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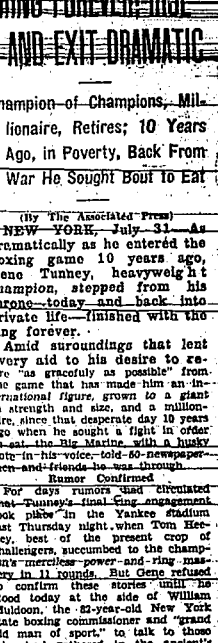

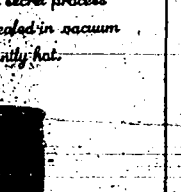

BRITISH BARRISTER RETAINS 800-METER CROWN; BEATS HAHN

Douglas G. A. Lowe, Comes From Behind in Last 100 to Defeat Nearest Rival From Sweden by 10-Yard Margin.

(By The Associated Press) OLYMPIC STADIUM, Amsterdam, July 30.—Douglas G. A. Lowe, young British barrister, retained the Olympic 800-meter crown this afternoon by outlasting a great field, including the American favorite, Lloyd Hahn, and annihilating the Olympic record with the most spectacular performance of the entire history of the track and field championships.

What was expected to be the most exciting middle-distance struggle in Olympic history with world's champions and record holders all assembled turned out to be a rout. Lowe, came from behind in the last 100 meters to beat his nearest rival, Erik Byelin, Sweden, by 10 yards, while Hahn after leading almost from the start staggered home fifth, badly whipped.

Three Records Fall In a day marked altogether by the smattering of three world records and five Olympic standards. Yankee fortunes again ebbed and flowed. It was not so disastrous as the day before, however, for Hahn's defeat in the 800-meter final was the result of a blunder by Ed Hamm in the running broad jump and victory for little Miss Elizabeth Robinson in the women's 100-meter final in the world record time of 12.5 seconds.

Hamm would "up" the most sensational broad jumping campaign any human kangaroo ever had by adding the world's championship to his national and world record holding honors. His winning jump of 25 feet 3 inches displaced the Olympic mark set in 1912 by the American A. L. Gutterson and gave the Georgia Tech star the largest margin of all jumping honors worth mentioning.

It took a world record discus throw of 129 feet 11 1/2 inches by a husky Polish lass, Halina Monopacka, to beat another American feminine star, Lillian Copeland, who finished second with 127.8 meters or 417 feet 1 1/2 inches. The third world record was clipped by the runner South African, C. C. Weightman-Smith, who beat the American, John Collier, by half a second as he annihilated the 110-meter high hurdles in 14 3/5 seconds. Carl Ring, United States, was fourth in his heat and thus did not qualify.

American sprinters suffered a fresh setback in the 200-meter trials when Percy Williams, Canadian, captured the second qualifying place by Percy Williams, the Canadian youth. On top of his 60-meter triumph yesterday, Herman Koernig, German ace, captured this heat, equalling the Olympic record of 21.3 seconds but it was a real battle between Williams and Borah. The American appeared to have the place cinched but lacked the stamina to meet Williams' closing rush. The Canadian just got the width of his chest across the line first.

The other three Americans each came through two heats easily to qualify for the semi-finals tomorrow. Jackson Scholz, the defending champion, and Charley Faddock, won their second trials in similar time of 21.4-5, while Henry Cummings placed second to the German, Jacob Schuller, in 22 flat in the second heat. The 500-meter trials, determining the competitors for the final Friday gave two young Boston stars, Leo Lermond and Beacaley Smith, a chance to shine.

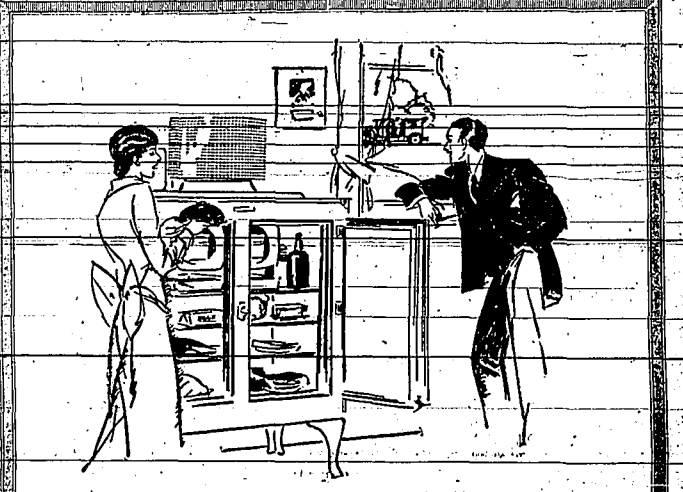

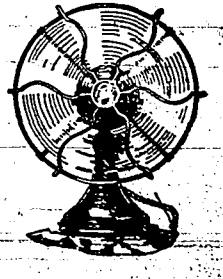

THE ANTI-WAR TREATY It is gratifying to American diplo-

maty and American desire for peace that the anti-war treaty has been signed so wholeheartedly into the Washington proposal for a many-sided peace pact outlawing aggressive war. It is also gratifying to the foreign powers.

They are accepting this treaty because it binds America to peace. According to the French view, as a Paris correspondent expressed it, "All the European powers have already agreed by acceptance of the League of Nations Covenant to do just what Mr. Kellogg proposes, and refrain from imperialist war, a war of conquest or domination. It was America alone who was free."

The other powers, then, are agreeing in order to get the United States to give them peace pledges which they have already given among themselves. Thus, gaining assurance that America will not use her military power against them except in self-defense, they believe they are gaining just that much of the obligations America would have assumed by signing the Covenant of the League of Nations. So they are willing to suppress any little misgivings they may have about the obligations imposed on them.

