BURLEY OBJECTS TO NORTH SIDE ROUTING FOR STATE HIGHWAY

J. D. Wood, Commissioner of Public Works, Discusses Proposition for Changing Course of Old Oregon Trail

BURLEY, April 10—Joe D. Wood, commissioner of public works, after addressing 75 members of the Burley Chamber of Commerce at a meeting Monday evening, listened to a spirited discussion of the respective merits of improved highway on the North and South sides of Snake river.

Mr. Wood stated that among other contemplated road improvements for the coming season there would be over 250 miles of culing. He said that the Oregon Trail, from Pocatello to Burley, would be practically "all oiled" between the stretches of paved surfacing lying between those two cities. Even at Burley, however, he said there would be no oiling, and he gave little hope of any work to be taken upon the Highway between the Snake and American Falls.

New Route Considered

Work on the highway east of Burley, he said, would be left in abeyance until it is determined whether the road will be continued on to American Falls by way of Rupert and Minidoka, and thence along the railroad. It was stated, he said, that by abandoning the Oregon Trail as an improved road and building a new highway along the railroad east from Minidoka, there would be a "trailing of four miles in justice." This saving, he stated, would justify the expenditure of \$400,000 on new road building. Mr. Wood further stated that at a meeting he had just attended in Rupert it developed that those living on the North Side were strongly in favor of the proposed highway along the railroad. It was the wisest of all communities concerned in the question.

Many South Side residents have their views, after Mr. Wood's talk, in developing that the South Side residents were unanimously in favor of retaining the Old Oregon Trail as the main highway.

In answer to a question, Mr. Wood announced that \$200 would be spent on surfacing the Strevell-Dial road which will travel the coming season, and \$3000 for grading and culing. More would be spent later on this highway, if available.

NATION'S BIGGEST SPOON PRODUCTION IN PROSPECT

Idaho Department of Agriculture Puts Out Information Indicating Crop Increase.

BOISE, April 10—Reports indicate the potato acreage of the United States will be increased 12 per cent in 1928. Based on the 1927 yield the crop will yield 600,000 bushels. This information is put out by the Idaho department of agriculture based on reports submitted by the United States bureau of agricultural economics.

The largest increase in acreage seems to be in the Southern and Central western states. Reports from Idaho and Pacific coast states show about the same acreage as in 1927, but that is a 15 per cent increase over previous years. A few reports show a slight decrease. Main and New Hampshire report an increase of about 10 per cent. Vermont shows no increase. Massachusetts 8 per cent, while Connecticut shows about a normal acreage.

The heavier commercial production states of the east show a marked increase. New York has an increase of 10 per cent, Pennsylvania 11 per cent, Michigan 10 per cent, Wisconsin 10 per cent, and North Dakota 16 per cent. Smaller late commercial states show 9 per cent increase, and late commercial average of 11 per cent. Fourteen of the southern states show 11 per cent increase of early production.

Recent killing frosts are reported to have injured the early crop in Texas and some other sections from 25 to 50 per cent. Severe cold rains are preventing planting in other territory so these predictions may vary somewhat.

However, the reported area will show an increase of 27 per cent over the 1925 crop and 18 per cent larger than 1924. This acreage promises to be the largest since the summer of 1922, and with the average yield of 1927, it will produce a crop which may average 100 per cent more than the whole country. If the growers will plant a smaller acreage, use only the best seed, give better cultural treatments to the crop, they can produce a better quality crop, and at the same time reduce the unit cost, and make it possible for growers, dealers and everybody touching the crop to get a profit out of the deal.

Increased acreage with encouraging the use of prophylactic seed by growers not killed in the best handling of the crop, and a large percentage of fertilizer also is the result.

Where growers think of the profits in the past three years, they should not forget the 1916-1918 period.

The blight does not strike the crops of Maine, Pennsylvania and other eastern manufacturing states every year. Neither does the middle west area experience a severe drought all years, which are facts to be considered.

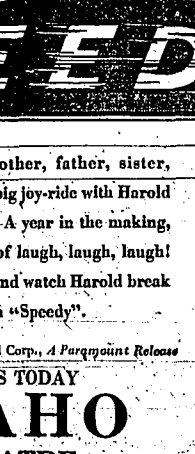

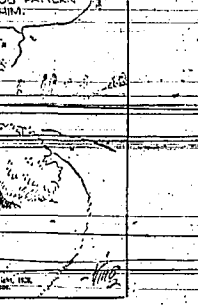

SALMON ELIMINATION REPORT IS RECEIVED AT BOARD MEETING

Wherely Segregation May Be Reduced by Sale of Bonds and Cutting Out Extra Lands.

In the event that at least one hundred acres in the region, \$25,000 bonds are to be issued for the elimination of lands on the Salmon, segregation can be effected. The plan, presented at the meeting last evening, is to sell bonds for the purpose of purchasing the lands to be eliminated. The report was received and discussed at the meeting. Another meeting will be held in less than a week at which the matter will be more fully entered into. It is stated, as buyers can be secured.

Supreme Court Rules The report was based on the opinion of the supreme court in the case of S. A. Stinson against the Salmon River Canal company, a federal suit brought to test the validity of the proposed bond sale. The result of the issue was upheld by Judge Hunt. A writ of habeas corpus was granted on appeal, reversing the district court's opinion in regard to limitation of assessment to the way carrying out the project, but on review it is held that reasonable assessments can be made under the maintenance statute, sufficient to take care of the \$25,000 issue.

The moment was started for the purpose of reducing the area of Salmon vegetation sufficiently to insure an ample supply of water for the cultivated land. Options were given on about 700 acres. Three residents of the segregation, who had given options, brought action to set them aside on the ground that the time fixed for taking them up had expired. Should this be the attitude of many signers it might defeat the object of the movement. It is felt.
