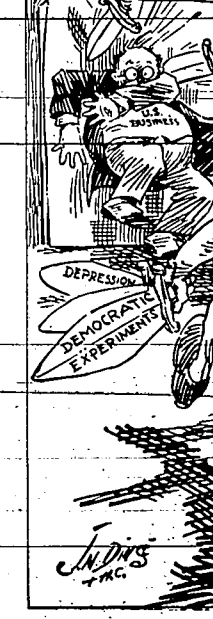

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DIVORCE RECORDS IN FRANCE UNDER PROBE

Ministry of Justice Will Instruct Every Separation Granted During Three Years

PARIS, July 11 (AP)—The records of every divorce granted in France during the past two years are to be investigated by the ministry of justice, but there is no danger that any of the decisions already handed down in the courts will be declared void.

The decision "ground out by the American divorce mill" which the government now is determined to gear down to low speed, were "definite and will not be changed," it was said at the palace of justice tonight.

Send Out Notices

Previously notices were sent out to all lawyers practicing at the Paris bar asking for complete record of all divorce cases for foreigners which passed through their hands during the last two years.

Meanwhile the French advocates disclosed this week for various acts in connection with obtaining divorces for American clients are to have their day in court July 21.

In the theory of the prosecutor of the public may reopen any divorce case where he is convinced that the acts violating some law of the criminal code have taken place but not in cases where the acts involved consisted merely of "unethical" conduct, shrewdly of "tampering" with documents to prove any divorce the prosecutor might enter the case reopened, but this would be tantamount to an investigation of his own department as a representative of the prosecutor-general's office or the ministerial office must vouch for the validity of the procedure for every decree granted.

CONSERVATIVE LABOR
Matthew Wohl, vice president of the American Federation of Labor, rebukes the Tennessee branch of the Federation for an interesting reason.

A group of American educators is preparing to tour Russia and Germany this fall, for a most interesting reason. The Tennessee labor organization was supporting the enterprise.

The Federation of Labor says Mr. Wohl has completely exposed the pretenses of the Soviet regime, and objects to "pro-Soviet propaganda being distributed to American labor through their news service."

This may be unjust to the persons accused. But what a topsy-turvy spectacle in the eyes of foreigners—opponents of labor conservative instead of radical, accusing educational groups of being radical instead of conservative!

MARATHONS

The famous marathon dance in New York, after dragging along for nearly three weeks, was stopped as a nuisance and a menace to the health of the participants. But there are still plenty of possibilities in that line.

It takes all kinds of people to make a public. This applies both to those who exhibit themselves doing crazy things and those who pay to see them. For our part, if there is anything of the sort that would tempt us to pay an admission fee and stick around a while watching the agony of the performers, it would be a flag-pole-sitting marathon, with a tack on the top of every pole.

ORDERLY OIL PRODUCTION

The drilling of oil wells, says a big oil man, is "more orderly today than at any time during the last ten years." The operators are no longer drilling unnecessary wells, but merely enough to protect their property from drainage and fulfill their contracts.

This is a wholesome change from the mad scramble for drilling and pumping which for years has been flooding the country with superfluous oil, wasting this great natural resource at every stage of production. There is still much to be done if we are to have genuine conservation in this industry. But it is reassuring to find that the industry itself shows signs of ability to do its own conserving, instead of leaving that task for an already over-burdened government.

Sounds Call For Defense of Nation's Fundamental Ideals

"The tendency of government today is towards the deadly blight of paternalism or what is called 'benevolent socialism,'" Henry K. Johnson of Boise declared at the onset of his address on "Watchman, What of the Night," a masterly defense of the United States Constitution, delivered at the opening session here yesterday afternoon of the Western Division Idaho Bar association. Members of the association voted to recommend that the complete text of the address be included in the proceedings of the 25th annual meeting this year.

Continuing his eloquent arraignment of subversive tendencies and tendencies, in the course of which he quoted extensively from statements of prominent statesmen, attorneys and publicists, Mr. Johnson declared: "We no longer have local autonomous government, but government by a miscellaneous, prismatic-bureaucratic state and federal. The infinite, ridiculous multiplicity of regulatory boards, commissions, bureaus and similar governmental agencies supervising, controlling, directing and hampering in vexatious ways all of the activities of life."

