FRIENDS OF HOOVER AIMING DIFFERENCES

Opposing Factions in Sharp Disagreement as to Real Effect of Indiana's Republican Primary Won by Watson.

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, May 9.—Friends of Herbert Hoover, and his political foes were in sharp disagreement today as to the real effects of the Indiana Republican primary which Watson, as a "favorite son" candidate, bested the commerce secretary in a fight for the Hoover-Smythe nomination.

Supporters of Watson and other Republicans who have lined up in an effort to head off Hoover's nomination for the presidency made much of the point that Hoover had failed to carry the state and that the solid Indiana delegation under law, must support Watson in the national convention unless he releases it.

On the other hand, the Hoover forces, while admitting defeat, stressed the vote their candidate polled and made the prediction that once the Hooper delegates are released many of them will be found in the Hoover fold.

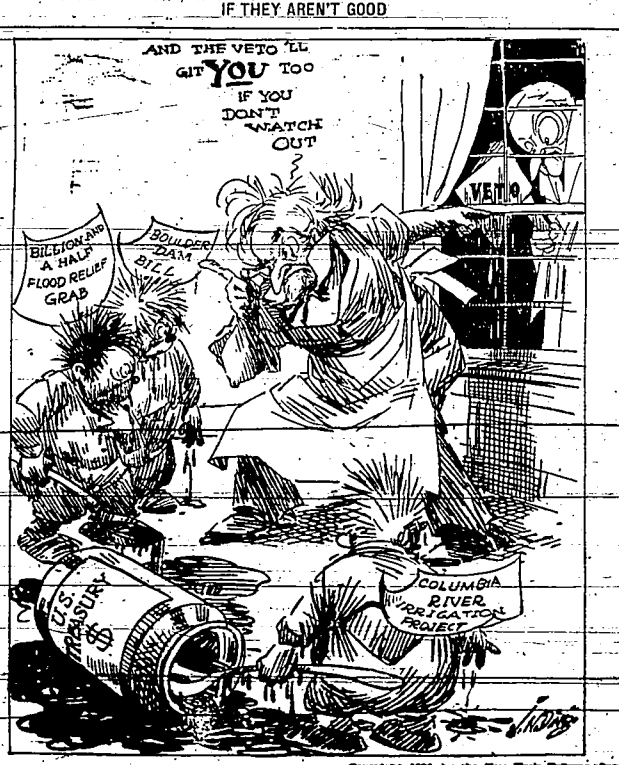

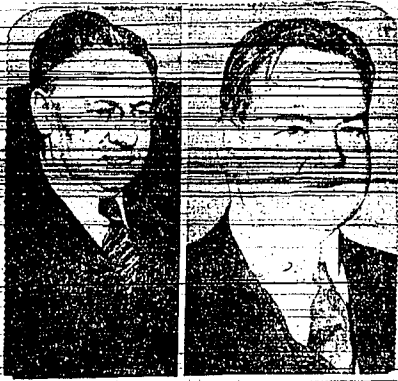
Royal V. Thomas, Holder of Solo Endurance Record, Falls to Death, Mechanic Dead

Heard of in the cause of aviation, have blazed his name on the roster of great flyers, was ended today in instant death in the crash of his Bellanca monoplane biplane. With him died Vaughn Weatherly, mechanic in the employ of the Wright-Aeronautical corporation.

Set Endurance Record: It was in the Bellanca, after being brought in the take-off, that Thomas set a solo endurance record at Roosevelt field, New York, last week by staying in the air for 37 hours 24 minutes and 30 seconds. He had attempted single-handed to break the record of 53 hours 30 minutes and 41 seconds, recently established by Eddie Stinson and George Haldeman, plied him into waterfalls should he fall asleep while his plane circled the field. A broken gasoline gauge, however, brought his effort to an end, after he had beaten the solo flight record made by Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh on his flight to Paris.

Planned Record Attempt: Thomas' attempt began to prepare for another attempt the latter part of the week. Exactly what caused the plane to crash was not known. Some witnesses said one of the wings crumpled as Thomas banked sharply to turn at an altitude of several hundred feet, while others believe they heard an explosion before the fall. The plane struck on the fairway of the Taboro Golf course, where Thomas was a resident of Durant, Oklahoma, and Weatherly of Ridge-wood.

NEWS OFFERS CUP FOR TRAP SHOOTERS

Entrants, and Each Man is to Break 100 Targets.

Interest and enthusiasm in day-shooting will be revived by the announcement of the Twin Falls Handicap shoot which is scheduled to begin next Sunday and continue until the state shoot on May 17. The cup will be presented by the Twin Falls News to the shooter who breaks 100 targets in the least number of shots during the tournament.

In order to make the shoot of equal interest to all shooters, a handicap committee has been appointed to assign a yardage handicap to all shooters of ability from which they will shoot when in competition for the trophy. Members of the committee are E. M. Sweeley, C. A. Bailey and E. L. Patrick.

The usual method of scoring the shoot has been reversed, fastest shooting at 100 targets, and getting credit for those broken, shooters in the News tourney will be required to break 100 targets and will be scored upon the number of shots required. This should add interest to the shoot, as with a handicap for the best shooter, all will be on an equal footing which does not promise very high scores.

Rules for Shoot

1. The shoot will be in progress Sundays from May 13 to June 10 inclusive, and will be for the Twin Falls News trophy.
2. Each shooter must break 100 targets, no more than 25 being broken on any Sunday.
3. Any shooter will be permitted to select his competitive shoot, but having decided to shoot for competition he must break 25 birds before leaving the traps.
4. Each shooter will be handicapped by the handicap committee, and shall shoot from the yardage designated for him.
5. Targets will be scored as dead only when a visible piece has been broken out by the charge.
6. The winner will be the shooter who breaks 100 targets with the least number of shots. In case of a tie, it must be decided off-the-heap—June 10, by breaking an additional 25 birds.
