SECRETARY HOOVER TARGET FOR ROUND UP OF FILE IN SENATE

Reed, Missouri, Denounces Cabinet Officer's War Time Control of Grains; Blasts South Carolina, Enters Criticism.

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, May 21.—Secretary Hoover was target for round of freer-trade senate today. Reed, Missouri, denounces his war-time control of grains and food.

Senator Reed, who is a candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination, repeated his charge that Hoover was responsible for the living of the price of wheat during the war.

Reed asserted that Hoover's plan early in the war for "European" countries to control wheat prices by declining and refusing to buy and declared congress had refused to accept plan devised by Hoover.

LIGHT SYSTEM TEST ILLUMINATES FALLS

Crowd at Brink of Great Waterfall Witnesses Successful Tryout of Rd. Installation.

Between one and two hundred persons gathered to witness the successful tryout of the new lighting system for the Great Falls. The system, which is a permanent building of steel and cement, the roof of which forms a platform gained by stairs from the top of the canyon wall. It is the entire waterway until the whole face of the caravat was as bright as day.

The scene resembled a huge stage setting of rocks, trees and falling water, from which the light rays in clouds scattering the forbidding background of the canyon walls. PURPOSE IN LIFE THEME OF SERMON AT BACCALAUREATE

Rev. E. C. Barton Stresses Goal as Requirement of Success
Crowds Fill Church at Service for Graduating Class

"Great man-purposes others wish" was the theme of the baccalaureate sermon delivered by Rev. E. C. Barton of the Baptist church at the baccalaureate service of the Twin Falls high school graduating class in the Methodist Episcopal church at 8 o'clock Sunday evening. Long before the beginning of the service the entire auditorium and galleries were filled by parents, relatives and friends of the graduates.

Mr. Barton based his sermon on the scripture by the Apostle Paul in Philippians 3: 12, 14: "Brethren, I count not myself to have apprehended; but this one thing I do, forgetting those things which are behind and reaching forth to those things which are before, I press toward the mark of the prize of the high calling of God in Jesus Christ."

Three-fold organization dividing his lecture, in accordance with the "three parts" of the above scripture, Mr. Barton pointed out that concentration, forgiveness of past mistakes and a definite goal for the future are the basic elements in successful character building.

Humanity if left alone moves along the line of least resistance, which, Mr. Barton believes, is the cause for slow progress of the world which waits for the man of vision to blaze a trail which it may follow.

Paul, the Apostle, might have been content to rest on his laurels, but he was not. Even in old age he was continually striving to accomplish still greater things. Napoleon's greatness to a large extent was due to the fact that he did not let failure dishearten him, but used them as stepping stones to success.

Mistakes Aids to Success

"Never make the same mistake twice," Mr. Barton said. "Let every failure spur one to greater efforts which in turn will lead to greater success."

"It is not because of ignorance that progress is slow; it is not because of increasing wickedness or aggressive infidelity, that the world does not reach higher levels of success," the speaker asserted. "Lack of purpose holds men back."

Mr. Barton stated that this is the most enlightened age, a better world,

and a continuation of events with that of previous times, and students should strive to be worthy of the privilege they have of being a part of it.

Strong Purpose Necessary

"Past achievements may get a man a place, but it is only a stepping stone to make that man of it," Mr. Barton stated. "There is no greater spectacle than that of a youth striving blindly for the goal of his ambition, not knowing the meaning of the life and the goal he has set for himself."

Mr. Barton stated that the purpose of the baccalaureate service is to give the graduates a chance to lay their plans for the future, which was followed by the professional, Mendocino's "March from the Past," played by the high school orchestra, and the reading of the baccalaureate prayer by Rev. E. C. Barton.

Mrs. Conrad Magel, Sr., Died Idaho Resident for 26 Years Active in Church Activities

Mrs. Mary Magel, 77, wife of Conrad Magel, sr., died at her home at 154 Eighth avenue east at 10 o'clock Sunday evening following a stroke of apoplexy a few hours earlier. Mrs. Magel came to Twin Falls with her husband about 15 years ago.