America, on her side, trusts in this treaty more than in the League to keep the League powers from military aggression. So both sides are satisfied.

BANNED GYPSIES An official decree in Hungary requires all gypsies to settle down in fixed abodes, to earn their living as responsible citizens, to dress as ordinary folk, to give up their Romany language. The decree gives all foreign gypsies just one month to leave Hungary forever. After that period they will be subject to the same laws as all gypsy caravans coming from other lands will be stopped at the Hungarian border. The decree is said to affect about 50,000 Hungarian gypsies.

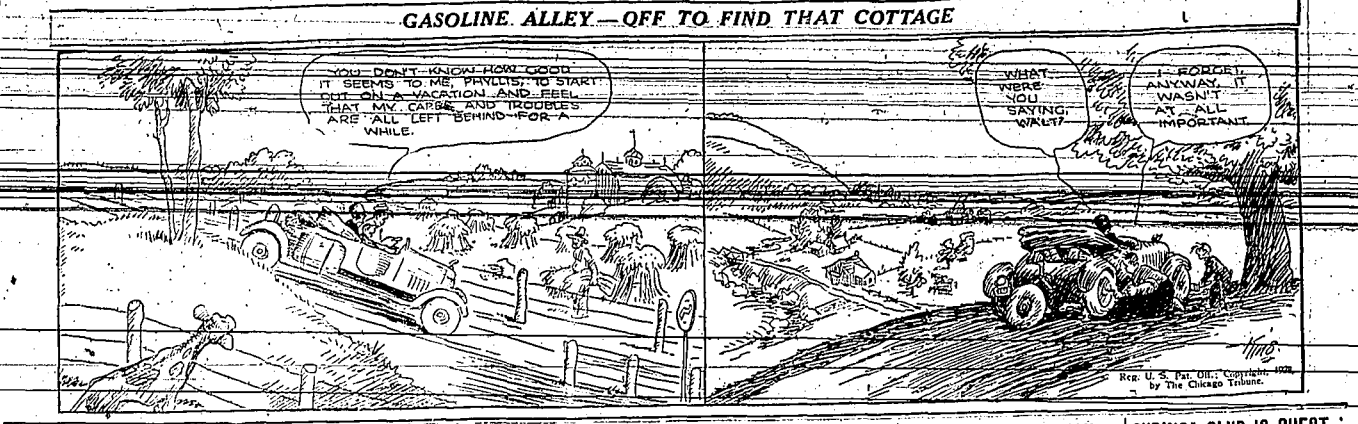

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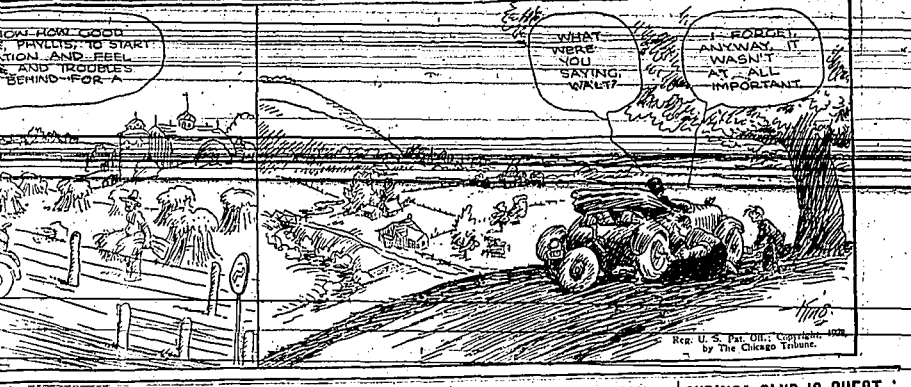

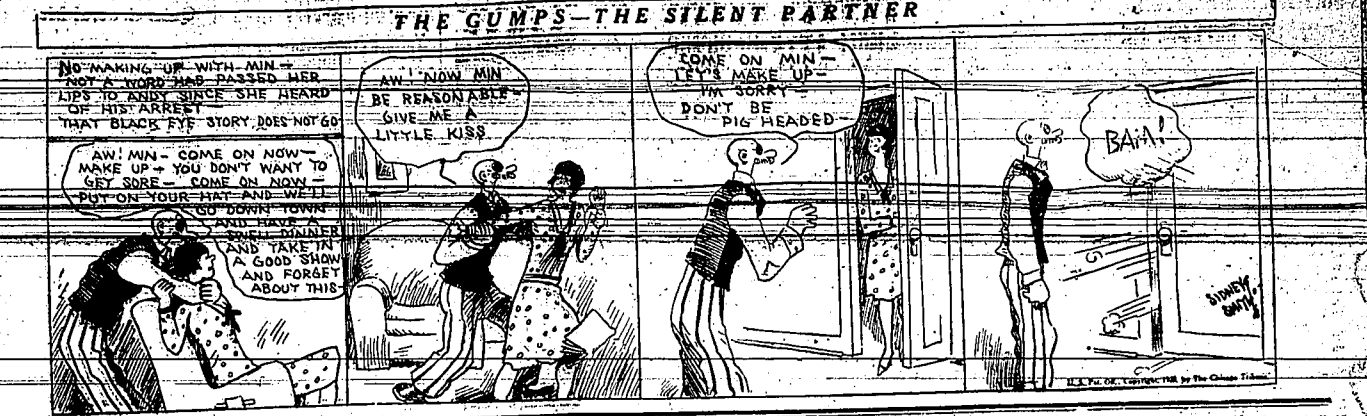
