IDAHO REPUBLICANS AND DEMOCRATS OFF TO STATE MEETINGS

Major Parties' Delegates On Way to Kellogg and Grangeville to Name Rival Tickets For Coming Fall Campaign

(By The Associated Press) Boise, Aug. 25.—Republicans and Democrats alike today began their trek from southern Idaho to the two northern Idaho cities where state conventions of the two parties will nominate rival tickets to go into the campaign this fall.

The conventions will open the morning of August 28, the Republicans meeting in Kellogg and the Democrats in Grangeville. A number of automobiles loaded with delegates passed through Boise today and a number of state officials left this afternoon by automobile while more will leave by train tomorrow.

Members of the present state administration, with two exceptions, will be for nomination and election at the Republican convention. All have the endorsement of several counties and anticipate little opposition in the floor of the convention. The two exceptions represent the offices of attorney general and lieutenant governor. Both offices were taken-made vacant by decisions of the present officers not to seek re-election.

PARIS, Aug. 25 (AP)—That the pact for mutual disarmament, known as the Kellogg-Briand pact, is open to all, was stressed today by Secretary Kellogg. He brought this out in an interview by French journalists who told him that many people cannot understand why many powers have not signed it.

"Peace under the Briand-Kellogg pact is open to all," said Mr. Kellogg. "Countries which do not sign the treaty here may all do so whenever they like."

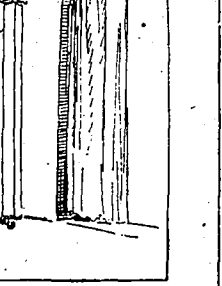

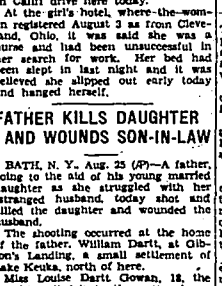

SENATOR KING WINS PARTY'S NOMINATION

Utah Democrats in State Convention in Logan Name Complete Ticket; No Conflicts

States Senator William H. King was nominated by acclamation to succeed himself, and a platform was adopted carrying a plank demanding that the prohibition amendment be given a fair trial at the Democratic state convention here today.

Shortly after the state convention adjourned sine die late today the Democratic convention was called to order and without delay or opposition, unanimously named Dr. J. H. Paul of the University of Utah, Joseph Leatherwood, Republican incumbent, for election to congress.

Complete harmony ruled the state convention, starting with the delivery of a fiery keynote speech assailing the Republican administration, and prevailing through the formation of the state ticket. In only one instance was more than one name submitted to the convention for any place on the ticket, and in that instance one of two names was withdrawn to permit the nomination of the other.

The state ticket was named as follows: United States senator—William H. King, incumbent. Governor—George H. Dern, incumbent. Treasurer—John F. Mendenhall, Springville. Secretary of state—Milton H. Welling, keynote speaker and chairman of the convention. Attorney general—Oliver K. Clay, Pocatello. Auditor—Harrison Farr, Logan. Superintendent of public instruction—L. John Nuttall, Spanish Fork. Justice of the supreme court—10-year term—S. R. Thurman, incumbent. Justice of the supreme court—(Two-year term)—Valentine Gidson, incumbent. Presidential electors—Mrs. J. J. APPLE CROP REVENUE INCREASES IN IDAHO

Income Climbs in 14 Years From \$1,336,000 to \$6,600,000 Last Year

(This is the seventh of a series of seven articles released through the Pacific Slope Agency dealing with the economic growth of Idaho.)

BOISE, Aug. 25—Apples are another of the older crops in Idaho; they have been returning large and increasing revenues to the growers year after year. Nevertheless they also have continued to break all previous records in recent years.

For the years 1910-14 the total value of this crop in the state, according to the reports of the United States division of crop and livestock estimates, averaged \$1,336,000 a year. For the years 1915-20 the average per year was \$3,298,000. In 1921 an off-year for most crops and most industries the revenue from the Idaho apple crop rose to \$5,850,000. By 1925 it had advanced to \$6,330,000 and last year, 1927, it reached the peak, so far, of \$6,600,000.