Mrs. Magel was born in Canton, Illinois, July 20, 1865. She moved to Sidney, Iowa, later, where she was married and spent the greater part of her life.

MURDER DIRECTORS ARE SUSTAINED IN OUSTER PROCEEDING

Judge Babcock Holds Board Acted in Good Faith; Two Close Questions of Law Are Involved in Action

Petition of M. B. Boley to oust Judge Babcock, directors of the Idaho Low Lift Irrigation district, was denied by Judge W. A. Babcock at the close of arguments by counsel in district court here late last evening.

Judge Babcock held that the evidence failed to establish the alleged elements of bad faith on the part of the directors. Letting a contract for construction work without advertising under conditions existing here raised a nice question as to whether the board had acted within the letter of the law. Judge Babcock stated, but since the directors had acted on advice of counsel, and believed they were within the rights their good faith was undoubted. Again, in regard to the minute entries, in some cases it would appear that these might not have been kept in accordance with the strict letter of the law, but in no instance was there evidence of bad faith shown in regard to this matter.

Judge Babcock said he had admitted testimony relative to irrigation of lands outside the district with a view of getting an understanding of the point of view of the parties to the case. Hodgins and Hodgins represented the district and Harry Benoit, who was associated with the petition, represented the bondholders.

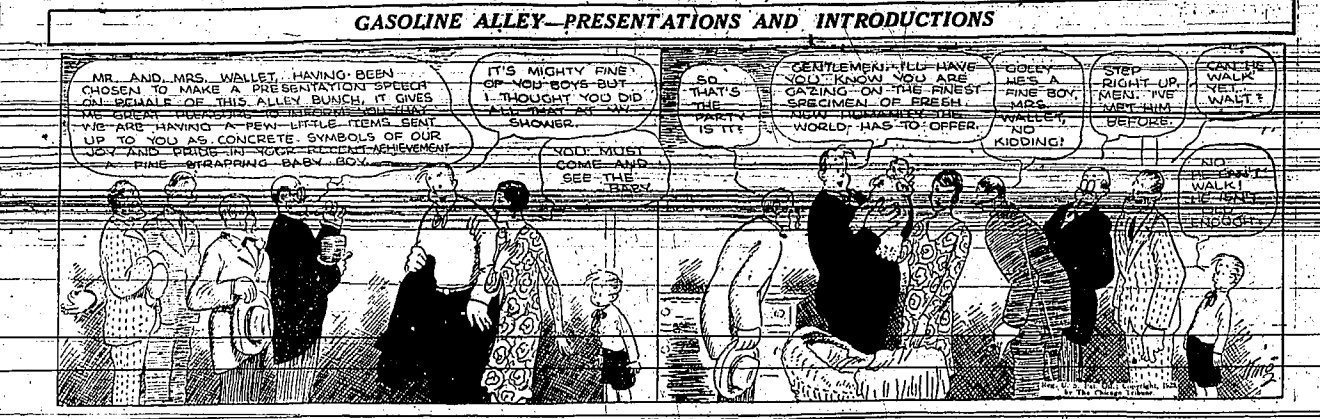

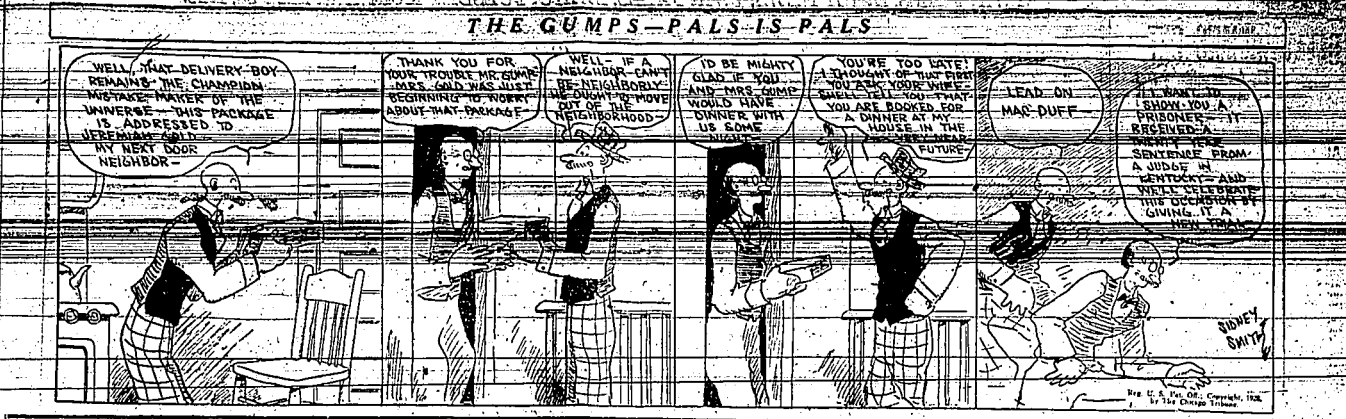

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ELECTRICIANS GET REGULATIONS FOR OPERATIONS HERE

Council Adopts Ordinance Providing for License and Bond and Examination of License

Street Avoids Sprinkling.

Under terms of the electrician's ordinance adopted under suspension of rules by Twin Falls city council in regular session last evening, electric contractors in Twin Falls are required to furnish \$1000 bond to indemnify property owners for damages caused by improper workmanship. In addition electrical contractors entering the Twin Falls field will be required to furnish proof of their capability at examinations to be conducted by a board of electrical examiners to be appointed by the council and to be composed of the electrical inspector, one master electrician and one journeyman electrician. Electrical contractors under terms of the ordinance which was recommended to the council by Twin Falls electricians, will pay an annual license fee which will become effective about June 1.

No Sprinkling for Sidewalk

