# BUILDING PERMITS TOTALING \$38,850 ISSUED BY COUNCIL

### Ten Structures to Be Erected in Twin Falls Receive Approval of Commission; Elec- (Food Changes Proposed)

Permits were granted by Twin Falls city council last night for the construction of buildings in Twin Falls valued at a total of \$38,850 for which applications were filed at the last meeting of the council. Two of the permits are for the construction of a frame residence and garage valued at \$2500 in lot No. 1, block No. 10, Block addition, and the other is for a 4300 frame residence on lot No. 11, block No. 7, Block addition were filed at the last meeting.

#### Earlier Applications

Others filed earlier were J. W. Harder, residence, \$4500; W. S. Mendenhall, sheet metal auto shed, \$340; A. H. Corbett, addition, \$2000; L. B. Wakefield, residence, \$4500; F. E. Wiegand, residence, \$3000; R. E. Moore, for Rios Sales company building on Second avenue south, \$9500. Permission was granted to Mr. Reynolds to use 15 feet on the avenue south for building material during the erection of his building. In addition, T. E. Warner received permission to amend the ordinance a number of years ago.

#### Lighting Rats Needed

Although not in any way connected with any application for permit, the considerable electrical display followed. A communication signed by John S. Klimes, U. R. Thompson, the Modern Printing Mill, R. A. Wood, W. Stogdole and Ernest White declared that the duties of the city engineer authorized with his duties as city electric inspector, and as chief of the department, an election to take his place. This was referred to Mayor R. E. Moberg, who placed in charge the department by special ordinance.

Later a committee of electricity composed of A. E. Dickey, K. M. White and H. L. Dinkler presented a tentative ordinance to the council, based on the Boise ordinance, providing for a license fee of \$2, and \$1000 bond for electricians, and creating a board consisting of a journeyman electrician, a master electrician and the city electrical inspector to pass on qualifications of applicants. Mayor Moberg declared that he believed the object of this was to shut out competition. This committee drafted and carried before the council a license fee was increased, and also that the bond should be required. The matter was then referred to the next meeting of the council.

G. M. Hall, city clerk, reported, receipt of \$1000 from the county upon the sale of lots and plots for delinquent taxes. This means that the city treasury will have a neat balance at the end of the year, otherwise the margin over necessary expenses would have been very narrow. It was reported that the city engineer had received on vacant lots adjacent to "ditches" and "alley" from which the proceeds were killed was referred to R. B. Smith, street commissioner. 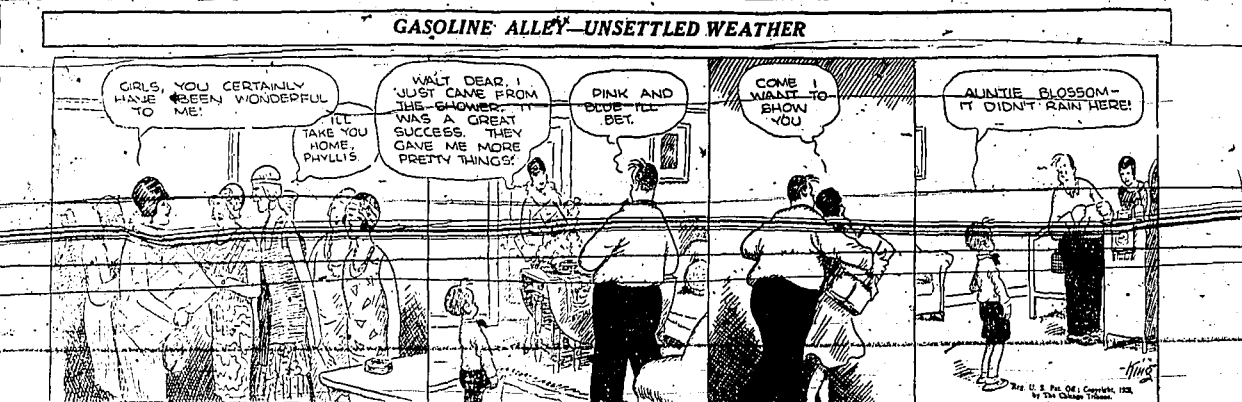

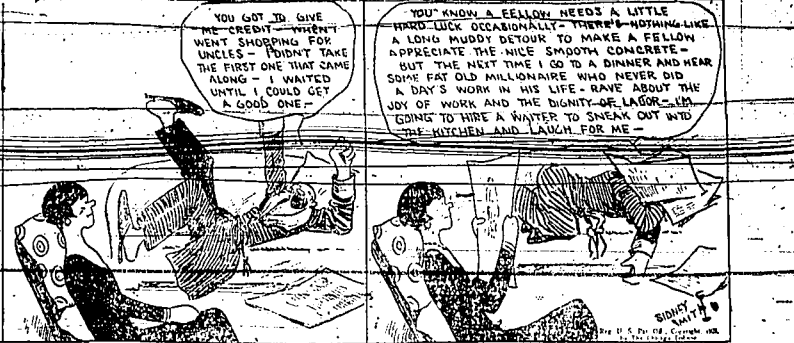

### STOCK COMPANY TO BUILD AND OPERATE TWIN FALLS AIRPORT

Chamber of Commerce Secretary Outlines Project for Merchants at Supper Meeting; in Line of Progress.

Purchase and improvement of the property selected for Twin Falls airport probably will be financed by a stock company, it was announced by Secretary Howell S. Wright of Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce at a monthly supper meeting of the chamber of commerce merchants' bureau at Twin Falls last evening.

Steps leading to this decision in the movement to place Twin Falls in the path of progress in aerial transportation were briefly outlined by Mr. Wright.

Possibility that the airport corporation might purchase and operate its own airplane was indicated among possible sources of revenue which included rental of from \$25 to \$50 a month for use of the field by commercial planes; sale of gas, rental of hangars and sale of concessions.

The site selected by the chamber of commerce committee, Mr. Wright explained, consists of approximately 360 acres of land owned by L. L. Drecker and on Blue Lakes boulevard about two miles north of Twin Falls. The site, it was stated, has been inspected and approved by a department of commerce always engineer, giving assurance of a standard, recognized rating for the field. It will afford an east-and-west runway 2000 feet long, and a north-and-south runway 1000 feet long.

An important factor in the enterprise, Mr. Wright stated, is the fact that Mr. Drecker has offered at a low price of \$180 an acre on the property if it is used for this purpose. The chamber of commerce committee, it was stated, found no other suitable sites that could be bought for less than \$200 or \$400 an acre.

Indicating rapid development in the field of aerial transportation Mr. Wright referred to an aerial touring party of "connoisseurs" who left Washington the middle of June with a routing across southern Idaho. He mentioned also scheduled opening of an aerial passenger line that is to be opened June 1 between Chicago and San Francisco to carry passengers for fares the same as railroad fares between the two points.
