STATE FIXES DATE TO AWARD CONTRACT FOR SOUTH HIGHWAY

Commissioner of Public Works Announces Definite Action Toward Completion of Remaining Link in Nevada Road.

Contract for construction of five miles of road to complete construction of the Sawtooth highway between the Nevada state line and Wells, will be advertised for letting at Boise next July 17, according to advices from the office of the state commissioner of public works received here yesterday by John W. Graham.

Construction of this portion of the highway has been delayed to permit resurvey of the road in Nevada in which it will connect at the state boundary. Announcement of the date for letting the contract indicates that the Nevada road builders have completed their surveys, and it is known that construction work is being pushed in Nevada, so that, with the completion of the remaining link in Idaho, a completed highway between Twin Falls and Wells, Nevada, seems assured for the opening of the 1929 season.

One Link Completed.

Road builders in Idaho, under contract awarded to C. A. Robinson, Twin Falls contractor, completed last week the construction of 12 miles of road on this highway, the new work extending to the north end of the link that remains to be constructed. Cracks of rock were used for surfacing of the road just completed.

Federal government funds have been allocated for construction of this road, which is regarded throughout southern Idaho as one of its most important highways. It will afford a direct route between Twin Falls and Wells, Idaho, and already has been designated the Yellowstone-Rosemead highway because it affords the most direct route between the two great national parks.

Nevada's Projects

Nevada road builders, now engaged in building the road north to the state line from Wells, where it connects with the Victory highway route between Salt Lake and San Francisco, are promoting a program for extension of the road southward to Ely to effect junction with a transcontinental highway leading to Los Angeles and southern California.

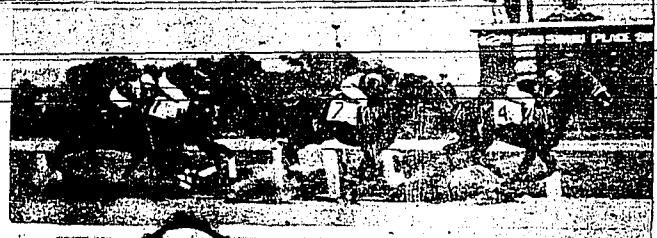

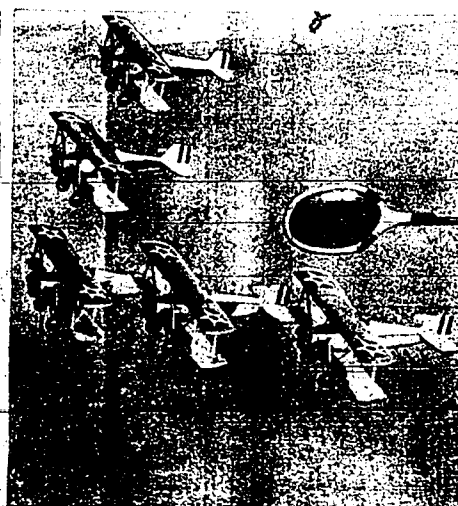

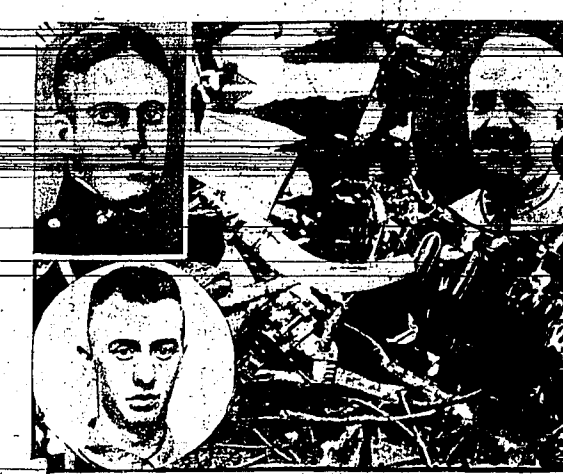

HEBREW UNIVERSITY AT JERUSALEM RISES WHERE IT US STOOD

Canny Scot Bringing Back to Ancient City of Palestine Many That Once Belonged to Solomon; Huge Buildings.