Sprinkling carts will not operate this year on Sidewalk street, South Park addition, according to decision reached by the council after investigation of petitions for and against including this street in the sprinkling district. Protest against including Range street, South Park addition, in the sprinkling district, however, in the opinion of the council, was outweighed by petitions for continued sprinkling, and that street was retained in the district set forth in the ordinance adopted by the council last evening. Out of 17 owners of property on Sidewalk, a protest recited, 10 opposed sprinkling. Sprinkling of Lots and Alexander streets in South Park addition was discontinued in 1922 on petition of property owners.

Cost of street sprinkling, estimated at \$10,000, includes for labor, \$1200; gasoline and oil, \$1800; water, \$1000; machine cost, \$3470; advertising and collection costs, \$280.

Street Lighting Costs Less

Twin Falls expense for street lighting will be reduced this year by \$1015 under reduced rates for municipal lights lately put into effect by the Idaho power company. John D. Orr, district manager for the company, advised the council last evening, the reduction is to 14 1/2 per cent of the total bill, which last year approximated \$14,000.

Twin Falls municipal appropriation bill for the current year will provide for expenditure of approximately \$280,000, and will conform closely to the proposed expenditure set forth in the tentative budget adopted by the council three weeks ago. It was indicated in discussion at the meeting last evening, The appropriation bill will be submitted to the council for adoption at its next meeting.

The budget provides for general fund expenditures totaling \$124,500 as against estimated general fund revenues of \$124,243.75.

Costs for special fund also will bring in \$250,000, divided as follows: Sprinkling, \$10,600; street light-

ing, \$14,000; public library, \$10,000; municipal bond, \$1200; bond interest on sinking fund, \$27,727.27. Assessments for local improvement districts will aggregate \$72,443.31.

Approves Building

The council voted approval of application made by W. Zenas Smith for permit to construct a concrete store front to cost \$1000 for the Royal bakery building on Second street east. The new front, it was stated, is to be of glass and stucco with side also of plaster. It is to include overhanging porch of glass and metal projecting 10 feet from the front and eight feet above the sidewalk.

Permit for operation of the Reed hotel, Main avenue south, was granted to Mrs. Anna Hampton.

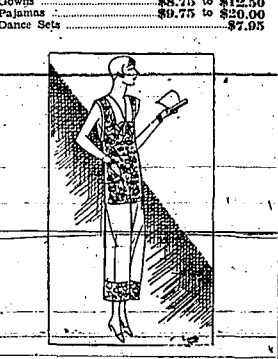
