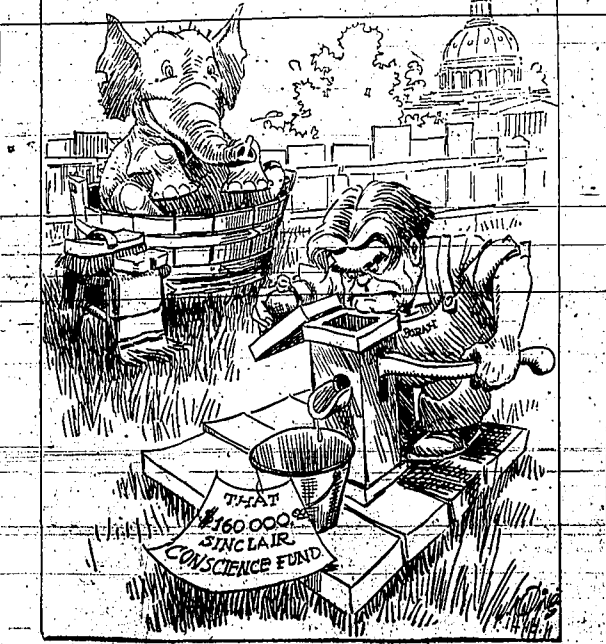

1924 Gift Tax Act Is Not Retroactive

Expressions Sunday at the meetings of the league directors indicate that the U-S circuit faces its most prosperous season. Salt Lake will open in Ogden and Pocatello will journey to Boise for the opening day.

Every club was represented at the meeting. J. G. Dirkes, sports editor of the Salt Lake Tribune, represented Salt Lake and pointed the \$500 forfeit money for that club. Tom Lewis represented Ogden. A. Anderson spoke for the Pocatello Danmacks, while Ray McKelge represented the Boise club. Jesse Richards led the proxy for Boise and Dr. D. L. Alexander spoke for Twin Falls.

No Split Season

The most important piece of business transacted was the adopting of the schedule which runs for three-day stands and no split season. No club will be away from home longer than a week and half and no home series will last longer than a week and a half.

On Memorial day Twin Falls will be in Idaho Falls. Ogden will be in Pocatello and Boise at Salt Lake.

Fourth of July will see Twin Falls playing at home with Salt Lake-Pocatello at Boise and Ogden at Idaho Falls.

Donner day Twin Falls will be in Salt Lake, Idaho Falls at Ogden and Boise at Pocatello.

Labor day will see Twin Falls closing the season in Boise, Idaho Falls will close at Pocatello and Salt Lake at Ogden.

Assurance that Salt Lake is ready to go was given by Mr. Dirkes. He stated that the former Bees will probably open in a new park and if the new park is not complete the state fair grounds are available. The club will be incorporated this week and the drive for the sale of tickets will be "under way."

NEW WATER RATE ORDINANCE GIVEN INITIAL READING

Increase of About Fifty Per Cent Inside City Limits and Higher Percentage Outside; Minimum Delivery Raised

Minimum water rates within the city limits of Twin Falls will be \$16.40 a month, gross, for 6000 gallons, instead of \$11.11, for 4000 gallons as at present, and users outside the city limits will be charged \$2.50 a month, instead of \$1.11 as at present, should the water rate ordinance which was read at its first reading on Monday night.

Estimate of Revenue The total revenue as estimated by Len A. Chapin, commissioner of water works, is \$200,000 a year from 6000 users inside the city limits, \$250,000 from outside water users, \$15,000 from extra gallons, \$1784.82 from sprinkling and flushing and \$1108.92 from city parks and beds. Revenues necessary to cover the water works investments and expenses would be \$62,500 a year, and estimated deficit of \$133,500. Under the present system gross revenue is \$142,000.

May Be Slightly Variation It is pointed out by Mr. Chapin that there may be greater expenses in replacements that would add to gross expenses, and increase the deficit or the revenue may be increased by a number of customers, with decrease of expenses due to combination of services now in operation, which would wipe the small estimated deficit entirely.
