

NOBILE UNABLE TO ATTRACT ATTENTION

Three Times in Few Days Ice-
bound Explorers See Help in
Gray Arctic Skies; Each Time
It Passes By; Hunt Goes On.

KINGS BAY, Spitzbergen, June 10
(AP)—Three times in three days General Umberto Nobile and his stranded comrades of the Italia have seen help in the form of the arctic sea and three times they have seen that help pass them by.

—Small dark blotches, that they are on the vastness of the arctic ice fields, over the keen eyes of the aviators.

—It is 10 to 15 miles from the ice pinnacles of ice heaps General Nobile and those with him have signaled, gesticulated, called in vain. Once the planes had been near the spot at other time less than two kilometers (slightly more than a mile) away, to-day it is only known that the rescuers are within 10 to 15 miles.

GEM STATE BANKERS ASSEMBLE IN BOISE

Governor Baldridge Lauds Support Given His Administration by 135 Banks in Idaho

BOISE, June 19 (AP)—BANK stocks are taxed out of line with other kinds of property and court action may be necessary to correct the condition, it was declared in a report of the taxation committee of the Idaho Bankers' association, in convention here today.

The convention opened this morning with an address of welcome by Governor H. C. Baldridge who lauded the support given his administration by the 135 banks represented in the association.

Other speakers on the day's pro-

gram included Walter F. Hansen, president of the association; T. J. Helund, vice president of Burley National bank; Sherman Coffin, secretary of the Idaho Rate association, and Will H. Gibson, president of the public utilities commission.

Urges Modern Service

In his annual address, President Hansen advised bankers to avoid going to seed on banking principles. Modern conditions of living demand modern banking service, he said, and pointed out especially the value of proper advertising.

"Forget some of your dignity if it means the sale of your publicity to the public," he said.

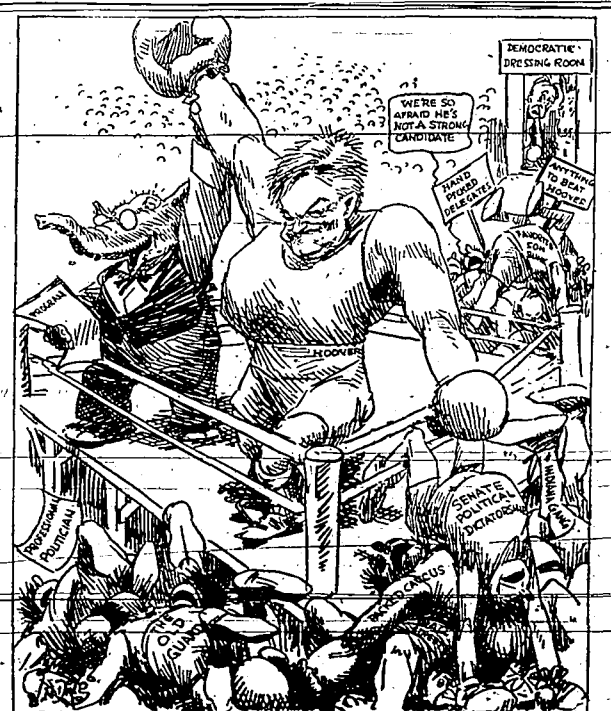
WEST VIRGINIA STORM

MOVE OLD STEEL SPAN TO BRIDGE DEEP CREEK

Iron off the bridge that formerly spanned Dead Man's gulch near Twin Falls will be moved today to the abutments of the old bridge across Deep creek through which the Twin Falls Canal company's big dredger dropped a couple of months ago. When these are in place, the dredger will be run across and if it doesn't fall into the creek again, or cause dangerous strain in the structure, the bridge will be accepted by the Duluth highway district.

FOREST TREE LAND EXEMPT FROM TAX

Spots on Farm Unfit for Growing Crops Can Be Used to Develop Trees, Says Expert.

According to a law passed in the land, unfit for the growing of annual crops but capable of growing nut-bearing, hardwood and other merchantable forest trees, is exempt from taxation for a period of ten years, providing the area planted to forest trees does not exceed 20 acres and the woodlot is managed and cared for properly. Justice A. M. Sawyer, extension forester, yesterday, in the office of R. E. Broadard, county agricultural agent, where he makes his headquarters. "This should be an added incentive for the farmers of Twin Falls county to utilize fully the rough, rocky or off-color portions of their farms. Application for this exemption should be made to the state university of Idaho, Moscow."

"There are a great many southern Idaho farmers who could readily benefit by taking advantage of this law and it is especially desirable since the federal government assists them in securing the tree stock for such plantings at half the cost of production when secured from the state nursery at Moscow. In fact, the farmers of this section cannot afford to allow
