THREE EXPEDITIONS WILL BEGIN SEARCH FOR MISSING ITALIA

Ronald Amundsen and Captain Sverdrup Among Men Pitting Knowledge of Inhospitalable Arctic Against Catastrophe

(By The Associated Press) OSLO, Norway, May 19—Three expeditions with a fourth in prospect were under way tonight in an effort to find the drifting Italia, now missing more than three days after her successful flight to the North pole.

Based among the men pitting their knowledge of the inhospitable polar regions against the disaster which may have overtaken General Umberto Nobile, the expedition is headed by Ronald Amundsen, noted polar authority, and Captain Otto Sverdrup, famous for an Arctic explorer, who are giving their counsel to the Norwegian government in preparing for an extensive relief expedition.

While the ship, the Citta di Milano was held up outside of Kings bay by ice floes that blocked her progress and the steamship Brattvaag was en route from Tromsø, Norway to Spitzbergen to help in the search, Lieutenant Lovelock Holm, Norwegian flying expert, took off in a Norwegian heavy-bomber airplane from the Horten base for Tromsø. Lieutenant Holm planned to reach the sealers' huts and load his plane aboard her for a quick voyage to Spitzbergen.

In accordance with the theory of Captain Ritter-Larsen, who probably will head the main Norwegian relief expedition, that the Italia came down upon ice somewhere north of Spitzbergen, the expedition will explore the north and northeast coasts of Spitzbergen. Every meteorological condition indicated that the Italia may have drifted south of her base in Captain Larsen's opinion and an air survey of this district appears to be the best prospect of finding the missing airship.

Radio maintains vigil SAN FRANCISCO, May 19 (AP)—The Italian dirigible Italia might have flown or floated across the North pole to the Alaskan or eastern Siberian coast, according to a report.

RIOTERS WHO WERE AT THE HOME OF THE BROTHERS TODAY AND WERE RECORDED. Foot police, with fixed bayonets and mounted police with swords chased student rioters through the streets and arrested 40.

DOZEN FIRES BURN IN IDAHO FORESTS

BOISE, May 18 (AP)—Nearly a dozen fires were burning in the Boise and Payette forests tonight and lightning was doing its best to increase that number. It is reported in this morning's Mains said. In addition to these eight fires were reported in from the Payette forest farther north.

"It looks bad for later on in the summer," Mains said. "Ordinarily you couldn't start a fire in the forests at this time of year if you tried. It makes you wonder what is going to happen in July and August."

WASHINGTON, May 18 (AP)—Gaining a new lease of life by failure of the senate to agree on an adjournment date for congress, the Boulder dam bill was being fought in the senate tonight with the long awaited filibuster in full swing and the battle on.

POSSES LOSE TRAIL OF BANDIT BAND IN KANSAS; HUNT ENDS

Gunmen, Who Slew Three Persons, Completely Evade 1000 Searchers in Man-Hunt Unparalleled in Western History

(By The Associated Press) SCOTT CITY, Kas., May 18—Losing the trail of the bandit band that took three lives in a reckless dash for freedom after slaying the National bank manager, Colorado, last Wednesday, organized posse today abandoned the search for the fugitives in the arroyo of west Kansas.

Evade 1000 Searchers The gunmen who killed A. N. Parrish, 77-year-old president of the bank, his son John P. Parrish, the cashier, and Dr. W. W. Wininger, Dighton, Kansas, whom they abducted, apparently had completely evaded more than 1000 searchers who combed scores of square miles of land almost unparalleled in western history.

Occasional clues still were being run down by the state's officers and the latest of these caused a small posse to start a search in the vicinity of Sheridan Lake, Colorado, this afternoon, but brought no results.

Officers virtually gave up hope that Everett A. Keatinger, assistant cashier of the bank whom the bandits carried away as a hostage, would be found alive. No trace of him has been found since the robbery.

JURY IN IDAHO FALLS EXONERATES POLICEMAN

IDAHO FALLS, May 18 (AP)—William J. Duffy, Idaho police sergeant, was exonerated by a jury for killing Theo Duffy, Dufray was shot by Hayward Friday and died Saturday.

CONGRESS WITHOUT ADJOURNMENT DATE

Vice President Dumbo Breaks Tie Vote to Defeat Lower House's Resolution on Day.

WASHINGTON, May 18 (AP)—The senate put the question of adjournment tonight and the resolution introduced by Senator Dumbo today and he passed it right back, breaking a 40 to 40 tie to defeat the house resolution, fixing P. M. tomorrow as go-away time. This left congress without any adjournment date.

The senate earlier had turned down by narrow margins two amendments to the house resolution. Both were sponsored by Senator Johnson, Republican, California. The first was rejected, 41 to 39, and the second 42 to 38.

SENATE COMMITTEE GOES INTO RECORD OF CAPITAL EDITOR

Service of Frank J. Hale, Publisher of Politics, as Prohibition Officer Comes in for Scrutiny of Investigators.

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, May 18—The senate campaign funds committee dug a little today into the record of Frank J. Hale, editor of the Washington magazine, Politics, during his service as a prohibition officer, and was told that he had the man who investigated him for the job, soon afterward showed signs of assistance.

The testimony concerning Hale, whose magazine is opposing the Republican presidential candidacy of Herbert Hoover, came from Master Walter Willbrandt, assistant attorney general, concerned with prohibition cases. She informed the committee that two separate investigations had been made of Hale's activities and was promised that the committee would come out "if it was halted."

