# GRANGERS DECLARE AGAINST CHANGE IN HIGHWAY ROUTING

## Burley Farmers' Organization Would Cause Unfavorable Reaction to State

BURLEY, May 4.—Unfavorable impression of the state that would be gained by travelers over the highway paralleling the railroad through southern Idaho desert region is an outstanding objection advanced by Clarence Granger, Burley, to proposed road construction to divert through traffic from the Old Oregon Trail. The grange objections are set forth in resolutions adopted at a meeting here Wednesday evening and addressed to J. D. Wood, Idaho commissioner of public works. Here are the resolutions:

"Members of the Clearmont Grange, No. 277, Patrons of Husbandry, bring this resolution in opposition to the proposed diverting of through traffic from the Old Oregon Trail to a highway to be built along the Short Line right-of-way from American Falls to Bliss, respectively proposed against the proposed change for many reasons, a few of which are herein set forth.

"In the first place, we are strongly desirous of attracting all the favorable business of the rich valley parts of Idaho it is possible to gain. We maintain that the diverting of traffic from the Old Oregon Trail to a highway to be built along the Short Line right-of-way from American Falls to Bliss, respectively proposed against the proposed change for many reasons, a few of which are herein set forth.

"This state needs a lot of favorable publicity. It needs outside capital. It needs more settlers and more industries. It needs more markets for its products. With these needs gained, we feel our added total wealth will be increased. We believe that the standard of living, we wish to enjoy without the high burden of taxation that now rests upon us.

One of the most important real estate transfers that has taken place in Twin Falls county is the sale announced yesterday of the Charles E. Simpson orchards comprising 260 acres situated seven and a half miles south east of Twin Falls, to Henry and Edwin Los Angeles capitalists. While the deed of transfer shows a consideration of \$10, it is learned from reliable sources that the price paid for the property sets a new high record for good orchard land in the county, and that the money included equipment, was transferred free of encumbrance.

The Simpson orchards are widely known among fruit buyers and dealers throughout western market centers, and have a reputation for the quality of producing a high quality of fruit. The crop of these orchards is approximately 100,000 bushels which go into the market under the Simpson brand name and is the only brand in the county that has an established reputation in Idaho.

Mr. Simpson recently exhibited a letter from a dealer in Onalaska, Wisconsin, that said: "Just bought some of your apples, marked 'Simpson Brand' for which I paid \$3.50 per bushel. The best I ever saw. I am growing the quality of fruit and pack. What did you sell them for in 'Twin Falls'?"

Mr. Simpson, a Twin Falls attorney, represented the purchasers of the Simpson orchards in the examination of the abstract of title which was prepared by the Twin Falls Title and Abstract company. It comprises 319 complete entries and, according to the records, is the largest abstract yet issued in this county.
