected by the drier-belt, passed by the Indians and sent to the senate, authorizing an appropriation of \$100,000 for experimental work in the growing of trees.

Explaining that the absence of trees is an important matter to the farmer of the plains, George Wilson, associate arboriculturist at the Mandan station, declares limited rainfall and periods of drought are the chief obstacles to overgrowth.

These species of trees have been planted in every region. With the presence of tree life in a limited form on the banks of larger streams, the number of trees appear on higher elevations, and levels, giving rise to the theory that arboriculture and protection of prairie fires will provide favorable conditions for tree life in the Southwest.

Introduction of fruit trees is considered a secondary measure, chief concern centering around development of overgrowth for shelter belt planting. It is believed that a fringe of trees on the windward side of a field will go far in protecting crops from the sand storms, that sometimes slash tender plants, that farm buildings will be protected from wind velocity by strategic shelter belts and that the hot winds of summer may be deflected from dwellings that are guarded by closely planted windbreaks.

Experiment Forest Before practical plantings can be made in the Southwest, arboriculturists say, it will be necessary to determine, through a series of experiments, the type of trees best suited to that can be adapted to the territory and what conditions of soil and climate must be overcome or corrected to meet tree requirements.

COSSACK AND GRIMM VARIETIES BOTH GOOD

University Field Agronomist Declines to Give Advantage to One Alfalfa Over Other.

FOUR said there is considerable discussion in various sections of the alfalfa industry of the merits of the two varieties of alfalfa, both from the standpoint of hay and seed production, according to L. D. Rader, assistant field agronomist and seed commander of the University of Idaho Experiment Station, who has just conducted a series of meetings with the certified alfalfa seed growers of the state. This is especially true in the South-Central region in the vicinity of Weadell.

A number of growers claim that the Cossack variety is superior in quality of hay produced, more winter hardy than Grimm and produces larger yields of seed. However, Rader is of the opinion that the Cossack variety is far as to state that if a stack of Grimm hay and one of Cossack were cut and fed to a cow, the hay of the Cossack variety and not the Grimm so long as any of the former variety remained to be fed.

FOUNDER OF KU KLUX KLAN JOINS IN SUIT

William J. Simmons, Files De-position Supporting Action for Receiver's Appointment.

PITTSBURGH, April 7.—Charles H. Evans, receiver for the Ku Klux Klan, filed today a deposition in support of his claim that he is entitled to have a receiver appointed for the Klan.

The receivership suit, a counter-action filed after the Klan had asked that the former members be reinstated into the Klan, will be called up in court Monday. The former members ask that a receiver be named and that the Klan account for all money collected in the state. The Klan, asking the restraining order, sought \$100,000 damages from the receiver.

Evans and charged that Evans was not the receiver of the Klan but that persons connected with Evans had sought to take his life. He said that Phil Fox, publicity agent for Evans, had attempted to assassinate him the day before Fox killed Captain W. C. Connor, Atlanta attorney.

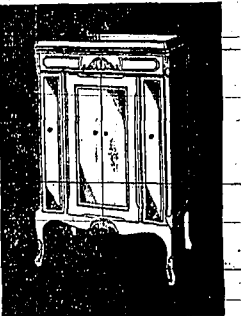

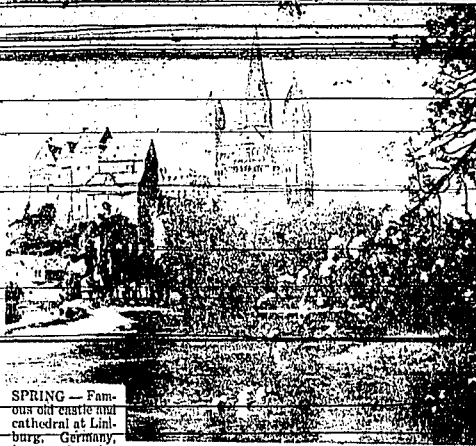

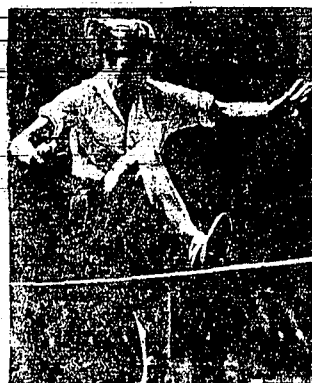

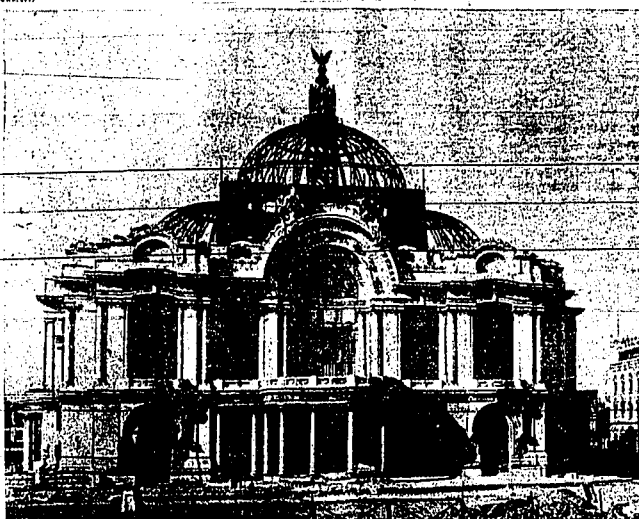

PERHAPS the most interesting story in connection with the marketing of Studebakers which has yet come to light in the State is presented in the record of the James A. Stanger family, whose members, since the year 1918, when they bought their first car, have purchased seventeen of these cars of various types, and during the same period have never owned any other make of machine.

