EDEN TAKES CLOSE GAME FROM LOCAL BALL LEAGUE NINE

North Side-Twirlers' Long Hit Brings Only Score of Initial Match; Victors Lose Fast Match With 'Aecquia Squad

Eden diamond stars divided its twin bill at the city ball park Sunday afternoon, taking the first match from a nine selected from the Twin Falls Twilight League by the close score of 1 to 0, and dropping the second contest to the Aecquia Airport team, 11 to 0.

Twin Falls was unable to fathom the starboard delivery of Ellis Tooley, Eden tosser, and failed to connect on any times during the entire five innings. Not satisfied with his work in the box, Tooley won his own game by driving a lone one over the left field fence for a home run in the third inning.

Game Was Errorless
Venemon, occupying the mound for Twin Falls, held the visitors to four hits, three of which Eden was unable to push into the run column. Both teams played air-tight ball, no errors being chalked up against either aggregation.

Fast play characterized the second game. Tooley starting for Eden showed the effects of his experience with the Twin Falls batmen and was relieved by Johnson, who was driven from the box by the heavy hitting Airport club-wielders. Schneck was sent to the mound, and remained for the rest of the game which went nine innings. Donald Lamb, Aecquia tosser, stayed throughout the entire game and held Eden to 13 hits against 19 for the Airport boys. Tooley removed six batmen by the strike-out route, and Lamb eliminated eight.

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STRIKES OUT JAIL TERM FOR VIOLATION OF ZONING MEASURE

City Council Modifies Ordinance for Regulation of Building and Use of Property to Conform to State Requirements

Violation of Twin Falls zoning ordinance, now on its way to adoption, will constitute a misdemeanor punishable by maximum fine of \$100, and each day's continuance of violation will constitute a separate offense, but the penalty will not extend to sentence of imprisonment.

Members of the city council in regular session last evening, passed the ordinance on its second reading, and on advice of the city attorney, they voted to strike from the ordinance as it had been drafted any reference to jail sentence for violation of its terms. The measure originally provided for a maximum fine of \$100, and 30 days jail term or both.

Criticism of the measure at this time, as it has been throughout its passage in the council, was confined to members of the council, no other persons having appeared to offer suggestions or criticisms either at the public hearing or at the council meeting by the council two weeks ago, or since. The measure is to be presented to the council for final action at the meeting next Monday evening.

Discuss Pipe Line Carried Members of the council devoted a good deal of time last evening to discussion of suggestions for the structure to be used as a main water pipe, conveying water from the purification plant across Rock creek canyon into the city. H. M. Merritt, city engineer, submitted a drawing and estimated for a crossing designed along lines suggested by R. B. Smith, commissioner of streets and parks.

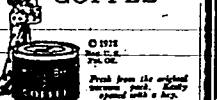
