A SANE CONVENTION. Outstanding features of the state convention of the Young Federation of Business and Professional Women's clubs which adjourned here Friday were the high plane on which matters of business and politics were conducted...

In these respects the convention set an example which political parties might follow with profit. There was a refreshing absence of bunk in the proceedings of the meeting. The legislative report presented by Mrs. Eva Deckery of Boise, put the stamp of approval on four measures: Increase of salary income tax exemption for single persons from \$1500 to \$3500 a year...

The last by inference recognized the necessity of maintenance of a military armament sufficient to defend the state against invasion. It is a successful operation. Submission of a constitutional amendment removing tax exemptions from all evidences of public indebtedness is endorsed.

All these questions are debatable, of course, but they are national and racial issues for consideration of men and women. Discussion of public questions of state-wide interest is recommended and special stress is laid on the necessity of studying the effect of the early constitutional motion picture placed before the people of Idaho for adoption or rejection at the election this fall.

The principal plank of general interest in the platform adopted, as distinguished from the legislative program previously approved, was a resolution asking that the matter of discrimination against older competent women be considered with a view of abolishing the evil, so far as it may exist by means of public utility.

The death of Alan Dale, New York dramatic critic and theatrical feature writer, brings to a close a career of more than passing interest. He was not a brilliant writer, in fact much of his matter was so utterly commonplace as to mitigate against the real merit of his articles.

LIBRARY INCREASES MEMBERSHIP CARDS AND TOTAL VOLUMES

Nine Thousand Books Are Now On Shelves. Number of Patrons Registered Grows 1367. Slight Circulation Decrease.

There were 607 more books in the Twin Falls public library May 1, 1928, than on a similar date in 1927, according to the annual report of Miss Jessie Prader, librarian, which has been filed with the library board. This actual increase in the number of volumes for circulation is 421. The total number of patrons registered in the library May 1, this year, a total of 166 volumes were re-bound. There are 22 volumes of four newspapers and receive six which are donated regularly. Sixty-three magazines are subscribed to and 24 are donated. Receipts at the library included \$301.90 from the pay sheet, \$53.50, county subscriptions and \$454.18 fines and collections.

The highest daily circulation of volumes for the year was 477. This does not include the day following the closing of the quarantine, when 604 books were taken out. The average daily circulation was 268 books for the year.

The circulation for the year shows a falling off amounting to 6922 volumes. The months which showed the greatest decrease, accounting for more than half of the total, were July, 1927, when the books were being moved to the rooms in the Elks building and the circulation fell off 2045 and April 1928 when the quarantine closed the library 10 days and reduced circulation 1522.

That the falling off of total circulation is not due to the change of location is indicated by the fact that there was a heavy decrease in May and June 1927 before the library was moved.

The May decrease amounted to 428, while the June decrease of 1108 was the heaviest of any month during the year. On the other hand, October, 1927 and January and March 1928 showed substantial increases in circulation over the previous year.

Chinchilla Rabbit Brings New and Promising Industry

Rabbit's Fur!



A three-piece suit which is made of kinko, the latest neck of modern inventiveness of modern textile manufacture—rabbit's fur even with silk! The material is soft as the felt of a kitten. The coat of this smart ensemble has stitched panels and a lined collar; the skirt's front pleating is stepped in the modern skyscraper manner.

That the raising of rabbits for food and fur is an industry ranked high in advance of it is the opinion of the breeders of the chinchilla rabbit in and around Twin Falls. The chinchilla rabbit is a new stock, very hardy and prolific, but expensive due to the scarcity of breeding stock in the United States. Silver-gray chinchilla rabbits are the pet of the most valuable fur on a woman's wardrobe.

Among the first chinchilla rabbits imported to Twin Falls county, was a shipment to A. N. Bonwell of Curry, from the Stah's Outdoor Enterprise company of Holmes Park, Missouri. These rabbits were purchased under the buy-back guarantee plan in which the original breeder guarantees to buy back the increase, thus protecting the purchaser. Starting one year ago with four rabbits, the Curry Rabbitry now houses some 140 inhabitants.

Two Sources of Revenue
To the raiser, the rabbit industry offers two sources of revenue—fur and meat. The pelts of the chinchilla rabbit are the most valuable animal skin from five to six months old and to insure the best possible condition of the fur, the rabbits are shipped to Chicago. The A. B. Shubert company of Chicago is one of the representative buyers in this district.

same family as the jerboa, and both are great jumpers. They jump not with all four feet, but with the hind legs only like the kangaroo, and their tails help to balance them. Chinchillas are an extremely clean animal and after burrowing in the dirt will come out in the open and wash themselves as does the domestic cat.

Chicago, August 28, 1928. Mr. Chapman says that he has a lower level than his native elevation of about 11,000 feet where the temperature never tops 90 degrees and where it remains for months at 20 below zero.

Mr. Chapman was sent to South America by the American Fur company to take charge of the Porcupilla mine in Chile, as mine foreman. Here he learned of the chinchilla, and later purchased a pair from a native hunter for two hundred dollars. He studied the animal and in the end of five years had twelve under domestication.

In 1923 Mr. Chapman decided to bring his charges to California, and under a special permit from the United States biological survey, landed the small colony—the cost of any one of which is worth a king's ransom. A hundred skins are needed to make a coat, and the colony is still numbered at less than a hundred.

"I'll never kill one," Chapman says, "and those pelts you see are from the one I lost in South America and a couple that have since died of pneumonia." Mr. Chapman sells the animals for breeding stock only. The first two pairs he sold for six thousand dollars, but the last pair went at ten thousand. The price of males is now up to nine thousand dollars and females five thousand dollars each.

Fur Chief Value
The greatest value to the chinchilla raiser, however, lies in the market for the fur. This fur is a very good imitation of the genuine chinchilla fur when properly processed, and like any good fur is used for trimming, collars, and all places where a much less expensive than its namecase from South America.

O. E. Booth of the Booth Mercantile company, states that he is unfamiliar with the chinchilla rabbit fur, but that he sees no reason why it will not be a profitable field for although the chinchilla is not in style just now, any good imitation in the less expensive fur should be highly salable.

There are several raisers of the chinchilla rabbits in the vicinity of Twin Falls. A. N. Bonwell of Curry has probably the longest rabbitry to date. E. R. Sherman, toll master at the new bridge, is an enthusiastic rabbit raiser, as is Mr. Bassett, also residing north of town.
