BOURBOON DELEGATES FAVOR "DRY" PLANK

First Fight Climax to Move for Nullification of State Party Rule; Former Governor and Colonel Clash on Floor.

(By The Associated Press) COLUMBIA, S. C., May 16 (AP)—The South Carolina convention today voted down a resolution to nullify the state's 18 delegates to the national convention against Governor Smith, of New York, but adopted a measure directing them to work for "dry" candidates and a "dry" plank.

A vote to nullify the state party rule, binding South Carolina Democrats to support the nominee of the party caused a heated controversy which found its climax in a fist fight between former Governor John Gary Evans and Colonel Edgar Brown, a former legislator and house representative. The proposal was defeated by a vote of 194 to 147.

Call for Enforcement Resolutions calling for strict enforcement of the prohibition law and favoring retention of the unit voting system were adopted without discussion. The vote on the measure proposing instruction against Smith was 147 to 147.

The clash between Evans, a leader in the "bone dry" bloc, and Brown, came at the end of a period of growing tension. Evans argued for abrogation of the state rule on the ground that it was keeping out of the national Democratic voters out of the party. Brown spoke vigorously in defense of the rule and called its opponents as attempting to break down the Democratic party in the state.

"You're already in the Republican party," Evans retorted. "You're a liar," retorted Brown, and the men came together and rolled over onto the floor, as friends tried to separate them.

COOLIDGE APPOINTS ENGINEER TO BOARD Chief Executive Completes Preliminaries to Work on Mississippi Flood-Control Task.

WASHINGTON, May 16 (AP)—President Coolidge today completed preliminaries to a study of flood control work on the Mississippi river with the appointment of Carlisle W. Sturtevant, New York engineer, as chairman of the national committee created by the flood-control bill which he signed yesterday.

Sturtevant will serve with Major General Jadin, chief of army engineers, and Colonel Charles F. Brant, president of the Mississippi river commission. This board will iron out the differences in the recommendations of the army engineers and the civilian commission and make final recommendations to the president for an engineering program.

Board Temporary When the report of the board is handed the president the commission automatically goes out of existence and the flood-control project will pass from legislative into executive hands.

Sturtevant served on the Mississippi river surveys for 14 years and is a member of the Chamber of Commerce. He built the dredges used in the construction of the Panama canal and built 35 miles of the New York state canal. He was employed by the Atlantic, Gulf and Pacific company as engineer in charge of the Panama canal.

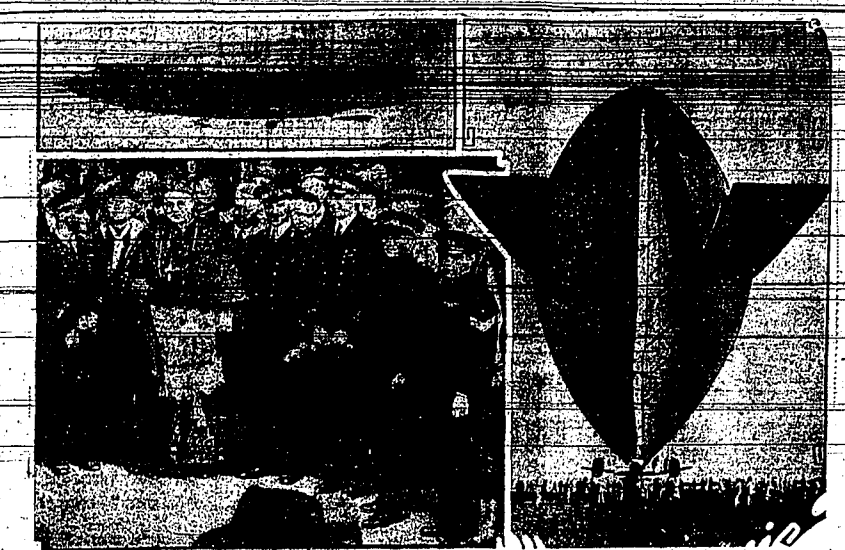
