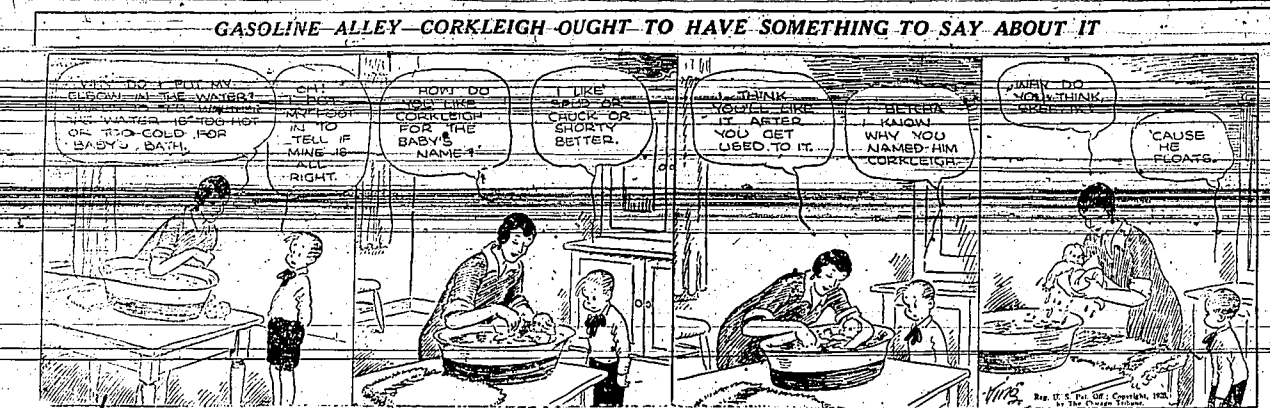
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RAY MAKES GRADE AS MARATHONER

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BREAK IN MURTAUGH CANAL IS CLOSING

Large Force of Men Are at Work Night and Day to Prepare for Delivery of Water.

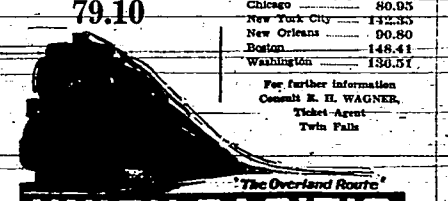
