RATE SLASH TO AID INCOME TAX PAYER \$25,000,000 SLICE

Downward Revision of Surtax Levy on Incomes Between \$20,000 and \$80,000 Possibility; Not to Be Retroactive.

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, May 14.—Individual income tax payers were given a prospective \$25,000,000 slice of the pending \$200,000,000 tax-reduction melon today when the senate voted a downward revision of the surtax rate applying on incomes between \$20,000 and \$80,000. An attempt by the Republicans, however, to have the reduction apply retroactively to income of last year on which taxes are paid this year was rejected, 64 to 28, as the western Republican independents broke from the ranks to join the solid Democratic lineup in opposition.

COURT ORDERS TOAD'S LIBERATION IN TEXAS; UNSEAL CORNERSTONE

EASTLAND, Texas, May 14.—Eastland's effort to vindicate "Toad" Horned, reputed to have been liberated for 31 years behind the corners of the old courthouse, was frustrated today by protesting citizens who obtained a court order for the release of a toad sealed in the courthouse cornerstone Saturday. The reptile appeared little the worse for its confinement after almost 48 hours. Protests calling for the horned toad's release "out of respect for Christianity and the humane citizenship of Texas," moved the commissioner's court to order the stone unsealed and the subject of the experiment liberated.

SECRETARY MELLON SEES VICTORY FOR HOOVER IF CHOSEN

"I Think He Will Make a Good President," Declares Cabinet Officer; Can't See Why His Statement Is Misread.

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, May 14.—Secretary Mellon elaborated today on his statement of Saturday that Herbert Hoover seemed to him to most closely fill the Senate's requirements for the presidency by saying: "I think Hoover can win if nominated. I think he would make a good president." Inferred that many interpretations had been given his statement, Mellon said, but he intended no such plain English. "Cohesive Organization" The Pennsylvania delegation had a "cohesive organization" and there has never been a "unit" when the state organization was more numerous than it is now. "One other comment was: 'Anything can happen.' Mr. Mellon all along has favored re-nomination of President Coolidge, and the secretary's statement to not believe that his endorsement of Hoover will necessarily mean that Pennsylvania's delegation will support Hoover. They believe the delegation will await developments before definitely aligning itself. James W. Good of Hoover's campaign forces, called on Mr. Mellon this afternoon, but it is understood that Mr. Mellon did not amplify his Philadelphia remarks.

CHICAGOANS DRIVE REALTORS TO GATHERING IMPETUS

Petition of Bar Association, Asking for Special Grand Jury Investigation, Granted by Criminal Court Justice.

(By The Associated Press) CHICAGO, May 14.—Drive against crime and political corruption gained impetus today under the direction of Chicago's bar association and the Chicago crime commission. A petition of the bar association, asking for a special grand jury to investigate a saving order and irregularities at the recent primary was granted by Judge William V. Fisher, chief justice of the criminal court. The crime commission, in a hearing of several hours before the judge, the criminal court told what it believed was wrong with the administration of justice in the county and was ordered to file a statement giving specific charges, dates and names. The special grand jury will be appointed by Judge Fisher, who authorized the impounding of the jury. Oregon Man Warns That Government Will Become Landlord if Levies Are Not Cut. BOISE, May 14.—The tax burden on real estate is causing investors to hesitate to place their money in the state, according to a statement issued by the Oregonian in a recent issue. DAKOTAN CRITICIZES POLITICAL STRUCTURE

Coalition of South and West Means of Ending "Rule of Absolutism" in Great Northwest. WASHINGTON, May 14.—In a condition of the South and West Senator Nye, Dakota, secures means of ending what he terms the "rule of absolutism" of the industrial North. Writing in the current issue of Plain Talk Nye declares the entire economic and political structure is designed for the benefit of the section east of the Mississippi and north of the Ohio and Potomac rivers. "It is quite apparent most of the abuses in governmental administration have one common source," he said. "They are the spawn of the current system of financing political campaigns—particularly national campaigns. The candidate must depend upon contributions from a few wealthy men and a few great corporations for the fund with which to conduct his campaign. Just that long will the abuses and corruption remain. It is time the American people realized that campaign contributions are given for value received."

Lays reached shore about dark. It was unable to find a trace of Dr. Peterson or other members of the party.