Mr. and Mrs. James A. Stanger are widely and favorably known farmers residing near Hansen and around them on various farms live the sons and daughters with their families. In all, the Stanger families now own eight Studebakers.

Purchase of the first car was made in 1918 when Will and Bert Stanger bought a "Big Six" from the Barrett Auto Company and Mr. Barrett instructed the young men in the business of driving the car. They used this machine during the Spring and Summer months, at which time an additional car was called for by the family needs. Two cars of the "Light Six" were then purchased, the Barrett Company taking in trade the original "Big Six" which was then sold to Jack Stanger.

In the year 1920 a "Special Six" was sold to the head of the family, James A. Stanger and his wife, and in 1921 Lawrence Stanger added to the family fleet by the purchase of a "Light Six."

In 1925 two more Studebakers were delivered to members of the family, and in 1927 three used and one new machine were added, the latter being purchased by Will Stanger, the Barrett Auto Company taking in exchange the original "Big Six" sold in 1918.

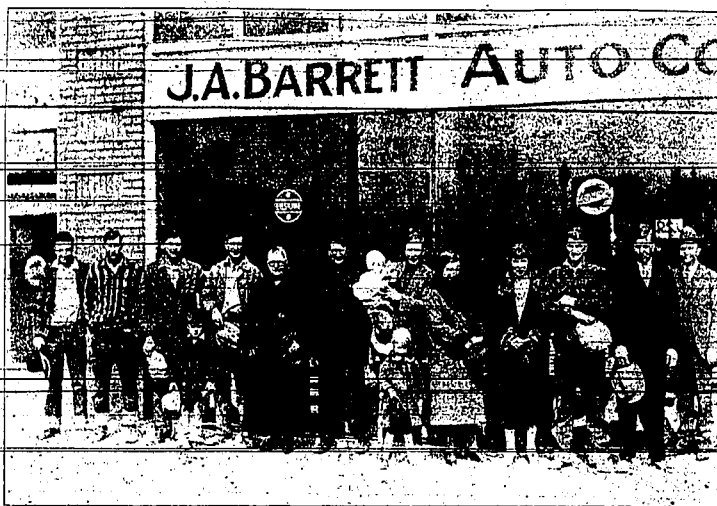
So far during this year, three used Studebakers have been delivered, one to Bert on a deal which brought back to the Company the first of the "Light Six" machines sold in the family in 1918.

This last car is now on display at the Barrett Company show-rooms, with motor and body in almost perfect condition and the entire machine in almost first class running shape.

In connection with this remarkable record it will be noticed that many of the seventeen cars purchased were used machines, sold under the Studebaker guarantee and with the personal endorsement of the Barrett organization added.

The fact that, year after year, members of the family have confined their purchases exclusively to Studebaker machines is referred to by Mr. Barrett as one of the most gratifying features of his business and the satisfaction which has gone hand in hand with every transaction has served to emphasize as nothing else could the soundness and fairness of the used car selling plan in use by the Company in its "used car" business.

IT IS A far cry to the days when W. E. Aaron in the year 1916 became the first Studebaker agent in Twin Falls and vicinity, selling the Studebaker car exclusively in connection with the practice of his profession as a dentist.

But long before that, John A. Barrett, head of the Barrett Auto Company, was a Studebaker employe, and even during the two years in which Dr. Aaron operated as Agent, Mr. Barrett was the distributor of the machines in this section of Southern Idaho. When, in 1915, the great Studebaker Corporation decided to go out of the vehicle and harness business, a reorganization was effected clear down the line and in the Twin Falls country this resulted in Mr. Barrett taking over the retail end of the automobile business. In that year the Barrett Auto Company was organized and has ever since been operated in the exclusive interests of the Studebaker line of cars, with Mr. Barrett as the head of the business and the moving spirit of the entire Studebaker enterprise.

At the time of entering the automobile business, Mr. Barrett had been in the employ of the Studebaker Corporation for exactly 18 years, and 13 days. He began work as a collector at Montpelier as a boy and in course of time became branch manager there. Later he was sent to Logan, Utah, as manager of the Studebaker branch there, and at the end of two years he was promoted to the position of Manager of what was known as the Snake River Valley district, with headquarters in Twin Falls, where he arrived in 1911 with his family.

Up to 1916 the Studebaker Corporation manufactured wagons, buggies and vehicles of all kinds, together with the various sidelines appertaining. For some time before this however, experiments in the field of automotive transportation had been carried on and Studebaker cars were actually on the market long before this. Up to the year 1918, the automobile business was operated in connection with the old Studebaker lines but at that time the Corporation formally dropped the vehicle end of the business and thereafter engaged exclusively in the manufacture and sale of Studebaker automobiles.

Since 1918 "Studebakers" have been handled exclusively in this territory by the Barrett Auto Company. From a comparatively small beginning the business has grown into one of the most important of all Western Studebaker agencies. There has never been a change in management or in policy and the growing number of Studebaker cars in use in this territory serves to testify to the character of the service given and the quality of the product sold.
