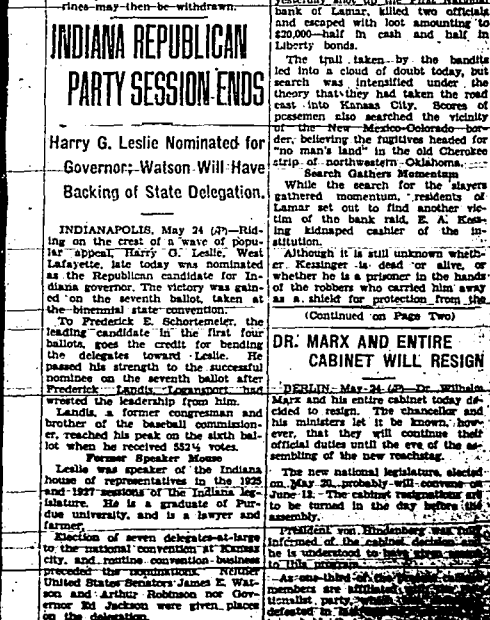

SENATORS OVERTHROW FOUR PRESIDENTIAL VETOES; SET RECORD

Upper House, by Margin of Only Seven Votes, Falls to Defeat After Riff-Raff Session With Chief Executive; Road Bill Passes.

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, May 24—Establishing what leaders believe to be a precedent, the senate today overthrew four presidential vetoes in rapid succession and the house then promptly duplicated that action on one of them.

The one bill that was re-passed by both chambers over Mr. Coolidge's objection was the Ryan-Pitzger bill to provide retirement pay for disabled emergency army officers. It was passed by the house 248 to 101 within two hours after the senate had acted similarly 66 to 14.

Divided on Three Bills The three other pieces of legislation on which the senate and Mr. Coolidge parted company were the Oddie roads measure affecting 11 western states, the Bureau bill increasing pay for night workers in the postal service and the Great West granting allowances for rent, fuel, light and equipment to fourth class soldiers.

Approval was given the senate amendment increasing from 75 cents to 83 the exemption allowed from the 10 per cent admissions tax and to its amendments—business from 416 to 525 the annual dues to be exempted from the 10 per cent club dues tax. Coreal beverages repealed \$1M,000. Wine taxes, reduced \$1,000,000. Foreign built yachts, repealed, \$10,000. Narcotics, drugists fee reduced from \$6 to \$3, reduction in revenue, \$150,000. Total reductions \$23,295,000. Withholding tax at source, increase in revenue \$2,000,000. Prize fights admissions 25 per cent.

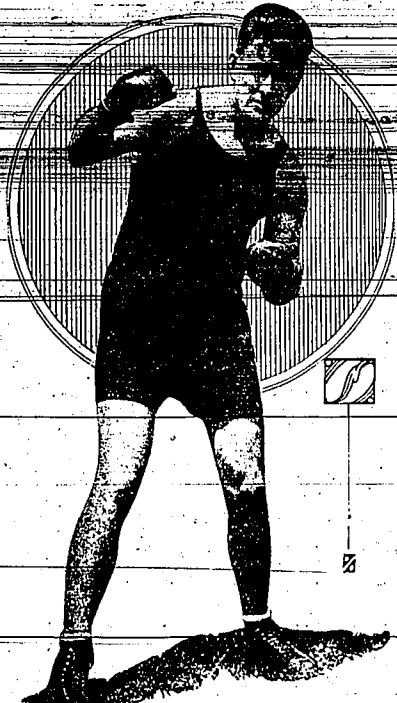

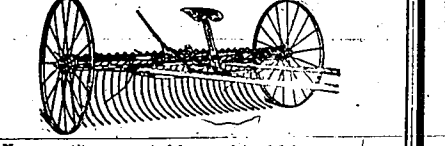

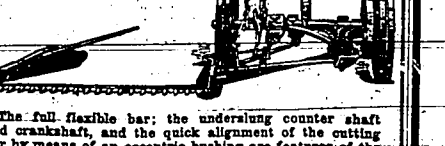

RAPID ADVANCE IN CROPS DURING WEEK

Weather Conditions Favorable for Development of Vegetation in Irrigated Regions.

The rapid advance of all crops in the irrigated districts of southwest Idaho, says a weekly survey issued Wednesday by the Boise office of the weather bureau. There was abundant bright sunshine and adequate warmth. The demand for irrigation water was heavy but the supply was ample for all needs. In the dry farm sections, crops would be retarded by a week or more without rain. Planting and seeding are pretty well along except in the latest districts and most crops are up and making good progress. Late potatoes are being planted and beets are being thinned. Garden and truck crops are making rapid strides. Pastures and meadows are growing rapidly. The condition is adequate on the ranges and livestock are thriving. The fruit outlook continues favorable.

