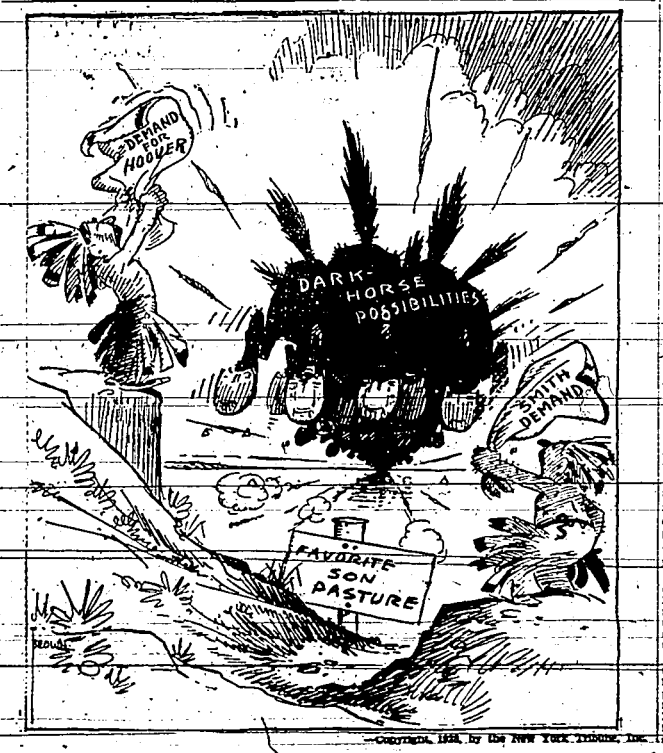

REIGN COUNT TAKES FIRST AND \$50,000 IN KENTUCKY DERBY

Big Red Colt Wins Annual Classic While 80,000 Persons in Grandstands Cheer Wildly; Track Sloppy; Drizzling Rain.

(By The Associated Press) LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 19.—Rain or shine, mud or slop—it was all right count, owned by Mrs. John D. Hertz, Chicago, wife of the late banker, explained to victory today, racing through a drizzling rain and mud and rain in one of the most spectacular races in the history of blue ribbon events at the American turf.

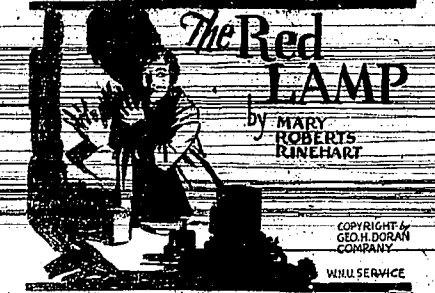

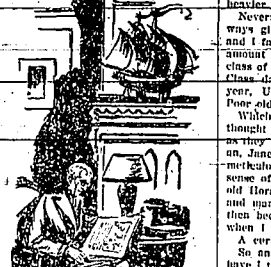

TRIAL OF HAYWOOD MARKS HIGH LIGHT IN IDAHO HISTORY

Shad L. Hodgkin, Ada County Sheriff, Under Sentence of Imprisonment at Boise.

Throughout a long day and a half in district court at Boise, 21 years ago this summer, "Big Bill" William D. Haywood, on trial for murder, repeated monotonously, "I don't know" and "I don't remember."

Mr. Hodgkin was at that time sheriff of Ada county and was responsible for the safekeeping of Haywood and his associates, Pettibone and other persons, during the period of their incarceration and trial in Boise extending over about a year and a half.

Haywood was accused by Harry Orchard, confessed slayer, of complicity in the murder of Frank Stuenkel, former governor of Idaho, at his home in Caldwell on Saturday, December 17, 1902. The accused leaders of the miners' organization were delivered at Denver into custody of an agent of the Idaho courts by the governor of Colorado who honored a requisition issued by United States Senator Frank R. Gooding, then governor of Idaho, and were brought to Idaho in a special train.

Under court order they were transferred to the Ada county jail at Boise for the keeping. During the period of their detention in Boise, Mr. Hodgkin said yesterday, guards were stationed at each corner of the well-situated, well-warded, old-fashioned iron fence that surrounded the court house and jail, and gates were locked at intervals.

On his introduction to Haywood, Mr. Hodgkin said he was the leader addressed him with a broad grin, remarking: "I'd like to see you foot race, either, if the Colorado line; just give me ten yards to start, and no handicap."

Haywood, as a prisoner, caused no trouble for his safekeepers. Mr. Hodgkin said, but through a person apparently prompted by nervous hostility besieged the jail, and finally a rule was imposed by the sheriff requiring all applicants for admission to Haywood's quarters to furnish certificates signed by attorneys for the defense and for the state.

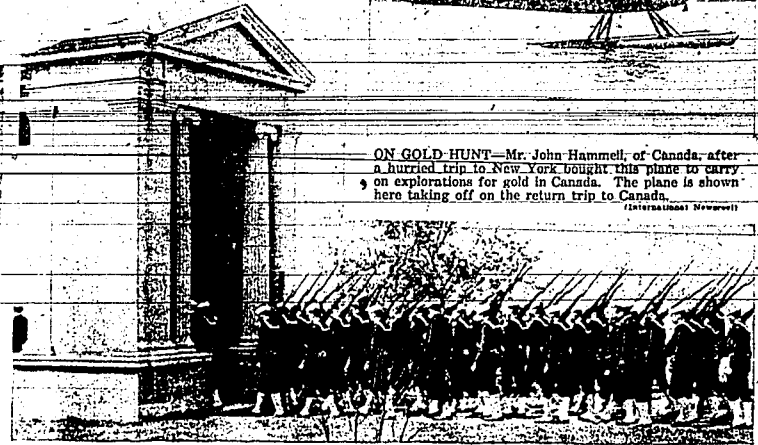

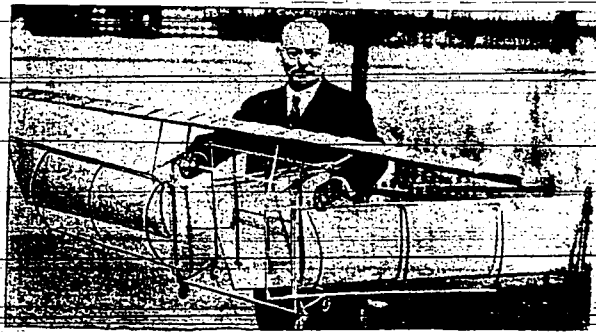

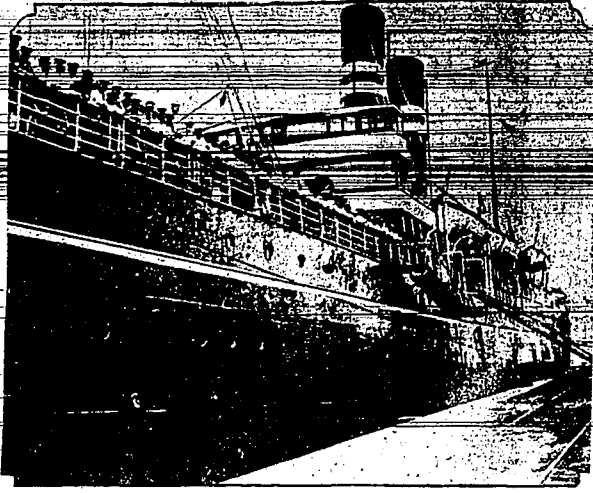
