EARTH HAS SMALL CAUSE TO FEAR METEOR FALLS

NEW YORK, Aug. 20 (AP)—How little there is to worry about from meteors striking the ground when the earth passes through the expected shower of them in mid-August is shown by the astronomical belief that normally about one million meteors per hour strike the earth's atmosphere.

Harlow Shapley in "Research Notes from Harvard Observatory" in Science writes: "It has been reliably estimated that the earth's daily catch of meteoric bodies is about thirty million. Perhaps as much as thirty tons of matter, larger than an acorn, by the atmosphere every twenty-four hours.

"The two commonest metallic constituents of meteors are iron and magnesium.

A WASHINGTON B-Y STANDER

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20 (AP)—Retirement from the democratic national committee of Senator Furnifold McLendell SIMMONS of North Carolina, for reasons not self explained, draws attention to the fact that the Old North State, steeped in traditions that reach back far beyond the revolutionary beginnings of things American, is represented in the senate by 144 years of experience.

The Senator, as North Carolina knows its senior senator, is 74 years of age, as is Senator Lee Slater Overman, always "Senator Overman" back home to distinguish him from his colleague, both were born in January, 1854, and in fact Overman is just seventeen days the senior in age.

Simmons has been 21 consecutive years in the Senate, Overman twenty-five.

Senility Counts
 But that little distinction as to seniority in the senate means a lot when translated into North Carolina politics. Simmons, serious minded and witty, meticulously polite in debate, but a hard hitter for all that; musty of voice and with face deep creased and bristly, close-cut hair and musk-bleed by time, has been a commanding figure in political affairs of his state all these years. And always also, the short statured, fine drawn "little giant" has bulked large in the form that made him a terror among the light heavyweights a few months ago. 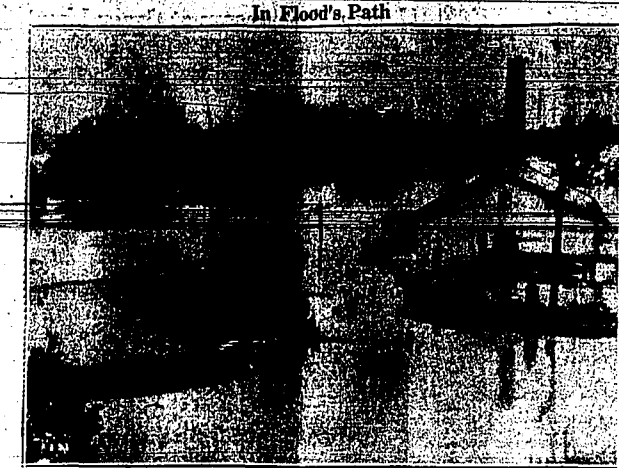

COUNCILMEN LOWER TWIN FALLS' TAX LEVY BY ONE MILL

Fix Rate of 30 Mills for Current Year With Savings in Assessments for Bonds and Street Lighting Funds

In the face of an indicated fall of approximately \$114,000 in the assessed valuation of the city, Twin Falls city council at its regular session last evening, fixed the municipal tax levy for 1928 at 30 mills, which is a reduction of one mill under the 1927 levy of 31 mills.

Reduction of one-half mill was made in the levy for the street lighting fund in which there is a surplus of \$5,255 and upon which a draft will be reduced this year. The power company in municipal lighting rates amounting to about \$1000 for the year.

Another half mill was taken off the levy for the bond interest and sinking fund, in which there is a surplus of \$939 and for which the requirements will be somewhat less this year than last because of reduction in interest charges brought about by previous retirement of bonds.

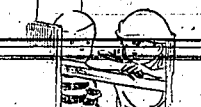
Indicated Revenue of \$151,334. It was estimated that the 30 mill levy would yield this year \$111,234.19, a reduction of \$3,000 from the \$114,234.19 brought in by last year's levy of 31 mills.

The property valuation for this year is estimated at \$401,771, against the valuation of \$5,075,827 last year. The total 30 mills levy was distributed as follows: 2 mills; municipal bond, 1/2 mill; interest and sinking fund, 1 1/2 mills; street lighting, 1/2 mill.

It was estimated that the general fund yield of 10 mills this year would yield \$49,617 as against \$50,718 raised by the same levy last year.

Levy for the public library is expected to be \$2922, and for the municipal bond, \$1240. Levy for the bond interest and sinking fund this year is to bring in \$1714, which is a reduction of \$1629 under last year's income for this fund amounting to \$15,914.