(By The Associated Press)

JERUSALEM, June 30—A canny Scot is bringing back to Jerusalem the glory that was Solomon's.

As the huge buildings of the new Hebrew university rise one by one in the top of Mount Scopus, overlooking the Kidron valley, the 73-year-old figure of Professor Patrick Geddes, becomes more and more familiar to the inhabitants of the city of David. They have compared him to Socrates, Aristotle, Pythagoras and other philosophers of ancient times.

The university is celebrating the first decade of its existence. Probably the only university was born under stranger circumstances. The cornerstone was laid in 1918 when the site was surrounded by British troops and guns and Mount Scopus, Samaria and Carmel were still held by the Turks.

Professor Geddes was chosen by Zionist leaders to build the university for them, and he pushed the work forward with such insistence, despite obstacles, that Lord Balfour was able to open the first section in 1925.

The university has risen on the exact spot where the Emperor Titus directed the Romans in their assault on Jerusalem, which ended in the destruction of the city.

The grand design has been so designed that it is in harmony with the two daughter religions, Christian and Islam, and with the sanctities of the Holy Sepulchre and the Mosque of Omar.

The Einstein Institute for mathematics and physics research is virtually finished. The department of Hebrew studies, the administration building and the great hall are nearing completion.

The Jewish national library, a section of the university, which started with 25,000 volumes, now has several hundred thousand.

Professor Geddes, who has built universities at Hyderabad and Benares, India, has his own ideas on education. He favors a system of estimation that is examination-free, whereby students will be judged, according to Professor Geddes, "not on what they have managed to memorize for the time being, but on their ability to analyze the subjects they have been taught."

Turkish Village Stops Smoking

TAZLAR, Turkey, June 30—The Yellow Crescent Anti-Tobacco society is pouring propaganda on the curious head of the sole remaining adherent of the "bubble-bubble" in this village of seven hundred, who recently took a wholesale smokeless oath.

This is the first village in Turkey to renounce tobacco, the renunciation being the growth not only of the new Yellow Crescent society's activities, but also of the attitude of quietism sweeping over the peninsula as a result of the new regime's tolerance of wine-bibbling—other unorthodox practices.

The one recalcitrant calmly sucks the amber mouthpiece of his narghile, replying to all arguments that he will continue to smoke until his death not only for the solace of his soul, but also as a patriotic duty, tobacco being a state monopoly and an important source of revenue of the young republic.

\$300,000 GIRLS' HOTEL DEVELOPS FROM INVESTMENT OF TINY SUM

KANSAS CITY, Mo., June 30—The growth of a \$300,000 "humanitarian investment" into a \$300,000 debt-free girls' hotel, is the reward that has accrued to the club women of Kansas City.

Impressed with the need of working girls receiving low wages for a suitable place to live, a small group of club women got together 25 years ago and, with \$300 on hand, rented three rooms, cleaned and furnished them, and accepted their first tenants. They cooked the simple meals themselves on an elf stove, with the help of the girls when they could give the time.

The three rooms were soon overflowing, and larger quarters were obtained with the aid of various citizens. Expansion continued, and today the project has grown into the Girls' hotel at 1805 Jefferson street, comfortably furnished, with attractive surroundings, and accommodating 125 persons.

The project from the start has been under the supervision of the Council of Clubs of Kansas City, which is a part of the General Federation of Women's Clubs and is headed by Mrs. Mason C. Alderman. The council now comprises 54 clubs, having a total membership of 15,000, and employs a manager, who is also hostess and "house mother," to take charge of the hotel.

The rates for accommodations depend on the girls' ability to pay, ranging usually from 12 to 45 cents for a room and board. The girls, however, is turned away because they cannot pay, and last year service to the amount of \$3,527 was given to needy girls.

Some of the girls who attend part time school, night school or high school are employed in the hotel, dining room, thereby earning their board and lodging, and their clothing is provided by members of the "angel" one or more girls pending graduation and employment.

The hotel itself offers opportunities for advancement in music, art and sewing. Parties are provided where the girls may entertain their young men friends, and last year several of them married and went into homes of their own.