"The Darken the Land" "The appetite for mining other people's business grows by what it feeds on and the result is a swarm of agents, inspectors, detectives and noisy meddling matters going about the country harassing, annoying, worrying and bull-dozing the people. Like the locusts of Egypt, they multiply in darkness, the land, they multiply pyramiding at an alarming rate to support this horde of parasites."

"The common good" is the justification for the interference of government in the industrial, commercial, political, social and other affairs of the citizen. Like the general welfare clause of the constitution, it is overworked.

"The famous case of the constitutional convention of 1787 did not try to correct the inequalities in human nature, because they knew nature, made no such effort; they were not afflicted with the hysteria prevailing today of trying to make men good; they were making them free."

"The individual's right to enjoy his own life is sacred."

NEW YORK, July 11 (AP)—Henry Russell, who achieved fame on the stage when he originated the role of Little Lord Fauntleroy, died of cirrhosis of the liver last night at Bellevue hospital. He was 48 years old.

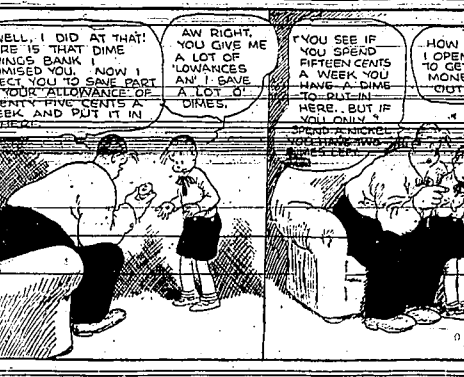

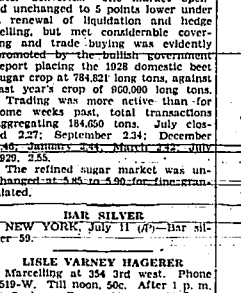

LAWYERS' CONDUCT CLAIMS ATTENTION AT MEETING OF BAR

Commissioner's Report Precipitates Debate on Disbarment Proceedings; Stress is Laid on Ethics in Addresses.

Whether an attorney against whom no charge of violation of the law of the state or the ethics of his profession should be disbarred because of a proven violation of a federal statute in no way connected with the practice of law, was the subject of a lively discussion at the opening meeting here yesterday of the western division of the Idaho Bar association.

Jess Hawley, of Boise, commissioner of the western division in his annual report outlined the history of the Idaho Bar association both in its original form and its later development and traced the actions and hearing in the supreme court which led to the definition of its rights and powers. Referring to the right of review of disbarment recommended by commissioners of the association, he cited the Edwards case still pending on re-vestigation in Boise, and the Dampier case in Rupert. Dampier was convicted in the federal court of an offense that had no relation to his profession and was not an attorney at the time.

Frank Martin of Boise, former attorney general, after expressing approval of the report as a whole, said that he could not approve of the report in this respect or of the principle laid down by the supreme court. He said unlike those engaged in other activities named, lawyers took an oath to uphold the Constitution of the United States, hereby becoming a part of the judicial system of the country. An attorney who violated the federal laws violated the oath of a lawyer and this should result in disbarment.

In reply, Mr. Hawley insisted that the purpose of the law under which the association operates is to maintain the high standard of the bar in the practice of its profession without imposing greater penalties on lawyers than on others for infractions after they had been punished in the regular courts.

The meeting was called to order by E. M. Wolfe, president of the Twin Falls County Bar association, in the district court room at 2 o'clock. Mr. Wolfe deplored the effort to hold the lawyers responsible for law enforcement of law and urged high standards of conduct on the part of attorneys.

He then turned the meeting over to Jess Hawley, district commissioner. In the absence of Chief Justice William E. Lee, response in behalf of the visitors was made by Justice T. Bailey Lee of the supreme court.

Judge Lee said that he and his fellow members of the supreme court realized their limitations and greatly appreciated the hearty cooperation of the bar association and its members. He said that the court had spent the last 18 months in an effort to bring business up to date. Eighteen months ago, he said, there were cases that had been pending for five years. Now, the court is scarcely any more than a year behind and the court hopes in a short time to be able to dispose of all cases that a year after appointment.
