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SEVEN PERSONS DIE IN ARGENTINE BOMB EXPLOSION; 50 HURT

Infernal Machine in Italian Consulate Takes Heavy Toll; 34 Men and Women Seriously Hurt and Dying in Hospitals.

(By The Associated Press) BUENOS AIRES, Argentina, May 23.—One bomb blown and injured took at least seven lives and injured nearly a hundred others and destroyed a second bomb, explosion of which was narrowly averted, marked today what police considered the most violent anti-Fascist demonstration staged in this country in two years, or more.

Seven persons were killed outright when the first bomb exploded in the Italian consulate of the newly occupied Argentine capital, Buenos Aires, and 34 others were sent either dying or seriously hurt to hospitals. The bodies of the bodies of those killed that it is feared still were literally blown to pieces.

Hardly had the reverberations of the first explosion ceased when employees of a pharmacy owned by a prominent anti-Fascist leader in the Argentine south docks section averted a second blast when it stamped out a spluttering fuse on an infernal machine.

Two customers sitting at a small table in the store departed leaving a small child behind them. The six-year-old son of the proprietor unwillingly opened it, screaming with pain when he burned a finger on the fuse.

REPUBLICAN PARTY IN INDIANA MEETING

HOOPER'S CAMPAIGN EXPENSE INCREASES TO ABOVE \$312,000

Supporter of Cabinet Officer Informs Special Senate Committee He Has Collected \$312,000 to Promote Candidacy

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, May 23.—Known expenditures on behalf of Herbert Hoover were increased to \$312,745 today with the testimony of Claudius H. Rutson, Chattanooga, and New York, before the senate campaign funds committee, which has already reported \$552,500 and expended \$339,200 to promote the candidacy of the commerce secretary for the Republican presidential nomination.

Mystery in Opposition
Rutson who served under Hoover as assistant secretary of commerce for several years, presented his figures after the investigation that reports more than an hour in a vain effort to solve what they regard as the mystery about "Politics," a weekly publication of this city, which is vigorously opposing the Hoover candidacy.
Frank J. Hale, New York, for five years employed by the prohibition unit of the treasury, insisted that he had borne the \$8500 losses of "Politics," since he founded it last January, and that he had received no outside account, no safety deposit box and was engaged in promotion work in which he hoped would be profitable.

Chairman of Boards
Rutson, who is chairman of the board of the Transcontinental oil company, and the Associated Bond and Share company, New York, was on the stand at both morning and afternoon sessions of the committee.
Expenditures from the fund, Rutson said, included \$10,000 given to Ruth L. Holland, a former assistant attorney general, for work in helping to line up aid for Hoover in Michigan, Florida, Georgia and Alabama and \$3000 sent to the Hoover organization in 1927 and \$1000 for the fund which was in a position to begin raising funds on its own account.

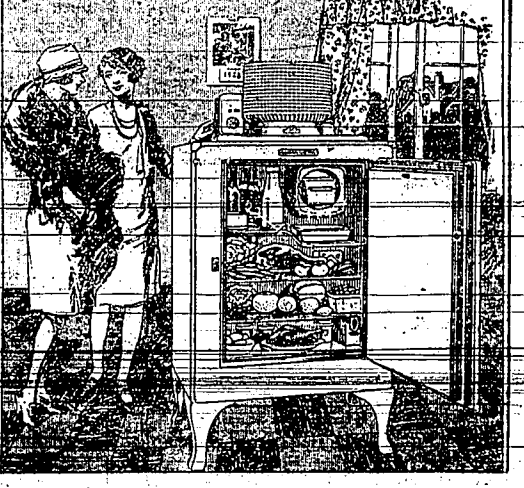

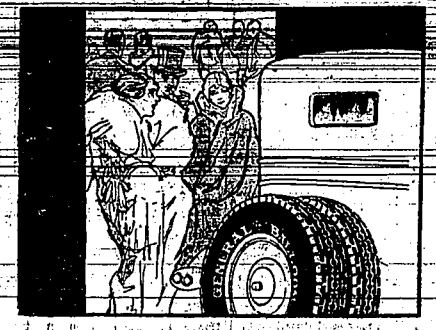

MEETING AT BURLEY PROTESTS POLICIES AT AMERICAN FALLS

Spokane Oppose Power Company Contract and Attack Alleged Diversion of Water From North Side to Gooding

BURLEY, May 23 (Special to The News)—A well attended mass meeting was held in the court room here Tuesday to discuss a contract proposed to be entered into between the United States Bureau of Reclamation and the Idaho Power company.

A. C. DeMay of Elgin, president and introduced P. W. Dent, assistant to Commissioner Edward Mend, and George C. Kreutzer, head of the reclamation engineering department.

After an outline of the proposed contract was set out by Mr. DeMay and Mr. Dent, a lively discussion ensued, the general trend of argument being in opposition to the acceptance of the contract in its present form.

The proposed agreement provides briefly that the power company will be allowed the use of unappropriated waters in the American Falls reservoir for a term of ten years in exchange for \$31,000 rental per year.

It was also brought out that the Minidoka project is protested against the delay in beginning work on the power plant at the American Falls dam, and considerable opposition to the proposed diversion of water from the Minidoka North Side extension to the Black canyon or Gooding projects.

It was stated that it had been the plan of the reclamation service for years to install the North Side pumping system, and the Gooding extension had sidetracked this North Side Minidoka extension.

CHANGE IN SPECULATIVE SENTIMENT ON MARKET

NEW YORK, May 23 (AP)—A marked decrease in speculative sentiment is being observed in local stock markets, which rallied in speculative fashion after an opening period of irregularity. High priced industrials and specialties, which had been hammered 25 to 75 points below their recent peak prices in the sweeping reaction earlier in the week, staged a partial recovery with 1777 standard industrials and rails moved up to 8 points on heavy buying for both accounts.

Trading was only moderate in volume, total sales for the first four hours again falling below the 3,000,000-unit mark. The ticker, however, showed a market more of the day.

After the close of the market, the government of the exchange board, presided this P. M. order which had been in effect all week, and to return to the full five hour trading session, beginning next Monday. This action was taken, it was explained, because the purpose of the earlier closing in relieving the unusual strain on the personnel of member houses had been achieved.

The official rate on call money was maintained at 6 per cent but concessions were reported in the "outside market." Time money, which was quoted at 6 1/2 yesterday, was available at 5 1/2 today for the shorter maturities.
