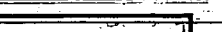

NEW CALL FOR BIDS FOR GOODING CANAL

Reclamation Service to invite Contractors' Proposals on 20 Miles of Ditch Building

BURLEY, July 9.—According to E. B. Darlington, superintendent and engineer of government projects from Jackson Lake to the Gooding tract, bids will be called for within 30 days for construction work on a little over 20 miles of main canal to carry the Gooding project. This is in addition to three and a half miles of initial canal work for which bids have already been submitted.

About three and half miles of heavy rock work were called for in the first schedule, for which bids have already been submitted. The certificate of feasibility having been approved by the president, little further delay may be expected. Announcement of the successful bidder.

Approximately one million dollars is still available for construction on the Gooding project for the fiscal year 1929, which closes June 30, 1929. This appropriation will provide funds for construction of the main canal.

The first three and a half miles of the new canal will deliver 1000 second feet to the Twin Falls North Side project, this project having contributed its share to the construction charges. Ultimately, there will be about 80,000 acres of lands in the Gooding project irrigated for which there is present sufficient water. Some additional acreage of intermingled lands will also be furnished with water and it is also proposed to bring water to 20,000 acres of raw sagebrush lands. It is expected that three years will be required to complete the canal.

LARGE SUMS SPENT IN BATTLE ON WEED

More than \$30,000 worth of material has been bought by the Twin Falls county weed department during the present season. Five carloads of carbon bisulphide costing \$13,251.71; three carloads of sodium chlorate costing \$887.93 and 26 carloads of salt costing \$7629.17, making a total of \$22,448.81 have been bought for use.

MEASURE CLOUDS ON BURLEY AIR ROUTE

New Type Ceiling Lights to Be Included in Equipment for Airplane Landing Fields

BURLEY, July 9.—Two latest type ceiling lights, for determining the height of clouds, have been unboxed here and will be installed at once at Burley and Strevell for use on the Salt Lake-Boise-Pasco air mail route.

C. R. Fitzgerald, federal airways extension superintendent, has been surveying the route for locations of landing fields and beacon lights, and will remain in this locale several weeks longer. Fields have been located at Locomotive Springs in Utah, and at Strevell, Idaho, Burley, Jerome, King Hill and Mountain Home in Idaho.

Revolving beacon lights, of two and half million candle power, are proposed to be placed in lines along the route. These will be electric lights, and when a current is not available, these lights will be used for generative power. South of Strevell it is thought gas blinker lights will be stationed every three miles. These blinkers use artificial gas and are to be used here by reason of difficulty of servicing these stations in winter. It is said these lights will function for six months without recharging. They generate 600,000 candle-power.

It is proposed to place lights at Promontory Point and on Antelope Island. When flying across Salt Lake pilots at a height of 2000 feet are at no time more than three minutes from land. Above the lake they avoid winter fogs and smoke. It is also expected that the borders of the lake will be lighted—especially for use of pilots on the Salt Lake-Great Falls route.

It is also proposed to string lights from Strevell to Snowville, and from Cotterel to Pocatello, for emergency use when visibility or weather condition make dangerous flying along the regular routes from Salt Lake to Burley and from Salt Lake to Pocatello.

There is much activity at the local airport. Friday two navy all-planes and a department of commerce plane maneuvered above the field in formation, and landed for refueling. The navy planes were bound for the naval reserve airport at Sand Point, Washington.

