GOVERNOR SMITH ON WEEK END VACATION

SILENT ON POLITICS Democratic Nominee Accompanied by Mrs. Smith and All Members of His Family Will Rest on Long Island

(By The Associated Press) NEW YORK, July 27.—In a holiday mood Governor Smith came back today to his native New York for an overnight stay before moving on to the south shore of Long Island for a week's vacation.

Although the Democratic presidential nominee, on leaving Albany, had declared his intention to keep in the background for a few days, by arrangement he met Governor Ritchie, Maryland, here, and with him discussed the situation.

Accompanied by Mrs. Smith and all members of his family who were at home, the governor left Albany shortly after noon in a special motor car, with a special car of his friend, William F. Henry, who is now in Europe.

Surrounded by a group of friends, he took a motor launch to the Panama, walked down the platform at Grand Central station and up into a motor launch and on to the hotel.

Richie Stays for Dinner At Smiths invitation Governor Ritchie had come to New York for a dinner at the New York executive suite within half an hour after the nominee's arrival and remained for dinner.

The chat afforded the presidential nominee an opportunity to get first-hand the political views of an old-time supporter and a state executive who in large measure, has gone along with him on the prohibition question.

As this rest is possible while here for the night, Governor Smith put his foot down on suggestion that he should be taken to the hotel after he had laced things over with Mr. Ritchie.

The bid is on politics, he said, to get much rest as possible before tomorrow when he sets out by motor for Hampton Bay, Long Island, where he will be at the exclusive Canoe Place inn, a private club. His family will accompany him.

While at the shore, the governor intends to get plenty of ocean swimming, his favorite sport, and also to visit the beach which is famous for its fine bathing, however, and he remarked today to newspapermen that he would be back in Albany.

FIRE IN WASHINGTON GRAIN FIELDS UNDER CONTROL; WIND AIDS

Blackened Waste of Wheat and Pasture Land, Comprising 80,000 Acres, Marks Ravages of Once Stubborn Blaze

(By The Associated Press) WALLA WALLA, Wash., July 27.—A blackened waste of wheat and pasture land, comprising some 80,000 acres, today marked the ravages of a fire that raged across the Eastern Plains grain country between Walla Walla and the farther river and was halted only after hundreds of fire fighters had fought the flames for hours.

A change in the direction of the wind brought success to the fire fighters, but only after a score of farmers had seen their seasons' crops destroyed, and in some cases their farm buildings also. Of the burned area, 10 square miles was winter grazing pasture land and about 500 acres wheat land in crop.

50,000 Bushels Lost Farmers placed the grain loss at 50,000 bushels. Warehouses at Welland, Adkins and Eureka Junction, all filled with harvested wheat were unburned. The flames completely circled Adkins, where back-firing operations were successful.

About 20 farmers were affected by the losses, all of them reported to have been well insured. Among the losses were Grant and Kydd, large sheep growers, who lost all their buildings except one lambing shed. Their flocks are in the mountains on summer range.

28 PERSONS HURT IN OIL BARGE BLAST IN BUFFALO BUFFALO, N. PRESIDENT EXPECTS LITTLE OPPOSITION TO KELLOGG TREATY

State Department that Leaders in Congress Look With Favor on Proposal for Peace

(By The Associated Press) SUPERIOR, Wis. July 27.—President Coolidge believes that little opposition will develop in the senate to the anti-war covenant now under negotiation between the United States and 14 opponents.

The chief executive has been informed that the state department has received in view of with letters of ratification in the senate in the course of the negotiations and that the senators in question have so far signified their approval of Secretary Kellogg's attitude in "a matter. What senate opposition will develop will be of the kind, President Coolidge believes, that always arises against any proposal brought forward.

WASHINGTON, July 27.—(AP)—Historic Gettysburg, battlefield of the 1863 battle, today will be the scene of the experimental mechanical force. The invasion is to begin July 31 when Colonel Oliver S. Baker's command, based at Gettysburg, Leonard Wood Maryland, will move out at 4 A. M. 700 vehicles leaving for the famous Civil War battlefield.

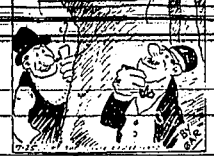
