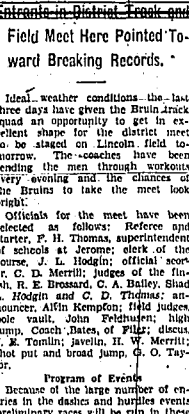
AUSTRALIA SHIPS HOUNDS FOR EXPORT

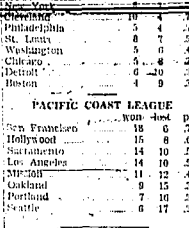

TWIN FALLS-WELLS ROUTE WELL KNOWN TO CALIFORNIANS

Automobile Caravan Cruising Proposed Route Through Oregon, Explains Inability to Accept Invitation Here.

An automobile caravan sponsored by the California State Automobile association that is to leave California May 14 for southwestern Idaho over a proposed highway route through northern California and Oregon to connect with the Old Oregon Trail in Idaho is unable to accept an invitation to "encourage all possible routes and to obtain first hand information." Stories sent out from Boise to the press by the Pacific Slope News Service stated that the California caravan was "sponsoring a short cut motor route between northern California and Yellowstone park through Oregon and Idaho," and that Governor H. C. Bamidgee and Joe D. Wood, commissioner of public works, are heavily in sympathy with the movement that will give Californians not only a more direct route to Yellowstone park but also several hundred miles shorter.

Registers Exception
Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce took exception emphatically to the implication that the proposed route was shorter than the established route by way of Reno and Twin Falls and in a message directed to the California association last Monday, Secretary Wright of the Twin Falls chamber said, "We cordially invite your highway trip to California, from Boise via Twin Falls and Reno, which is the route over present roads from Red Bluff, California, to Yellowstone park via Lakeview, Oregon, or via Reno, Nevada, is practically the same mileage. The route via Wells is highly improved. The route from San Francisco via Lakeview and Yellowstone over 230 miles longer than by way of Wells."

Schedule of the California caravan provides for return through Indian Valley and Winnemucca. Meetings will be held along the road as the caravan proceeds from California. The first meeting, according to travel notices, will be held at Redding and from there the route lies through Altama, California, Lakeview and Burns in Oregon and thence to Boise where a meeting will be held May 18.

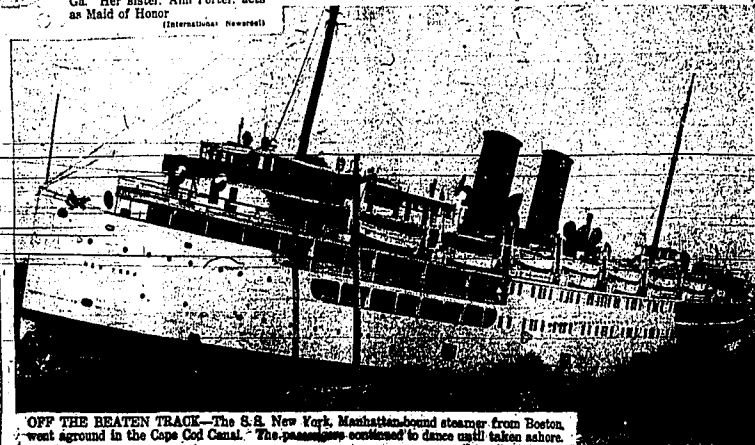

SNOW BLANKET DEEP ABOUT JACKSON LAKE

Run-off Sufficient to Fill Big Reservoir if It Were Empty—Observer Reports.

BURLEY, April 26—There is enough snow in the Jackson lake watershed to fill the reservoir if it were empty, according to a report of the superintendent at the lake, E. B. Darlington, superintendent of projects, interprets this report to mean that there will be a runoff of about 60,000 acre feet this season. Mean snow depth on this watershed:

has continued to rise right up to April 21, at which time the average depth had reached 34 inches, a 100 per cent increase. The water content was 3 1/2 inches, indicating compact snow. Deep snow and ice at Lake divide, where it measured 12 feet in 1926 the mean snow depth at this period was but 4 inches. There is now nearly 600,000 acre feet in Jackson lake and over 1,000,000 feet impounded above American Falls. These waters are being let out to some extent so that the crest of the expected flood at Jackson lake and American Falls may be broken. This unusual and striking condition at the headwaters of the Snake indicates that there will be an abrupt flood of water down the river.

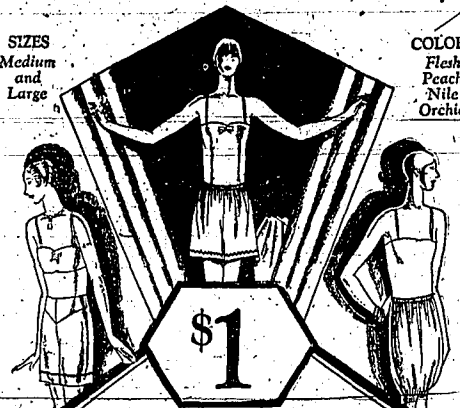

Every City in United States is Approaching Period of Drastic Change in Streets, Declares Noted Statistician.

(Special to The News) BARBON, Pa., April 26.—In his weekly interview today, Mr. Barbon discusses the tremendously important problem of highways. He points out some of the results that may be expected, such as, separate highways for express local traffic, one-way street crossings, double deck streets, etc.

Most Vital Problem "Every city in the United States is rapidly approaching a period of drastic change in streets and transportation systems. At first the growing traffic merely filled up the streets as they were originally planned, or as they could be easily widened.

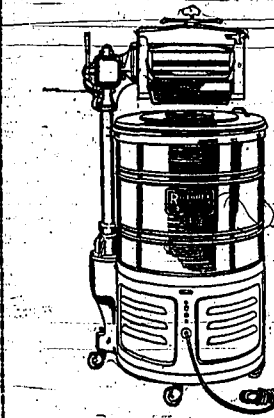
