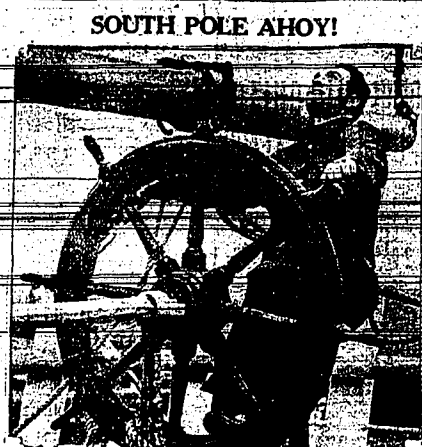

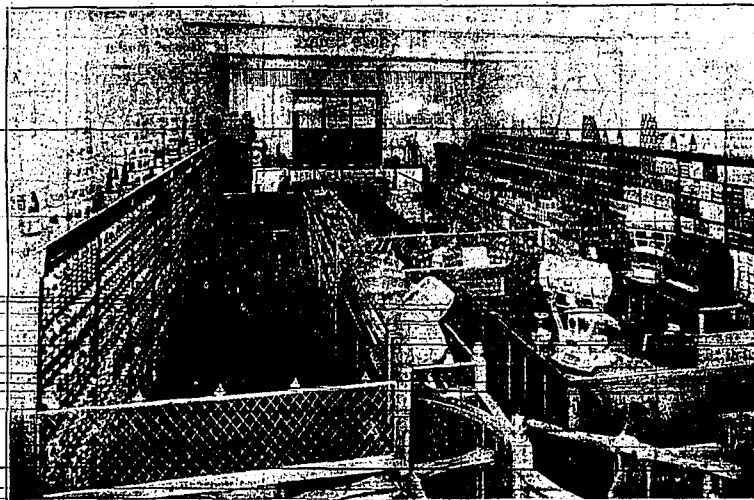



HOSPITAL EARNS

ALMOST \$10,000

DURING JUNE

More Than Two-Thirds of Sum

Is in Cash; Number of Pat-

ients Increase During Period

More Girls Than Boys Born.

Twin Falls county general hospital earnings last month amounted to \$9,749.49; cash received \$6,249.28; notes taken totaled \$1,714.04; and a total of \$1,776.17 was claimed for county cases, and \$702.71 for indigents, according to the report filed by Miss Georgia Maxwell, superintendent.

One hundred and twenty-seven patients were admitted into the hospital during the month, while 123 were discharged, according to the report. There were 40 patients in when the month opened and 44 when it closed. Of those admitted 19 were O. B. cases; 33 medical and 75 surgical.

There were 46 males and 81 females admitted during the month. There were seven deaths of which six were medical and one surgical. Four boys and five girls were born at the hospital during June. There were 50 major and 21 minor operations. There were 23 applications of x-rays. The average number of patients was 46. There were 39 people employed and 13 indigents in the home.

MORTGAGE HOLDER BUYS APARTMENTS

Agent for Portland Investor Bids in Reed Property for \$45,733 Plus Back Taxes.

The Reed Apartments, corner of Shoshone street and Ninth avenue north, constructed eight years ago by W. G. Reed at an announced cost of \$110,000, was sold at receiver's sale here yesterday to T. M. Robertson, agent for R. C. Little of Portland, for \$45,733. The purchaser, who held the mortgage upon the property, assumed liability for payment of delinquent taxes bringing the total purchase price up to approximately \$54,000.

Only one bid was received at the sale, which was conducted at the court house by R. P. Parry, attorney for the receiver, trustee and the W. G. Reed bankruptcy estate.

Terms of the sale provided for payment of the full amount of the purchase price in cash on July 15.

The building is a substantially built brick structure comprising 32 apartments. It occupies a "choice" location, and since its opening eight years ago it has never lacked for tenants.

The building was completed shortly before Mr. Reed moved to California where he has since made his home.

DEATH SUMMONS WOMAN PIONEER OF TWIN FALLS

Word of the death last Sunday of Mrs. Charles E. Cole, an early day resident of Twin Falls who had lived for 29 years past in Los Angeles, was received here yesterday. She was 72 years old. Death followed illness of several weeks. Interment was in Forest-Lake cemetery, California, last Tuesday.

One of the first settlers of Twin Falls, Mrs. Cole with her family, came to Twin Falls in 1904. She resided in 1908 to Los Angeles where Mr. Cole's death occurred nearly three years ago.

Mrs. Cole was born, Addie J. Reed, in Cleveland, Ohio, on August 4, 1856, and was married to Mr. Cole in December, 1880.

## CALLS FOR SAFE KEEPING OF AMERICAN NATIONAL HERITAGE

The nation regarded in American history as the "our heritage and our trust," Robert D. Leeper of Lewiston, past commander of the Idaho American Legion department, said in a speech at the annual Fourth of July address here Wednesday.

He urged that the American people should be taught to respect the faith of those who gave us eternal principles of the dignity and worth of the American people.

"The nation," the speaker had said, "is something above and beyond any individual; it is the sum total of all activities of all the Americans who have ever lived. It is more than any officer who is administering it for it is the fruit of the efforts of all those who have given it service. The nation is not the army; it is the plant watered by the blood of millions who have died in its defense. It is a spiritual force, flowering of the spirit of man, which includes in its wide scope every noble thought uttered in its upbuilding, every heroic deed done in carrying on the national life, every great decision achieved by its leaders, every utterance of its scholars, every dream of its poets."

Old Time Americans

Mr. Leeper confessed a measure of admiration for certain independence day orators of other days. "Your old frontiersman," he said, "sauting to the skies his equality on the Fourth of July, asserting his right to free speech, keeping his ballot pure and living and dying with some reverend candidate for office, is the foundation stone on which America has been built. He is a far more vital, far more significant figure in our national life than is our modern man, circumspect, careful to associate only with the right people, speaking only of money matters, seeking preferment and honors not by the maintenance of everlasting truths, but by a mere guileless toward institutions and leaders who have no place in our national life."

Colorful pageant of the national life was reviewed in graphic terms of appreciation in the eloquent periods of Mr. Leeper's address, the scope of his survey extending to Marcus Whitman's celebration of the first Fourth of July on the Pacific coast, and the march of the pioneers over the Old Oregon Trail and the first
