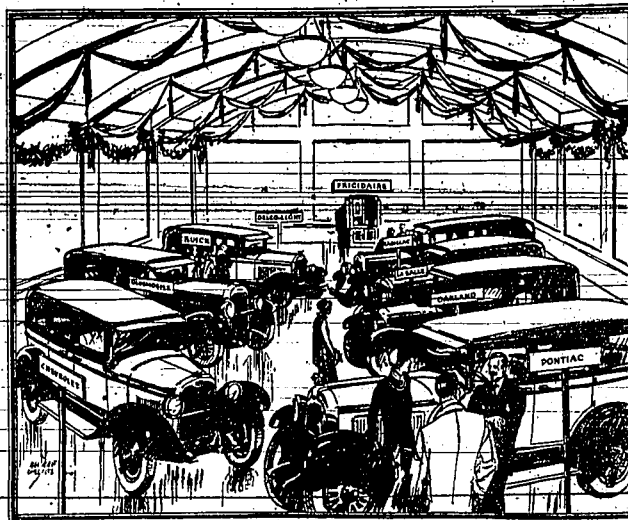

VETERANS' BILL GETS REPORTED FAVORABLY

Johnson Measure to Broaden Scope of 1924 Act Has Approval of House Committee

WASHINGTON, April 11 (AP)—The House committee on the bill to broaden the scope of the 1924 World War veterans' act reported favorably to the House today by the veterans' committee. It is additional to attempting to iron out various insurance difficulties, the measure would remove the time limit on claims of disabled former service men for compensation and seek to remove various other alleged undesirable features of the old law. Under the insurance provisions, all former service men in good health would be permitted to apply for converted insurance of those having converted insurance, would be allowed to change their policies to lower premium life insurance. The measure also would permit the designation of any beneficiary the veteran desired and would set up a federal statute of limitations of five years to govern the filing of insurance suits. The bill seeks to cure the cause of numerous complaints of the effects of the present "total permanent disability" insurance clause by making eligible for total insurance disability benefits all persons who have been totally disabled for 12 months. Insane veterans, having neither wife nor child, would have their compensation raised from \$30 to \$30 a month and all widowed veterans would receive \$30 monthly.

WHEAT PRICES SOAR: REPORT RESPONSIBLE

Closing Quotations Buoyant at Virtually Day's Highest Figures; Some Price Advancements

CHICAGO, April 11 (AP)—In a session which was characterized by a bullish atmosphere, the backward condition of the 1928 domestic wheat crop officially reported from Washington was widely recognized for stampeding the market and for holding prices to above normal levels.

Closing quotations on wheat were buoyant at virtually the day's highest figures, 4 1/2 to 5 1/2 cent advance with corn 1/2 to 3/4 cent up, oats showing a 1/2 to 3/4 cent gain and provisions varying from 1/2 decline to a rise of 1/2 cent.

Right from the outset wheat was in urgent demand and initial trading showed a general price jump amounting to about 1/2 cent, which was met with a word of caution to realize profits but the reaction continued proved to be slight and some of the market's early trading was done.