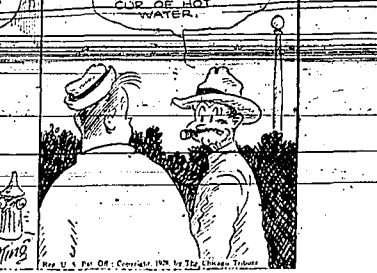

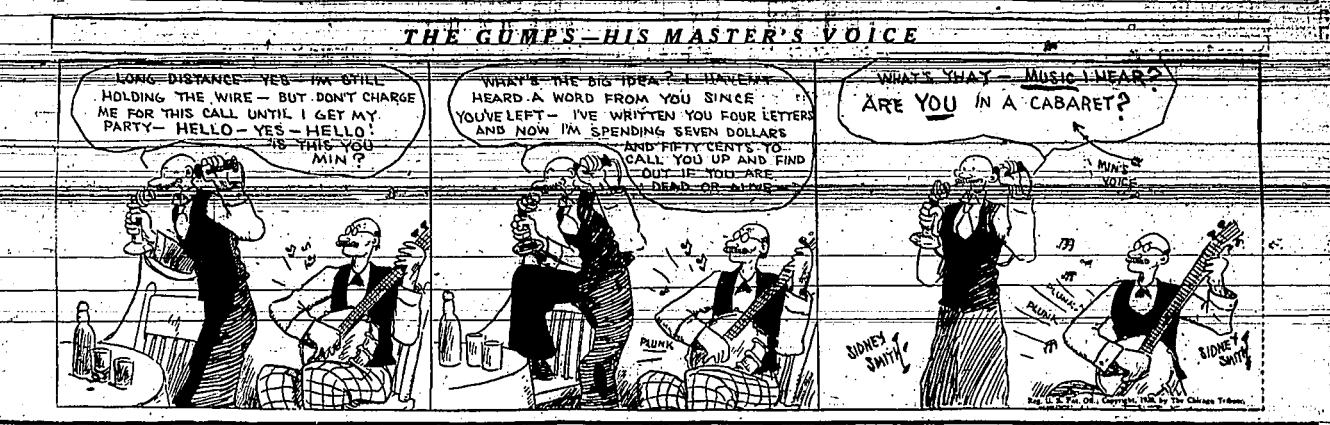

COUNCILMEN HEAR NO OBJECTIONS TO ZONING REGULATION

Opportunity Given for Public Airing of Proposed Ordinance Brings Out No Protests Guard Against Hasty Action.

So far as indicated at a duly advertised public hearing held last evening by Twin Falls city council, Twin Falls citizens have no objection to the proposed zoning ordinance that regulates building and use of buildings within four prescribed zones—first and second residential districts, business district and industrial district.

Four or five citizens sat in with council at the meeting, and said they were interested in the zoning measure, but declared that they had no objections to it.

The council accordingly entered into its minutes, the statement that no objection to the measure had been received.

Delay Further Action

No further action with regard to the measure was taken at the meeting last evening. It was adopted at the suggestion that first reading of the ordinance be delayed until the next regular meeting next Monday evening, and that the reading procedure be followed providing for three separate readings at intervals of one week, in order to afford opportunity to hear and to afford full opportunity for discussion of the measure.

Mr. Ashton, former mayor and secretary of the zoning commission which drafted recommendations that are set forth in the proposed zoning ordinance, was accompanied by Mayor E. Bobier at last evening's meeting as the "daddy" of the zoning measure. The case was consulted by members of the council with regard to ways and means of making the proposed regulation operative.

Recommendations Survey

One of the first things to be done, Mr. Ashton advised, would be the making of a survey that would show the type of building every building now within the corporate limits of the city. This, he stated, would be necessary in case of attempt to reconstruct a destroyed building.

Question also was considered as to the proper officials to enforce the measure, and it was suggested that this duty might devolve temporarily upon the zoning commission. A permanent solution of the problem might be found in the appointment of a building inspector.

Two former members attended last evening's meeting of the council. Mr. Ashton's concern was primarily with the zoning measure, while Captain W. McRobert, Twin Falls mayor at an earlier date, was on hand to witness the city's attempt to effect a deed to the city a strip of land 20 feet wide at the rear of his residence at the corner of Blue Lakes boulevard and Sixth avenue, east of the city through that lot. Captain McRobert asked in exchange for the property, a copy of the copy of pavement in front of that property.

It was explained by R. B. Smith, street commissioner, that the alley was proposed to be given a favorable reception.

It was pointed out in discussion that owners of property in that quarter of town never had given right of way to the alley to the city—but that in most instances the city had established rights through use of property for that purpose. That territory, Mr. Smith explained, designated by meter and bounds when it was sold by the original owners, and that no plat had been made except a plat made by the county assessor for commercial purposes in describing the property. The owner of the property subsequently purchased by Captain McRobert declined to grant a right of way for the alley, but transferred to Captain McRobert title to all of the property including that portion that now is offered to the city.
