

BOURBONS MASSING IN GRANVILLE FOR STATE CONVENTION

On Eve of Opening of Meeting L. E. Dillingham, Mackay, Announces He Will Not Be Candidate For State Chair

By The Associated Press, GRANVILLE, Idaho, Aug. 27.—On the eve of the opening of the Democratic convention, L. E. Dillingham, Mackay, announced he would not be a candidate for re-election as state chairman of the party.

Without doubt from the race was dropped, he said, by increasing duties as assistant director of the western division of the Democratic national campaign organization.

—E. M. Holden, Idaho Falls, was being considered as a successor for Dillingham but he will meet opposition in the person of Robert Coulter, Casco, who has been opposing the Dillingham's efforts to put the Idaho Democracy in the van of the Smith-for-president boom last spring.

George Doner, Weiser, is slated for temporary chairman of the convention and his name will be made permanent chairman.

THREE PERSONS DIE IN EASTERN FLOOD

Cloudburst Swells Rivers and Causes Thousands of Dollars Loss in Valley in Catskills

ELLENVILLE, N. Y., Aug. 27 (AP)—A narrow valley in the Catskills, about 25 miles long and less than a mile wide at its widest point, laid today shook itself loose from the grip of cloudburst and flooded stream and took account of its loss of life and property.

Through this little valley, running northeast to Kingston on the Hudson river, the Rondout creek winds through a narrow gorge under normal conditions.

Of a score of villages caught, the waters wrecked their fury for the most part on Montella, Lackawack, Nanticoke, and Haverhill.

Secretary of New York Relief Committee Returns to Shanghai From Stricken Area; Needs \$10,000,000 Fund

(By The Associated Press) SHANGHAI, China, Aug. 27.—The population of 1,500,000 in a district 30 miles wide and 100 miles long, the border of South China and Northeast Shantung, is facing death from starvation, said Earl Baker, secretary of the New York China famine relief committee, on his return today from a visit to the stricken area.

There has been a sharp difference of opinion, both in China and in this country, as to the necessity of relief measures. Mr. Baker said he is convinced that relief must be sent at once.

150,000 Deemed to Die He stated that 150,000 persons were in an advanced stage of malnutrition and apparently doomed to death and that 300,000 were slowly starving.

Relief on a larger scale must be in effect by October 1 if these starving people are to be saved.

Mr. Baker is proceeding to Nanking to bring the attention of the Nationalist government. When he discussed it a month ago with C. T. Wang, Nationalist foreign minister, he said that the American committee proposed to combine road, building and similar work with the charity aspects of relief.

NEW YORK, (Tuesday Morning) Aug. 27 (AP)—A cheering throng that waited until nearly midnight to greet him, Governor Smith delivered his first campaign speech last night on the steps of city hall at Newark, New Jersey.

Forgetting all about his resolution not to face his wife with open air addresses, the Democratic presidential nominee spoke for several minutes and then returned to his automobile trip back to New York from the New Jersey coast, arriving here well after midnight.
