DRY LEAGUE NAMES TWO CANDIDATES FOR GOVERNOR OF OHIO

Primary Election Returns Indicate Nomination of M. Y. Cooper, Republican, and Martin L. Davey, Democrat

COLUMBUS, O., Aug. 15.—The Anti-Saloon League apparently has nominated its candidates for governor of Ohio on both the Republican and Democratic tickets on the face of incomplete and unofficial returns from yesterday's state primary, but the C. O. P. race appeared so close tonight that an official count may be held before determining the result.

Arkansas Primary Voters Endorse Governor's Record

LITTLE ROCK, ARK., Aug. 15 (AP)—Arkansas voters today endorsed Governor B. H. Fairall to succeed himself, appeared assured tonight on the basis of returns from approximately three-fourths of the precincts in yesterday's Democratic primary.

With returns in from most of the heavy centers, Fairall, who waged an intensive campaign in defense of the present \$20,000,000 road program and its administrators, was more than 18,000 votes ahead of his nearest opponent, Brooks May, 30 year old lawyer. The unofficial vote in 1483 of the 2039 precincts gave Fairall 58,581, May, 37,827, former Governor Tom A. Crain, 23,220 and State Auditor J. Carroll Cook, 17,997. Three other candidates for the office were eliminated by early returns. A plurality only is required for nomination and the nomination is tantamount to election.

ANTI-SMITH LEADER IN TEXAS OUT OF RUNNING

DALLAS, Texas, Aug. 14 (AP)—State Senator Thomas E. Smith, one of the leaders of the Democratic party in Texas, opposed to the election of Governor Alfred E. Smith today announced his withdrawal from the race for re-election to the Texas legislature.

When informed of his opponent's withdrawal from the race, Senator Cooper, who had been assigned to lead a statement of whether Love had "jumped on" him in his statement. The names of both Love and Miller were certified for placing on the primary ballot by the state Democratic executive committee at its meeting Monday at San Antonio. In announcing his withdrawal from the race, Senator Smith said: "Looking squarely at all phases of the situation, I do believe it most probable that I can overcome the substantial lead of my opponent and obtain a majority of votes in the run off primary; that to further continue the contest would serve no useful purpose, but would result in a waste of time and effort and 'sell on' the part of my friends which could be better utilized in defeating Smith in November."

NOBLE VIEWS FILM OF ILL FATED EXPEDITION

ROME, Aug. 15 (AP)—General Umberto Nobile, leader of the ill-fated polar expedition to the dirigible Italia and Natale Cecconi, engineer of the airship, yesterday had a private view of a film of the expedition prepared for the government by a special operator who remained at Kings Bay during the fatal last flight of the Italia.

WANTS RULING ON MONROE DOCTRINE

Costa Rica Answers Appeal With Request for Interpretation of American Policy

GENEVA, Aug. 15 (AP)—Declaring that the League of Nations has no public law, Costa Rica has asked the league for an interpretation of the doctrine to resolve the present differences of opinion.

The Central American republic, replying to an appeal that it resigned in 1924, said that before it decided to cooperate again it felt obliged to raise a fundamental question: "The very passionate debates throughout the American continent and which on a certain occasion led Baldrado to take a decisive step."

The communication says that the league covenant, signed at Versailles at a time when the world was filled with the light of peace, gave concrete form to the noblest principles of international law, which had been forgotten during the terrible years when the league was "hijacked" to destroy the very foundations of civilization.

Under article 21 which said that the covenant did not affect such regional understandings for the maintenance of peace as the Monroe Doctrine, the league declares that the "Inter-American scope of the doctrine has been perverted by converting it for all nations signatory to the treaty of Versailles into a unilateral part of American public law."

Costa Rica holds that this extension of the doctrine would involve no risk to the independence of small nations.