Rains in Southeast
In southeast Idaho, fairly copious rains occurred early in the week. Fine growing weather obtained and all crops did well. Winter wheat is thriving and spring sown grains are starting well. Alfalfa and clover are making rapid growth. Beans are coming up well to Bonneville county. Beets are being thinned in most sections, although plantings still continue in the northern counties where the early planted fields are just coming up. The range is reported as improved in all sections.

North Idaho has sunny weather with moderate temperatures and no precipitation obtained throughout the week. The soil is getting dry and all vegetation is in need of rain. Irrigation water is plentiful and is being used freely by orchardists and gardeners. Fall wheat is doing well under moderate temperatures and the absence of drying winds. Spring sown grains and pastures are making fair growth, but need rain badly. The first crop of alfalfa is excellent and is ready for cutting in the early districts. The fruit outlook continues good, but the crop will not be heavy. Strawberries, which are plentiful, are beginning to ripen. Other small fruits, under irrigation, are doing well. Pastures and ranges are holding up fairly well and livestock are thriving.

Notes From the Field
Burley, Cassia county: Hot, dry weather prevailed; crops growing fast where moisture is adequate. Grains all planted; potatoes about one-half planted; beets being thinned; vegetation on desert drying rapidly. Superphosphate country: Weather quite warm; some light showers, not sufficient to do much good; early plantings coming on in good shape; farmers having to irrigate before planting potatoes and beans; fruit in good condition; gardens looking fine.
Twin Falls, Twin Falls county: A few light, local showers—abundant irrigation demands heavy potato planting in full swing; corn spray about completed on apples; bean planting begun; alfalfa growing rapidly the last ten days.

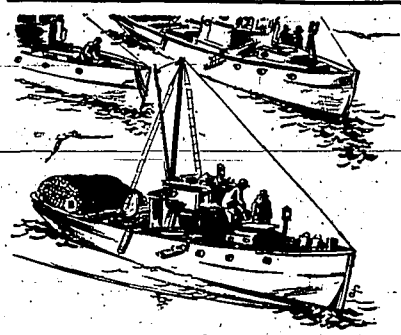
Excitement in World

Shooshone Falls in the West and Niagara Falls in the East now stand out prominently as the world's waterfalls. W. J. Brotherton, Chicago, representative of the concern which supplied the lighting devices, said here last evening. Only at Shooshone and Niagara, Mr. Brotherton said, has "stepped-up illumination" been made for its dramatic scale. Lighting at Niagara has been confined to a narrow strip on the American side of the falls.

Mr. Brotherton said, could be compared with nothing that has been seen in years of experience except possibly the lighting of the Buckingham Palace in Chicago that cost several hundred thousand dollars.

Describing briefly the installation of the illuminating system at Shooshone Falls, Mr. Brotherton stated that the light is projected from a battery of 30 flood lights throwing out reflected stream of 25,000,000 candlepower. The lamps are air tight and water tight and, due to the alloy of metal used, they are self-cooling.

The Twin Falls country should derive many hundred thousand dollars worth of advertising in direct consequence of this installation, Mr. Brotherton said.



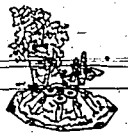

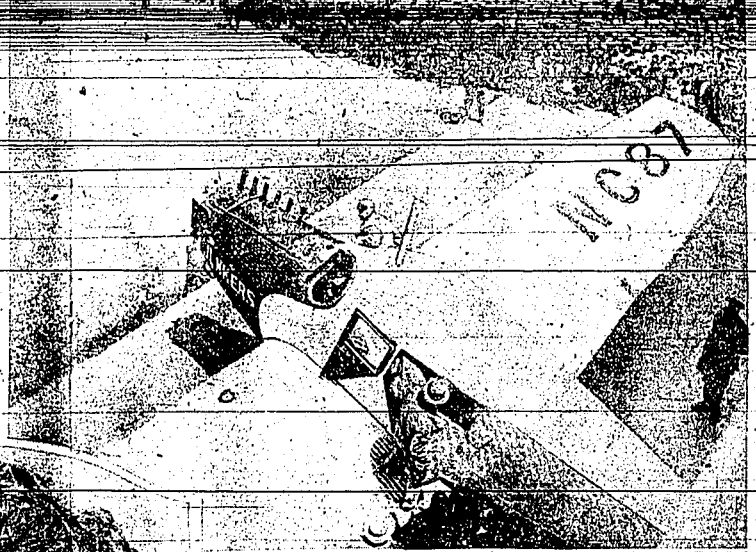

IRRIGATION PROJECTS ADD \$133,000,000 TO VALUE OF 1927 CROPS

Land Considered Practically Valueless 22 Years Ago—Production Worth Huge Sum

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, May 24.—Land embraced in federal reclamation projects, considered practically valueless 22 years ago, produced crops last year with a value of \$133,007,210, the highest amount realized from this acreage since the war peak of 1919.