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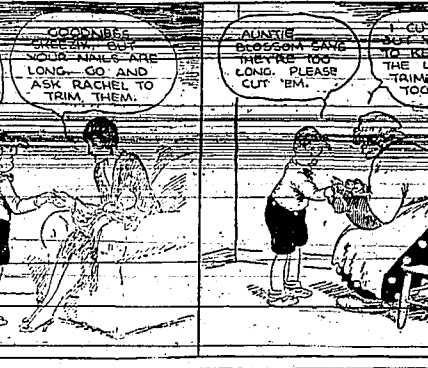

BUILDING CAMPAIGN ACTIVITY REFLECTED IN COUNCIL SESSION

Twin Falls City Commissioners Approve Six Permits for Construction Totalling \$8600; Turn Down Filling Station

Six applications for builders' permits involving total investment of \$8600 for new construction and alterations were approved by Twin Falls city council in regular session last evening.

One application filed by the Idaho Securities company for the Fletcher Oil company for permit of construction of \$2000 filling station at the corner of Shoshone street and Ninth avenue east, was rejected on the grounds that it violated terms of an ordinance regarding filling stations from that district.

It was indicated that question of the validity of the ordinance would be stated in a court action, and that the city probably would take the initiative in the test.

In reply to a councilman's inquiry, Captain E. M. Sweeney, city attorney, stated that action might be instituted as soon as it were determined that the building department would build the proposed filling station.

Applications Approved The approved applications included filed by the Idaho Securities company for the Fletcher company for construction of a filling station of brick construction, 10 by 54 feet, at the corner of Main avenue and Fourth street north to cost \$1500.

Permit for construction of a brick building for the Texas company to build a brick building, 25 by 25 feet, at the corner of Main avenue and Second street north, involving an investment of \$1200.

Other permits were granted to the Mutual Building and Loan association for a \$2200 dwelling, 26 by 33 feet, on property at the corner of Addison avenue and Ninth avenue north; Mageson company for a garage, 20 by 20 feet, on a vacant lot, involving an investment of \$500.

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Plumbers' Ordinance Passed On its third reading an ordinance providing for licensing of plumbers and election of a plumbing inspector was adopted without dissenting vote, and thereafter Alex W. Murray, veteran Twin Falls plumber who has served previously as plumbing inspector, was elected to the office.

The ordinance provides that each licensed plumber shall pay \$2 annual license fee and furnish bond in the sum of \$1000. The inspector is to receive inspection fees fixed by the ordinance as his compensation.

Adoption of the ordinance preceded by only a few moments the arrival of a delegation in which all Twin Falls master plumbers were represented. It was their purpose to propose establishment of an examining board to pass upon qualifications of applicants for plumbers' license and to suggest that the schedule of plumbing fees be modified in some respects.

It was understood between the plumbers and the council that if the ordinance as adopted did not work out satisfactorily, it would be altered.

Election of W. Clay Smith to be electrical inspector succeeding Harold William Merritt also was recorded by the council last evening.

Electricians in Line The electricians' ordinance as remodeled by the city attorney was laid before the council, but, on request of the newly-elected inspector, action was deferred to permit of study by the electricians of the re-drafting measure.

The proposed ordinance provides for licensing of electricians and establishment of a board of examiners. Creation of Twin Falls street sprinkling district for the coming year was also discussed.

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BARBSON MAY MAP PLACES GEM STATE IN GOOD POSITION

State Opportunities Survey Puts Barbson in Position Among 16 Best in Country; General Outlook Is Improved

Idaho is one of the 16 states marked "most favorable" on the Barbson sales credit map for sales opportunity for May. It was one of 16 states with similar marking for April. Business activities in which the Gem state is in the "most favorable" class are retail hardware sales, electric power, lack of business failures. It is listed in the "fair" class in sale of postage stamps, building activities, jewelry consumption and sales of life insurance.

Three cities, Twin Falls, Boise and Pocatello are listed as "fair"; no others are listed. The trend of business as a whole in the country at large tends upward. For the April map 10 were listed "most favorable" and 11 as "least favorable," and this figure is continued in the May list. Two states have been added to the fair column, making 23 in that section; while the least favorable list contains but nine (instead of 11) as in the April summary.
