AIR MAIL ON INCREASE WITH FIVE CENT RATE

SALT LAKE CITY, Aug. 14 (AP)—A 40 per cent increase in air mail since the rate was reduced to five cents was announced by W. Irving Glover, second assistant postmaster general, who arrived here tonight with Dr. Hubert Work, Republican national chairman. Mr. Glover said that all previous records for mail loads were shattered today when he reported that a passenger plane left here for Cheyenne carrying 1500 pounds of mail. The previous record, he said, was 700 pounds. Mr. Glover said that the increase in postage has made arrangements for several new passenger airplanes carrying 2000 pounds of mail and 1000 pounds of passengers. These planes, Mr. Glover said, will not be equipped for hauling passengers.

BURLEY, Aug. 14.—Harvesting of the dry land wheat nursery in the foothills above Oakley, last week gave results that it is believed will be the best in the state.

Eleven varieties of dry land wheat were planted by W. W. Palmer, county agent in dry land nursery in the fall of 1927. The heads of these varieties have been harvested and tested, and will be sent to the sub-station in Boise for further analysis.

Crimean 486 and Sherman 488 were the best, and Sherman very good. Then followed Crimean 488, Kanred, Karof and Husar 488. According to Mr. Palmer, appearance indicate that some good yielding varieties were in the experimental nursery and the nursery seems to have placed some of the varieties out of consideration for this district.

SMITH INSISTS UPON MEETING IN CHURCH TO ANSWER PASTOR

New York Governor Declines Emphatically to Consider Dr. Stratton's Proposal for Confronting to GFIPI in Public

(By The Associated Press) ALBANY, N. Y., Aug. 14.—Governor Smith today flatly put his proposed debate with Dr. John Roach Stratton of New York in the class of proposed events that never materialize.

In a terse letter to the clergyman, the Democratic presidential nominee reversed the statement that they meet face to face in Calvary Baptist church here. Dr. Stratton recently declared that the governor was the "head fire" of the forces of moral progress in America. STORM BATTERED VESSEL BEARS TALE OF TRAGEDY

BOSTON, August 14 (AP)—The tale of a sea tragedy in which a number of lives were lost will be told when the Boston steamer Wilma A. McKenney limps into Balboa, next Monday, battered by a tropical typhoon and with her wireless aerial blown away. A fragmentary version of the vessel's plight reached the owners here today by way of a cable which passed the McKenney after the storm and spoke to her by means of flag signals.

The vessel, laden with lumber from Pacific coast ports, left Los Angeles August 4 for Boston via the Panama canal. Four days later off the western coast of Mexico she encountered a typhoon, during which she was swept by mountainous seas. Part of her deckload was carried away with several members of the crew, but the vessel was able to proceed slowly toward Panama.

A representative of the Myrtle Steamship company, owners of the McKenney, left here tonight for the Canal Zone to make a survey of the ship when it arrives at Balboa. The McKenney is commanded by Captain J. F. Rose of Newport News, Va. The vessel was built at Newport News in 1916.

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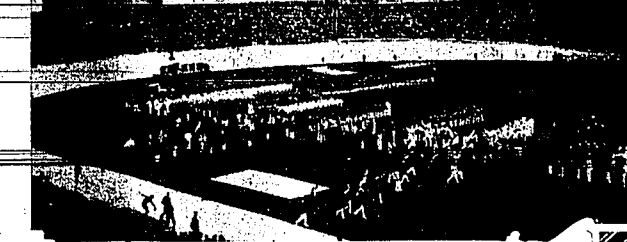

**CHISELING PROMISES
DRY FARM NEW LIFE**

Cassia County Agent and University Soil Technologist Report Encouraging Results

SUBLET, Aug. 14—Encouraging results in the attempt to grow crops on farms can be cropped, have been reported from the Sublet dry farm area. W. W. Palmer, county agent, and C. F. MacLeod, soil technologist of the university, have made examination of dry land soil that was cultivated this spring by the chiseling method.

This method consisted, in this case, of using deep-subsoil chisels, followed by disks, instead of the ordinary method of plowing the land. The chisels were set into an implement and spaced one foot apart. This implement cut a swath eight feet wide, and the chisels were forced into the soil to an average depth of 14 inches. In places they reached 18 inches deep. They took up the subsoil, but none of the subsoil was brought up to the surface. The implement was used in places where the hardpan is encroaching on good soil and making it worthless. The cost of chiseling and diskings was about the same as the usual method of plowing.

First Shows Advancing.

In the recent examination of results of this method of lifting made use of on 300 acres of hardpan soil, it was found that moisture was evenly distributed, and that it had penetrated to a depth of six feet which was as far as the soil could carry water. On farms, wherever whatever was found below three feet, and in some places the moisture had not penetrated even to a three foot depth. This land had been plowed and cultivated in the ordinary manner.

Mr. Palmer believes that this chiseling method can be successfully used on dry land areas, where continuous cropping has robbed the soil of its humus and caused the hardpan to harden. In many instances here, farmers have been forced to abandon formerly productive farms, and the hardpan areas refuse to absorb moisture, they have lost their fertility and have become worthless. It looks as though chiseling would bring them back for another term of productive life.

In fact, Palmer believes that thousands of acres of arid land in the Oakley and Sublet districts can be brought back to their former state of productivity.