Reports and surveys by the department of interior show that the value of crops grown during the last 10 years on land irrigated from works constructed by the bureau of reclamation amounts to more than \$1,000,000,000.

Cotton Valuable
In 1906, when the money returns upon irrigated land first began coming in, the total crop value was \$241,900. Last year cotton alone grown on the projects was valued at \$16,705,727. Alfalfa led all crops on the projects last year from the standpoint of acreage being grown on 436,610 acres or 31 per cent of the total cropped area of 1,411,860 acres. This crop was followed by wheat, 182,371 acres representing 13.3 per cent of the total acreage; and cotton, 178,075 acres, which accounted for 12.5 per cent. No other crop occupied as much as 5 per cent of the cropped acreage.

The bumper year on the reclamation projects was 1919. Last year's figures crowd the returns registered at that time very closely. The crop value in 1919 was \$162,374,000. This was followed by a decline during the depression period to \$3,691,650 in 1922, after which values rose steadily to \$13,594,750 in 1925. They dropped to \$110,414,940 the following year, owing largely, the bureau says, to the slump in the price of cotton.

Crops Satisfactory
Crops, livestock and marketing conditions on the irrigation projects at the close of March this year were reported to the bureau of reclamation as being generally satisfactory. Conditions varied because of geographical location, but on the whole the reports indicated no serious slump was indicated for this spring.

The bureau is attempting to introduce methods and practices in its projects which will more effectively attract worthy and competent farmers, create conditions which will insure the health and comfort of their families, and provide incomes needed to create a comfortable living and pay irrigation charges.

Puelicher, chairman of the board of trustees. Selection was according to scholastic standards and geographical distribution, explained Mr. Puelicher. The scholarship provides \$250 for the junior, senior or graduate student in business whose application is approved by a committee consisting of the president of the university, dean of the school of business administration and a banker to be named as the third member.

Burley secured the largest number of points at the district contest at Junction, thereby winning the district shield.

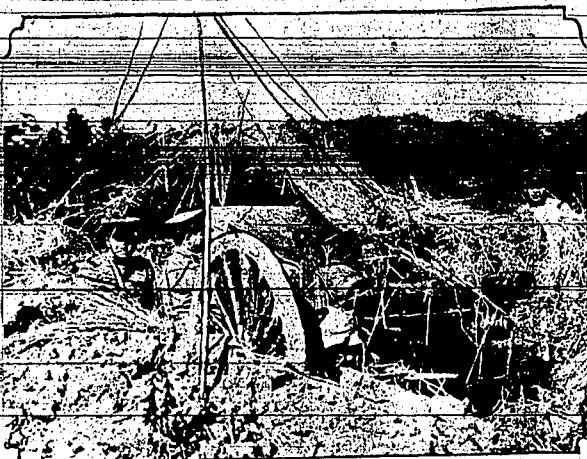

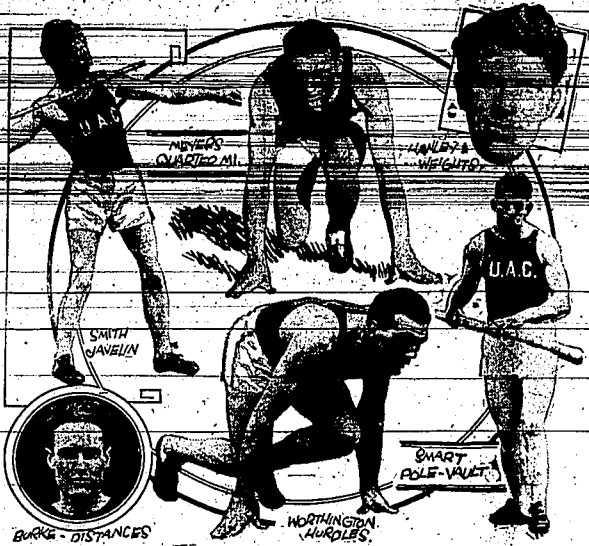

BUILDING BEGINS AT SOUTHERN BRANCH

Contractor Moves Equipment to Grounds to Start Work on \$147,500 Program.

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO—Southern branch, Pocatello, May 24.—With contracts signed last Saturday, J. W. Brennan construction company moved its equipment to the University of Idaho, southern branch grounds Monday and work involved in the 1928 building program began. J. P. Parsons, executive secretary of the University, Moscow, Mr. Brennan, Dr. M. F. Angell, executive dean of the branch, and Melvin Stevens of the department of public works were in Pocatello during the week-end going over the plans and final formal agreement was reached.