WAR VETERAN GETS LIFE TERM FOR SLAYING SONS

VALLEJO, Calif., May 18 (AP)—On a plea of guilty of murdering his two young sons, George Allen Christolm placed himself upon the mercy of the court today and was sentenced to life imprisonment.

Judge Grant Crumpacker, of the superior court, heard the plea and sentenced the day listening to evidence offered in mitigation before pronouncing the sentence. The 35-year-old Canadian war veteran maintained he was suffering from wounds received in France, affecting his mentality, and Judge Crumpacker, in laying the life term instead of the death penalty sought by the state, said:

"No man could do as Christolm did and be normal."

REEF IN LAKE GIVES UP SAUL'S BODIES

Officials Have Grim Explanation of Disappearance of Freighter and Crew of 22.

SAULT STE MARIE, May 18 (AP)—The reefs of Isle Royale, in Lake Superior, have yielded the wreckage of a steamship and the bodies of two members of her lost crew of 22 to give a grim explanation of the disappearance of the Canadian freighter last December of the Canadian pack freighter Kamloops.

One of the bodies was identified as that of J. Dourneault, Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario. The other body had not been identified. A further search of the shores of the island is being made in the hope of finding additional bodies.

The fate of the Kamloops and her crew of 20 men and two women had been a mystery since the steamer, built for the Hudson Bay company, was seen to disappear in the churning icy waters of the lake during a terrific storm last December 3.

The bodies were found in the freighter Quebec, had cleared Sault Ste. Marie a short time before being caught in the ice which wrought havoc to lake shipping.

ONE CAUSES \$4500 LOSS TO FRED FOSS

Flames Originate Near Steam Tank Located in Rear of Basement; Blaze Burns Stubbornly for One Hour and a Half.

Fire, which originated in the basement of the Fred Foss building at 221-223 second avenue south at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon and burned stubbornly for an hour and a half, caused an estimated damage of \$4500 before being brought under control by firemen. The loss is covered by insurance.

Flames originated near a steam tank located in the rear of the east half of the basement. The building is a dual structure, the west half being occupied by the automobile top and upholstery store operated by Fred Foss, Jr., and the east half by the saddlery shop operated by Fred Foss, Sr.

Kerosene Cause of Fire Kerosene was used to heat the boiler of the steam system employed in the vulcanizing. While the exact origin of the flames was not determined, Mr. Foss, Jr., stated that apparently the flames started in this oil heater.

Three persons were in the building when the fire started. R. L. Ferrer, employed by Fred Foss, Jr., had been working at the rear of the auto shop and was called to the office at the front to answer the telephone. Upon his return to the back of the room he saw smoke pouring through cracks about the door to the basement. When he opened the door he was driven back by a sheet of flames. Rushing to the fire station immediately across the street, he summoned Mr. Foss, Sr. and an employe, J. W. Stevenson, who were at the rear of the east half of the building, discovered the fire at about the same time.

Firemen responded immediately, laying the fire hose and cutting down the flames. The fire was extinguished by the water, but the damage to the building was done by an automobile boiler and the stove.

Auto shop near head burn An auto shop which was in the shop for repairs was damaged slightly. This machine had already gone through a fire and was a total loss and suffered little from a trophy of flames. (Continued on Page Two)

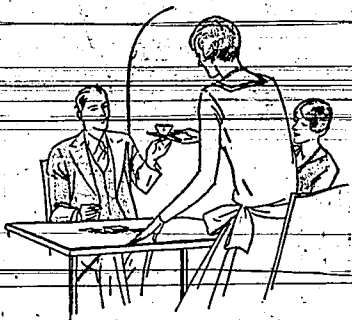

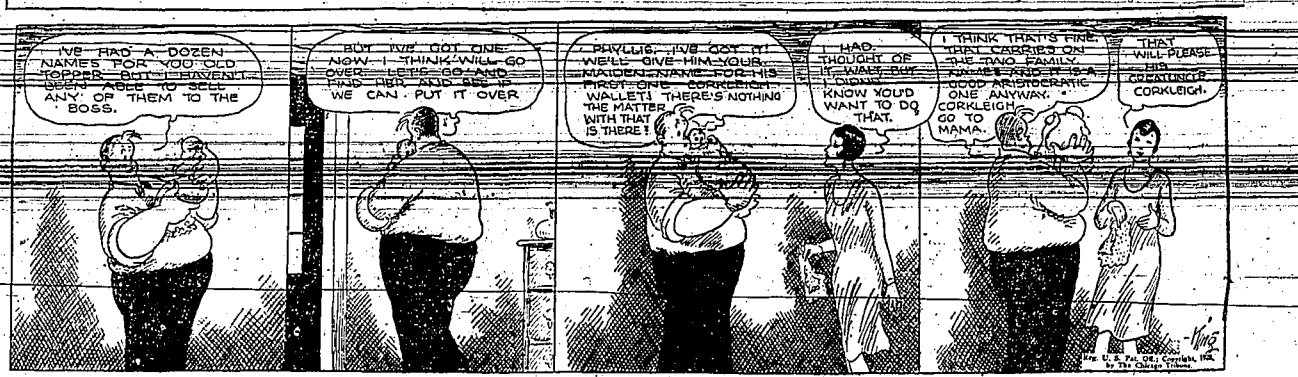

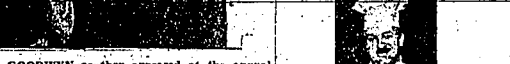