It is understood that while the council of the league has declined the responsibility of interpreting the doctrine which has been the dominant part of the foreign policy of the United States since it was proclaimed by President Monroe in 1823, the council has informed Costa Rica that in accordance with its request, the communication will be forwarded to all members of the league.

GUNMEN BEAT POLICE TO HUNTED SLAYER SUSPECT

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 15 (AP)—One of two brothers who had been sought by police in connection with the shooting of Hugh McClellan, café proprietor and hitlerback mascot formerly with the Athletics, was shot to death today.

James O'Leary, better known as Daniel Joseph O'Leary, was killed by five men after they had limned open the door of the apartment house in which he was living and forced his door on the third floor. Five bullets from a .32 calibre gun were found in his body. He had apparently been shot in his sleep and died immediately.

With O'Leary at his side he was killed and was informed that he had introduced as his wife when he had rented the room Monday. She was seen leaving the house in company with a woman a few minutes after the shooting.

O'Leary had been arrested several times on charges of connection with bootlegging and hijacking. He was never convicted.

McClellan, for whose killing O'Leary was shot last Thursday, two other men who had been with him, one of whom was shot in a critical condition. O'Leary was 29 married and the father of two children. His wife conducts a cigar and candy store in this city.

GIRL LOSES GAMBLE FOR CAREER AND ENDS LIFE

NEW YORK, Aug. 15 (AP)—A pair of red dice with a "seven" up, a few pennies and a sheet of paper on which had been typed "The Commandments of Married Life," told the police today that 18-year-old Anna Green had gambled with a career and lost.

The young woman's body was found in a gas-filled room in Brooklyn last night. Dice and papers lay on a table. There was a penciled note, too, that read: "I have nothing against anyone. Love to you all, Anna."

The commandments, apparently written by Miss Green, set forth rules for a "successful" marriage. "Remember you are both human. You are not perfect, and you are liable to error," said one.

"Live within your means; do not strive to initiate your neighbors as alives or friends," read another.

"Believe in the home of God; both of you—be active in it and God will bless you for it," was the last.

Miss Green's body was identified by her father, who said the girl had left home a few days and had set to seek a career in literature or on the stage.

MARINES IN NICARAGUA VICTORS IN SKIRMISHES

PUERTO CARRERA, Nic., Aug. 15 (AP)—Marines today in pursuit of the guerrillas, with whom they recently had a pitched battle, were victorious in two new skirmishes. After hand-to-hand fighting, the marines suffered few casualties, but the guerrillas lost a number of men.

A group of guerrillas was the marine patrol, which is now at Puerto Carrera, on the coast. The guerrillas, which number about 100, were shot and killed when one marine was killed and two wounded in this encounter.

SAYS PLANT EXPERT

Crop Has Less Blight in Twin Falls Region Than in Most Places, States L. R. Jones; All Farmers Must Cooperate

Great improvement in the quality of bean seed here with practical elimination of the seed from disease will within a few years, make the bean crop here much more valuable than at present, is the opinion of L. R. Jones, of the federal bureau of plant pathology, who left last evening after spending several days here investigating conditions.

Mr. Jones, who is connected with the University of Wisconsin, though now assisting in investigations of the United States government, said that with the exception of mosaic blight, fields here are more free from disease than in any other part of the United States.

Advices Careful Work Great progress has been made in combating the mosaic blight through application of the results of experiments by the experts of the university extension, the county agent and the bean growers organization. Mr. Jones said. The outstanding success so far should result in more universal cooperation of the growers. Rousing should by all means be persisted in, he said.

IDAHO EMPLOYMENT SITUATION APPEARS ON UPWARD TREND

Labor Supply and Demand Are Balanced; Industries Expand; Harvests Under Way; Mining Active; Building Moderate

Industrial activities and employment in Idaho continue to show a steady upward trend, according to the industrial employment survey report for July issued by the United States department of labor. This upward tendency is particularly indicated in agriculture, metal mining, general and highway construction, railroad activities and in the dairy and poultry industries.