Mr. Parsons came to Pocatello from Boise where he attended a meeting of the state board of education at the time the school board reached the decision that the plans were perfect and that the contractor could begin work at once. Mr. Brennan and his company were awarded the contract for the construction work and the Gooding Plumbing and Hardware company received the contract for plumbing and heating. Equipment will be furnished by the Keewance Manufacturing company.

New Science Hall Total expenditure of present amounts to \$147,500, and will include the erection of a science hall, the remodeling of the old administration building third floor, the enlargement of the heating plant to accommodate a new boiler, the erection of a new smoke stack and the renovation of Paris hall, boys' dormitory, which is now partially occupied by the pharmacy and chemistry class rooms and laboratories.

The total cost of the new science hall, which will be a three storied brick and concrete structure, will be approximately \$114,000. Of this amount \$99,000 will be for construction, and \$15,000 for equipment. Twenty-five thousand dollars will be used in refitting the old administration building's third floor for use as classrooms, and for the construction of a new roof on the structure. Fifteen thousand dollars will be expended on the heating plant.

Completion of the structure and renovations of the other buildings will likely be completed before the opening of school next fall.

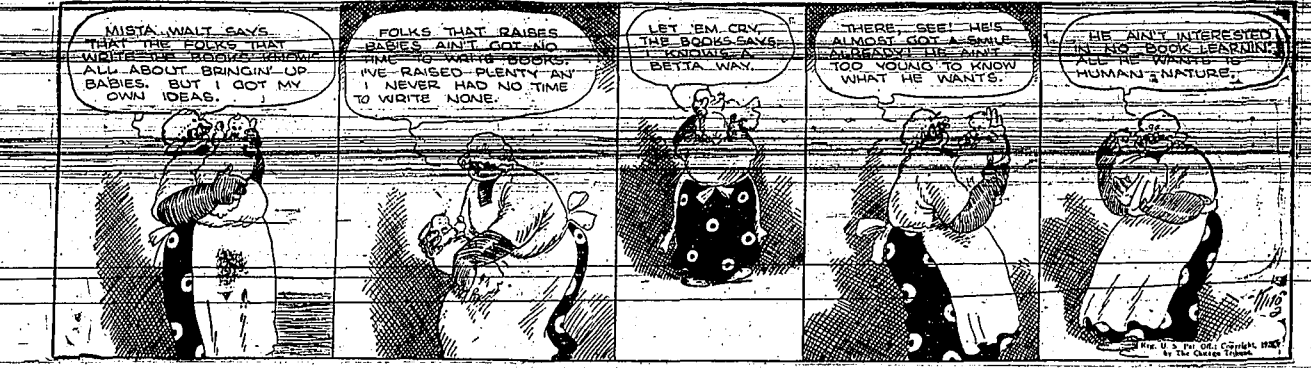

50,000 TROUT DIE IN REARING PONDS

Possibility That 1,250,000
Fingerling Fish in Hayspur
Hatchery May Be Destroyed.

Over 50,000 trout died in the
hatchery near Hayspur, may be de-
stroyed in the next two days and
there is a possibility that 1,250,000
fingerling trout in the Hayspur hatch-
ery may have to be destroyed, all as a
result of a bacterial infection which
broke out about three weeks ago. The
ravages of the disease were first
noticed in the Ada county rearing
ponds, according to W. M. Kell,
state fish commissioner, the disease
developing in a shipment from the
hatchery. About two weeks later the
disease was discovered among the
brook trout at Hayspur.

Workmen Careful
Since its discovery, great precau-
tions have been taken to prevent
spread of the disease to other sections
of the hatchery, workmen being care-
ful to disinfect their hands and all
implements before transferring their
activities from the infected rearing
troughs to the free sections.
According to Kell, the infection may
have been introduced in the Hayspur
hatchery by passing water fowl and
due to the lower temperature of the
water the disease developed more
slowly than in the warmer water at
the ponds operated here by the Ada
County. Fishes of same species and
Distribution of the present hatch of
brook trout at Hayspur will depend
upon whether the disease can be
checked. If it can, all brook trout
at the hatchery will be destroyed this
week in an attempt to prevent its
spread to the more than a million
rainbow trout.

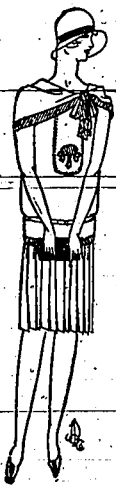

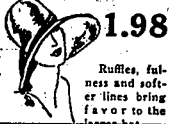

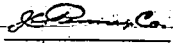
