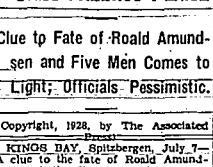

THE DECENT NINE-TENTHS

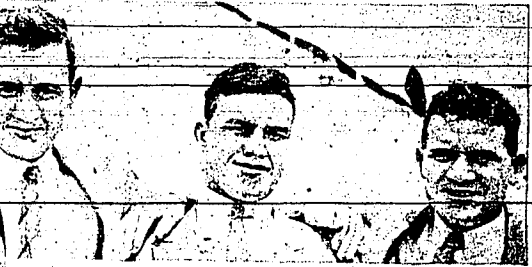

IDAHO'S MOTHERS AND BABES GET ATTENTION

All of Idaho's 44 counties have had maternity and infancy work since the state's acceptance of the maternity and infancy act in 1922, and during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1927, such work was carried on in 42 of the counties. This information is a part of the annual report of the administration of the Sheppard-Howard fund, which is the state's contribution to the United States department of labor. Statistical studies made by the state during the last fiscal year indicate a lower infant mortality rate in 1926 than in 1925. The figures for maternal death suggest a declining rate in maternal mortality also, the report states. Charts were made showing the infant and maternal mortality by county. A state-wide survey and birth registration campaign during the year resulted in the signing of 10,400 to the United States birth registration area. Other accomplishments during the year include the conducting by physicians of 96 health conferences at which nearly 4,000 infants and preschool children were examined, 3,200 of whom were found to have defects; approximately 500 home visits by nurses, who gave instruction on maternal, infant and child care; a campaign work for the promotion of breast feeding; and a survey of the hospitals throughout the state. A state-wide effort was made of midwives. All those practicing in the state have been reached by visits

or letters and they were not required to comply with the state law regarding the practice of midwifery. This has resulted in the elimination of poorly trained midwives. The work of the Idaho bureau of child hygiene during the year reached 17,492 infants and preschool children and approximately 400 prospective mothers. Infants born in the state during the year numbered 9612. Public health nurses were employed by three counties as a result of the bureau's work. Organizations cooperating with the bureau of child hygiene last year included the state medical societies, the state association of women, the state federation of women's clubs, state legislative council of women, American Red Cross, Women's Christian Temperance Union, two prominent church relief societies and the parent-teacher association.

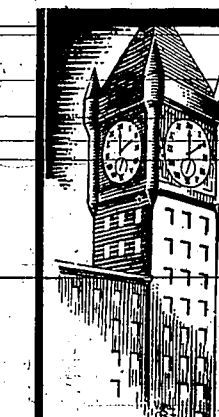

BIRD'S VISIT RESULTS IN-BUILDING OF HAVEN

WILKWOOD—The first of the week for a bird that each year came to sing for her on Memorial Day led Mrs. John Franklin Tyler of Kirkwood to undertake a study of feathered songsters and establish a haven for them at which more than 75 different species now gather yearly. "For two or three years," Mrs. Tyler said, "I have been studying the habits of birds and their nesting habits. Each year it came, and my curiosity finally prompted me to seek the bird who was a rose-breasted grosbeak and when my eyes took in the beauty of the singer I determined to found a haven for birds. "I set to work and found a small bird house atop a store building and in the box were a dozen shining black birds, and I was told by a neighbor that I soon learned they were Purple Martins."

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PRODUCTION OF GRAIN ADVANCES ARGENTINA IN WORLD STANDING

Southern Nation With 43,000,000 Acres of Wheat and Corn Is One of Chief Competitors on Markets; Product Good

(By The Associated Press.)
BUENOS AIRES, July 7.—Vast pampas, realm of the gaucho and his thundering herd, no longer mock man's fight for grain and today the Argentine, with 43,000,000 acres of wheat and corn, is one of the chief competitors in the markets of the world.

As in the years long past, cattle raising still is Argentina's foremost agricultural enterprise. Her beef industry dominates European markets, and her dairy products exert an important influence on the relation of American and foreign butter prices. But the trend toward grain production has been rapid. In 1927 Argentina's agricultural exports were half as much again in value as in 1923. Wheat has superseded corn as the most important cash crop of the country. Argentine corn competes in world markets with the exports of the United States and the American corn crop is short. Among wheat-producing countries Argentina is seventh, but in wheat export is second only by the United States and Canada.

The brief "squeeze" in money rate was the direct result of the mid-year settlements and the heavy holiday demand for funds. Stock prices proke on the 10 per cent money rate but rallied briskly when the rate dropped again and then continued to climb on Wall Street's interpretation of the new treasury uttering of no permanent tightening of credit and a great of favorable trade news.

Leading commodity markets were reactionary on selling inspired by the more favorable crop news. Wheat dropped 3 to 4 cents a bushel. More farm land is to be had. Much land in large estates is used either for pasture or is held out of use altogether. Less favorable climatic conditions in other parts of the country make expansion of the cereal zone a slow process in spite of cheap land.

NEW YORK, July 7 (AP)—The announcement of long term government financing on a 3 1/2 per cent basis, a temporary credit stringency which sent call money to 10 per cent on Monday, and back to 5 on the next day, the lowest volume of new bond offerings in two years, an increase of \$147,000,000 in brokers' loans and the resumption of the upward movement of stock prices were the highlights in this week's financial markets.

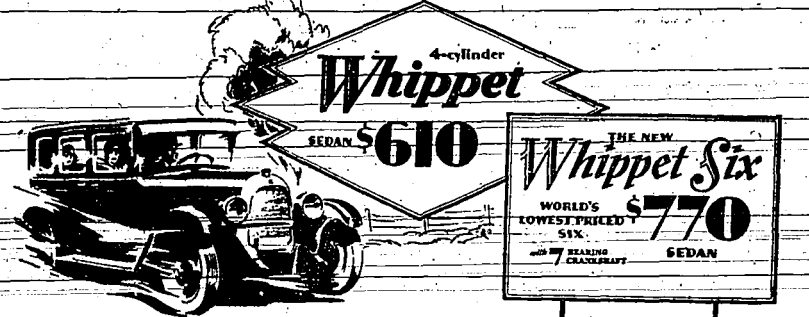

The dairy demonstration train is operated to carry to farmers of the state latest suggestions and information on methods which the investigation divisions of the University of Idaho—college of agriculture—holders will be the greatest aid to Idaho dairymen who hope to make this state the western leader in the industry.

Production Makes Leap The train is carrying to the people of the state data on the extent to which Idaho dairying has expanded since 1918. The production of butter has mounted 391 per cent during the period while the volume of these manufactured products has gone up 249 per cent, condensed milk 99 per cent, and ice cream 62 per cent.

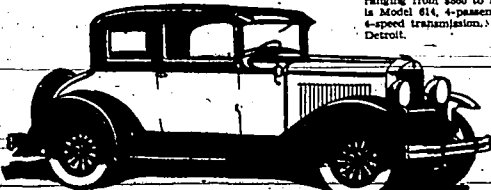