Production in 1927 was six million bushels. Wide Distribution Last year Idaho apples went in 44 of the 48 states of the country and the amounts in a few instances follow:

- Alabama, 502 tons; Arkansas, 565 tons; Arizona, 50 tons; California, 502 tons; Colorado, 123 tons; Connecticut, 147 tons; District of Columbia, 121 tons; Florida, 167 tons; Georgia, 340 tons; Illinois, 18,556 tons; Indiana, 2994 tons; Iowa, 5400 tons; Kansas, 3270 tons; Kentucky, 502 tons; Louisiana, 445 tons; Massachusetts, 231 tons; Michigan, 4028 tons; Minnesota, 3593 tons; Missouri, 12,156 tons; Nebraska, 4372 tons; New Jersey, 183 tons; New York, 2253 tons; Ohio, 4523 tons; Oklahoma, 5033 tons; Pennsylvania, 2463 tons.

Although reaching its peak year for value in 1927 exports in the orchard business seem to reason why Idaho's apple industry should decline. On the contrary they are every reason why it will continue to grow and be one of the state's main crops in years to come.

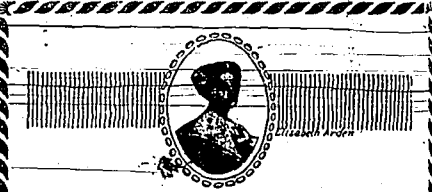

BEAN GROWERS FEEL WORRIED ABOUT 1928 YIELD; FEAR FROSTS

Crop Fails to Reach Average Growth for Season; Early Planting Retarded by Cold Need Long Growing Season

Bean growers and buyers in the Twin Falls region are not optimistic about the prospects for the 1928 bean crop as they were a few weeks ago. Development of the crop is proving slow and growers fear that if frosts come early in September this season the crop will be seriously damaged.

Inspections of the fields earlier in the season led ranchers and buyers to believe that the crop would average or above with little evidence of disease. Inspections during the last week showed that the beans have reached an average length of two to three inches and that the pods contain four to five beans. By this time of the season in former years the pods have attained a length of four to five inches and contained six to seven beans.

Fields planted earlier in the season were hindered by cold weather during June. Some growers planted their fields as early as May 15 this year, while the usual planting time in this section is about June 5.

Frosts were reported on September 12 last year and on September 23, two other wintering frosts. It is felt that with the yield of averages on their side, frosts will not equal this season. If this proves true the 1928 harvest should be about equal that of last year. In spite of a 14 per cent increase in acreage, the crop will be practically the same as last year.

RESERVOIR DISTRICT'S ASSESSMENT APPROVED

In the absence of any expressed objection or complaint, directors of the American Falls reservoir district, in session here yesterday afternoon, approved the schedule of assessment for the current year against properties in seven counties participating through the district in the cost of construction of the American Falls reservoir.

Estimated proceeds of the assessment total \$174,381.75 for interest and safety fund, and \$15,731.30 for operation and maintenance.

The assessment was made proportionally in the case of each county to its apportionment of the district's \$2,000,000 share in the cost of the reservoir.

On this basis the assessment for Twin Falls county this year amounts to \$30,880.48 for interest and safety fund, and \$5,700.02 for operation and maintenance.

Assessment for the other counties with lands inside the district's boundaries is as follows:

Jerome, \$40,915.60 interest and safety, and \$4,460.44 operation and maintenance; Gooding, \$42,503.67 interest and safety and \$5,719.21 operation and maintenance; Blaine, \$14,540.53 interest and safety and \$1,283.73 operation and maintenance; Power, \$5,698.48 interest and safety and \$1,178.97 operation and maintenance; Elmore, \$2,583.44 interest and safety and \$222.37 operation and maintenance; Bonneville, \$1,877.63 interest and safety and \$165.11 operation and maintenance.