"It is not a self-sustaining institution and perhaps never can be," Mrs. Alderman has observed. "I don't think we would lose a great deal of our incentive to work if the hotel were on a paying basis. The joy of service is the only reward, and it is a great one."

FRENCH REVISE LAWS REGARDING MARRIAGES

PARIS, June 30—Simultaneously with the tightening of the regulations covering the divorcing of foreigners by the French courts, the ministry of justice has issued instructions that greater attention must be paid to marriage matters.

This is proving somewhat costly to American lawyers in Paris and on the Riviera, who have made a specialty of handling all the details of a French civil marriage on brief notice. In many cases which have been brought to the attention of the "procureur general" the necessary banns apparently have never been published, birth certificates have not been provided and in the case of divorced persons the extracts of the divorce court's decree have not been filed.

At considerable cost to clients lawyers have had marriages performed within twenty-four hours after the arrival of the parties in France, whereas the law calls for residence of twenty-one days and at least eight days open publication of banns.

Mayors have now been advised that all marriage returns are to be closely reviewed and in cases where the law has not been complied with the right of the ministry of justice to annul marriages will be exercised.

NO NEW SCENERY FOR CURTIS IF VICTORIOUS

KANSAS CITY, June 30—If Senator Charles Curtis is elected to the vice-presidency next November he won't even get a change of scenery from his office.

MONSTER FESTIVAL TO HONOR SCHUBERT

Singers From All Parts of World Gathering in Vienna to Commemorate Anniversary

VIENNA, June 30—Singers from all parts of the world are gathering in Vienna to commemorate the hundredth anniversary of the death of Franz Peter Schubert, composer of some of the world's most beautiful songs. It was in November, 1828, that Schubert died in Vienna, but the celebrations in honor of his memory and genius begin many months in advance of that date and will last throughout the year.

The principal feature of the celebration will be a monster congregation of Austrian, German, Polish, American and other singers from July 19 to 22. No less than 70,000 chorists will crowd into the vast concert-hall in the environs of Vienna, which has been specially built for the occasion, while an additional 50,000 chorists will gather outside the hall to participate in the mighty tribute of songs to Austria's great master of melody.

Several hundred singing societies in the United States will send delegates.

Dying in poverty and obscurity at the age of 35, Schubert's genius remained unrecognized for half a century.

Delegates' Badges Command Premium

KANSAS CITY, June 30—Badges which were worn by delegates and officials at the Republican national convention here are sought by persons willing to pay fancy prices, but at that they can't be bought.

When the last session was adjourned June 15, a swarm of souvenir hunters—men, women and children—swamped down upon the badge wearers and tried to beg, borrow, or leave with the coveted article.

Most of the badge wearers, however, were reluctant to part with the decorations and few hunters were successful in their quest.

BURLEY CALLS FOR CONSTRUCTION OF OLD OREGON TRAIL

Chamber of Commerce Resolves to Make Emphatic Request for Completion of Highway Before Other Roads Are Built

BURLEY, June 30.—A resolution passed by the Chamber of Commerce requesting early grading and opening of the Old Oregon Trail was introduced Thursday to Joe D. Wood, state highway commissioner.

The resolution recites that it has come to the knowledge of the petitioners that the department of public works is being urged to construct a new highway from American Falls to the north side of Snake river before the Oregon Trail is completed and opened.

The resolution then sets forth that it appears that completion of the Oregon Trail and state highway is being retarded, that the highway districts through which the present state highway, which corresponds with the Old Oregon Trail, have voted to begin construction of this highway; that the petitioners believe that the old highway is the feasible route; and they therefore urge and emphatically request that the department of public works finish and open all sections of the Old Oregon Trail as now located before undertaking the construction of secondary roads.

Feeling Aroused

Considerable feeling has been aroused on both sides of Snake river between proponents and opponents of the proposed diverting of east and west traffic from the Old Oregon Trail to a new highway to be constructed on the north side of the river. Many of the residents professing to live on the highway as an entering wedge to abandon through traffic on the present state highway—Old Oregon Trail, and route it over a new highway through Rupert, Jerome and Gooding to Bliss, or along the Oregon Short Line tracks from American Falls to Gooding.
