THROUGH MINNESOTA; ZERO THROUGH NEBRASKA

Mercury Drops Low; Unpaved Highways Softened by Thaw; Unseasonal Storm Sweeps in From Southwest—Rain First.

LOS ANGELES TO TAP COLORADO RIVER TO END LONG STRUGGLE

Twenty Year Fight for Water Brought to Climax by Collapse of St. Francis Dam City Faces Gigantic Task.

(By The Associated Press) LOS ANGELES, April 14.—A 20-year fight for water planned by the St. Francis dam disaster, the city of Los Angeles is prepared to face the consequences unflinchingly, but not admit defeat in the campaign for an adequate water supply.

The council has admitted the city's moral responsibility for the havoc wrought in the recent flood and has expressed regret for making wrongheaded decisions.

While the city is considering whether a new effort will be made to impound water on the site of the reservoir which collapsed, prospects of tapping the mighty Colorado river have assumed a greater importance.

If a dam at Boulder canyon or elsewhere is authorized by congress, Los Angeles plans to build a super-artery to a mammoth reservoir on the stream that borders the state on the east. More than 200 miles of pipe lines and canals would be required, with a series of relay reservoirs, but the total cost to many millions, is not the matter to a city which has already reached out more than 200 miles for the life-giving fluid.

The long struggle of Los Angeles for adequate water sources to date has constantly increasing needs to date. It has equalled in history for the bitterness and violence of the opposition engaged in it, and it is not clear that its people's hearts have been softened.

When the community began its rapid growth two decades ago the problem of a domestic water supply became a matter of life and death. William Mulholland, the first engineer, was run out across desert and mountains.

The Los Angeles aqueduct—a waterway of huge steel pipe and open conduits 200 miles long—was to tap the Owens river in Inyo county.

But with the water that was found in the Owens valley, the city had its troubles galore. The water rights in Owens valley were purchased, but the resultant drying up of the lands precipitated violence.

Dream of Frederick Brainerd Bridgeman, Brought to Fulfillment in South Africa in Institution Under International

(By The Associated Press) BOZEMAN, April 14.—The dream of Frederick Brainerd Bridgeman, noted American missionary to Africa, has been brought to fulfillment at Johannesburg, South Africa, through the efforts of the American-Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions.

BOISE, April 14 (AP)—County sheriffs have not the right to free prisoners from the county jail before their sentences have been served, and because Great V. Mason did that while he was sheriff of Canyon county, his ouster from the job was proper, the Idaho supreme court ruled today.

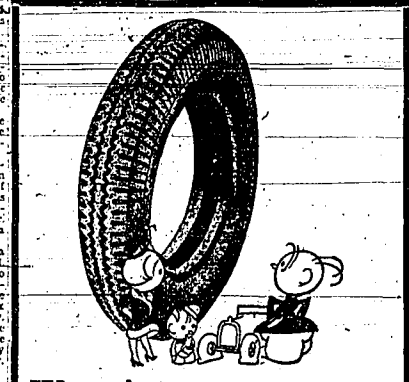

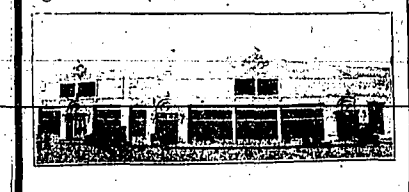

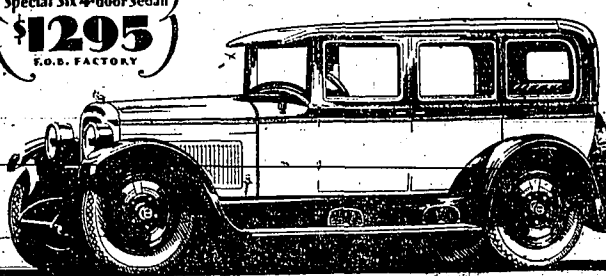

FARM FIRES TOTAL THIRD OF ALL LOSS.

Conflagrations in Burd. Sections During Year Take Big Toll in Lives and Property.

WASHINGTON, April 14 (AP)—A report issued by the Bureau of Census says that the total loss in lives and property in the United States during 1927 was \$1,250,000,000.

Federal estimate fixes the figure at approximately 3,500 lives and property valued at \$150,000,000.

"This deplorable wastage," the report says, "is even greater than those figures indicate for the reason that food supplies are destroyed, farm families are left homeless, painful productive operations on the farm are retarded and potential manufactured products of value are lost."

The principal known causes of farm fires are listed as follows: Lightning, \$21,500,000; defective chimneys and flues, \$20,115,000; sparks on combustible roofs, \$12,150,000; careless use of matches, smoking, \$9,200,000; constant lightning, \$7,575,000; careless use and storage of gasoline and kerosene, \$6,930,000; improper installation, operation and maintenance of heating equipment, \$6,860,000; faulty wiring for electricity and improper use of electrical appliances, \$1,215,000.

Approximately 43 per cent of the total fire loss is ascribed to unknown causes.

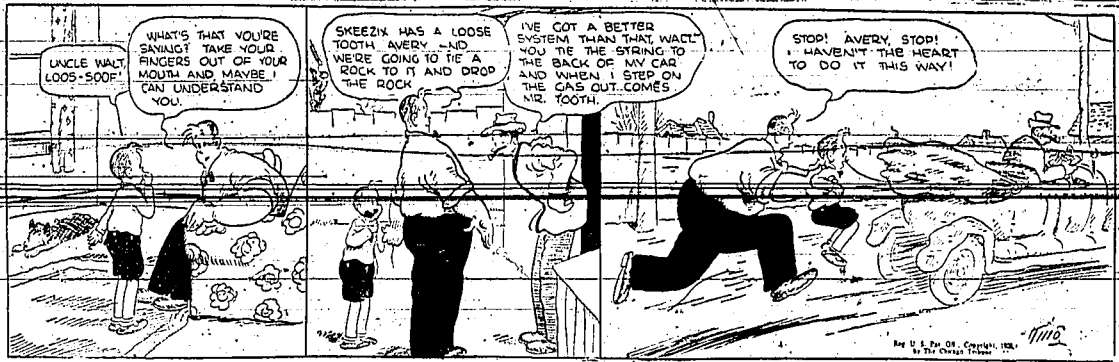

Perine, who is interesting himself in the proposition, and who had the following to say yesterday: "Why can't we make the Oregon Trail a standard tourist and automobile route? It would bring great numbers of sight-seers to southern Idaho who otherwise would never see this country."