Resident labor is generally quite well employed, except in some sections, where moderate numbers of building mechanics are temporarily unemployed. Due to a considerable influx of seasonal migratory workers the supply of this class of labor slightly exceeds the demand.

Farm Work Gives Relief
Agriculturalists are busy harvesting grain and fruit crops which provides temporary employment for hundreds of workers, both male and female. The labor supply is adequate for immediate requirements. Cultivators of the sugar beet crop in the southern and southeastern parts of the state was completed during July. Rice water supplies in the southern falls, Arrowrock, Black Canyon and other reservoirs guarantee sufficient moisture for crops during the balance of the season.

Metal mining shows more activity than at any time for a number of years, particularly in the southern region. Labor supply and demand is well balanced.

Factories Are Expanding
Many manufacturing plants are expanding their operations. Lumber mills, sawmills, paper mills and manufacturing dairy products are expanding. Construction equipment plants are operating at capacity. This industry is growing.

Many semi-skilled and skilled workers will be provided employment for several weeks in the reconditioning of the beet-sugar factories in southern and southeastern Idaho.

Building Is Moderate
Building is moderately active and a considerable amount of miscellaneous construction is under way, including progress on a 10-mile stretch of railway between Hill and Teton, which offers employment to a force of 300 men. Railroad labor is reported adequate to handle all freight-way construction and maintenance requirements.

Railroad shop and maintenance forces were increased during July to summer peak proportions. Indications point to increased forces in railway freight transportation forces during August. Railway labor supply and demand is well balanced.

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, Aug. 15—Stanley L. Smith of Coeur d'Alene, a graduate of the University of Idaho college of agriculture in the class of 1927, has been appointed assistant of junior animal husbandman with the department of agriculture and assigned to duty at Middlebury, Vt., according to information received by C. W. Hickman, head of the animal husbandry department of the college. Smith took the civil service examination during the summer and passed with a rating of 91.4, which is considered exceptional for the difficult examination given by the government. The appointment is effective August 20. During his undergraduate years at Idaho State he was active in student affairs at Idaho and was a prominent member of livestock judging teams representing the institution.

FINANCE AUTHORITY WARNS SPECULATORS

Not More Than Five of Every 100 Who 'Play the Markets' Win, States Fred C. Kelly

NEW YORK, Aug. 15—Not more than five out of every 100 persons who speculate in the stock market have any chance of getting rich, says a study of brokers' records by Fred C. Kelly, financial writer, who analyzes

the current record-breaking market operations in an article written for the September issue of Cosmopolitan. Of the estimated 12,000,000 Americans, most of them newcomers to speculation, who are "playing the market," the five per cent of winners is made up almost entirely of hard-earned, experienced speculators who have plentiful capital, Mr. Kelly finds. The number of uninitiated outsiders who have made money at the end of a month or a year of market dabbling is almost infinitesimal.

Occasional Outsiders Win
But a handful of outsiders do tumble into easy money, and it is the tales of their quickly won wealth, rather than the recital of the millions of failures that draw new moths to the stock market flame. "I know a hard-working stenographer who learned the market by nothing but the methods and operations of her employer," writes Mr. Kelly. "For three years she made her own clothes,

went without vacations or minor luxuries to save what she needed to start a little speculative account. And you can believe it or not, she has won and kept nearly \$20,000." She is "the one success in 1,000 cases." Of the failures the investigator encountered, one man lost his life savings of \$3,000; an elderly woman lost all she had, \$500 with which she had planned a trip home; an experienced operator saw his capital reduced from \$75,000 to \$3,000 within a trading week.

Writer Makes Experiment
To test the value of the tips on which most inexperienced speculators do their buying, Mr. Kelly played the market "on paper" for several months. "If a friend advised me to buy a certain stock for a quick profit, I would I secretly wrote down the suggestion," he explains. "After a time I filled up my list of such suggestions to see what actually had happened. In this way I made the dis-