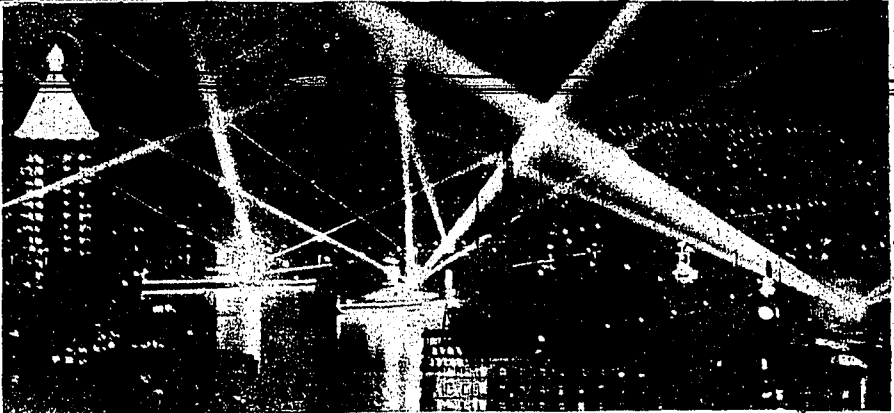

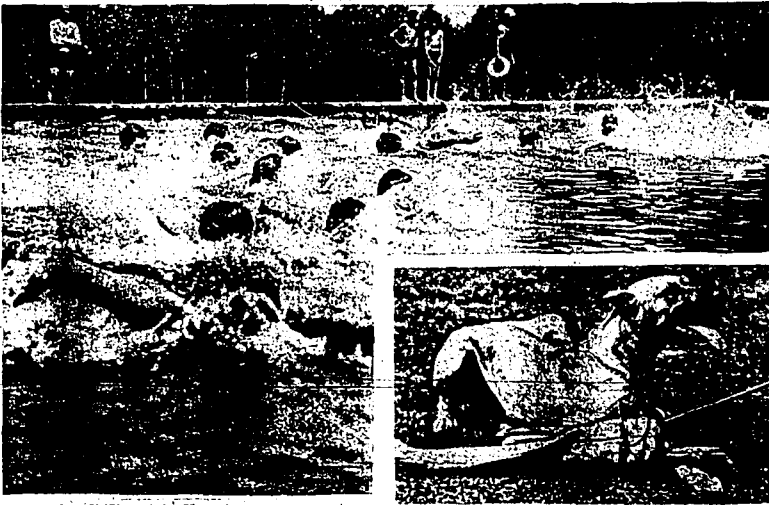

CARE IN HANDLING OF WEED SPRAY IMPERATIVE

BURLEY, Aug. 25—Serious accidents by burning, occurring lately where sodium chlorate has been used for spraying weeds, is resulting in increasing precautionary measures being taken.

At the office of J. W. Barber, district extension agent, it was learned today that this sodium chlorate solution is safe enough to use when proper care is taken. Barber says that the sprayed solution, when dry, is highly inflammable. If heat is applied to it, it will burst into flames through the application of friction.

The spray itself will extinguish flames, and it is customary for the spraying crew to put out fires starting from this solution by spraying the

solution over the flames. According to Mr. Barber, crews are now cautioned to wear old clothes while spraying, and to avoid them in some stream before they become dry. In some cases, the crews use alcohols and rubber boots, washing them after use.

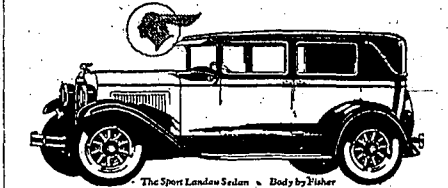

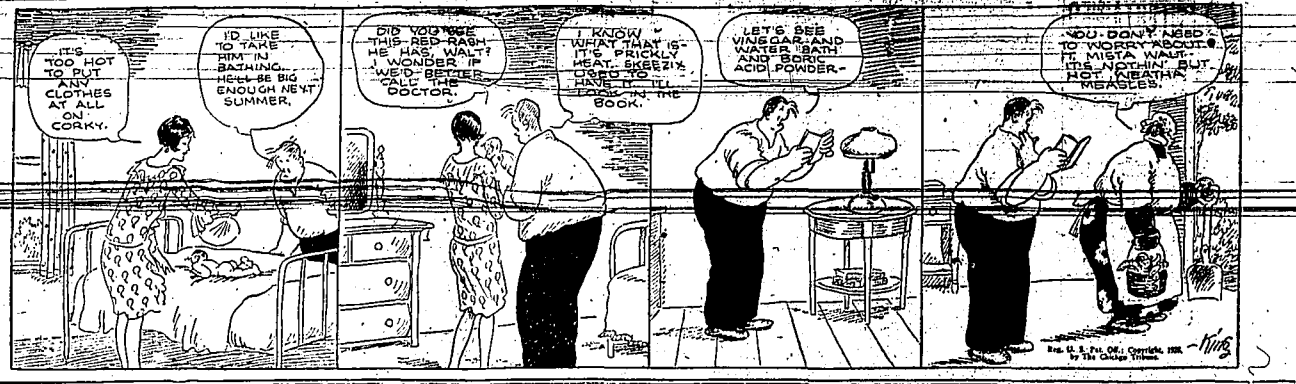
