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REPUBLICANS AGREE ON \$2,000,000 FUND FOR 1928 CAMPAIGN

Herbert Hoover Will Deliver Three Speeches Before Going Back to California in October; Holds Conference

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Aug. 29—While Herbert Hoover discussed his own speaking program today with some Republican leaders, directors of the campaign headquarters for the announced purpose of trimming the national campaign budget down to \$3,000,000.

The nominee progressed far enough in his work to definitely state that he will deliver at least three or four speeches before starting back to California late in October. However, his program will be sufficiently flexible to permit the addition of other addresses if they become necessary to meet the exigencies of the campaign.

Details Not Worked Out Many of the details of his activities still are to be worked out, but in his conferences today with Representative Walter Newton, Minnesota, and Representative John Q. Tilson, Connecticut, director of the Eastern speakers' bureau, he laid down the general course of action he will take.

Department Heads Meet The budget conference brought the heads of all the various departments of the Republican national committee into consultation with J. R. Mott, Cleveland, national chairman, and William Millbank, Eastern treasurer, and Dr. Hubert Clegg, chairman of the committee.

Dr. Work issued a statement of the budget conference which was attributed to John J. Rankin, chairman of the Democratic national committee, charging that the Republican budget was between \$6,000,000 and \$8,000,000.

Johnson Popular in Golden Bear State Republican Senator Piles Up Overwhelming Majority in California Primary Election

San Francisco, Aug. 29 (AP)—Senator Hiram W. Johnson, Republican, continued today to pile up an overwhelming majority as returns from yesterday's primary election came in.

In the eighth congressional district where Representative Arthur M. Free, San Jose, and Mrs. Cecelia C. Casary, San Mateo, ran on both the Republican and Democratic tickets, there were prospects that Free, as a Republican, would oppose Mrs. Casary, Democrat in the November election.

Moore, who ran alone for the Democratic nomination, was given 30,262 votes from the same precincts. Wiley J. Phillips, Republican, received 1468 votes of the prohibition party as candidate for the senatorial nomination.

CHAPLIN'S MOTHER TO HAVE SIMPLE FUNERAL

HOLLYWOOD, Aug. 29 (AP)—Mrs. Hannah Chaplin in death will rest in peace in the Hollywood cemetery. Simple almost to the point of inconspicuity will be the funeral services tomorrow morning that precede interment of the mother of Charles Spencer and Syd Chaplin. Death overtook the former English actress, whose mental illness began with a German air attack in London during the Great war, in a Glendale sanitarium yesterday.

COSTA RICA WANTS INTERPRETATION OF MONROE DOCTRINE

Council of League of Nations to Open Autumn Session in Geneva Without Including Request in Agenda of Body

(By The Associated Press) GENEVA, Aug. 29—The troublesome request by Costa Rica for an interpretation of the Monroe Doctrine by the council of the League of Nations, will not be included in the agenda of that body when it starts its autumn session tomorrow. Instead, the subject will be considered privately.

This was decided by council leaders today. It is likely that reply of a sort will be sent the Central American government but this reply probably will be confined to a statement as to how the doctrine came to be mentioned in the context of the League.

Democratic Vice-Presidential Nominee Works on Campaign Plan Before Ceremony

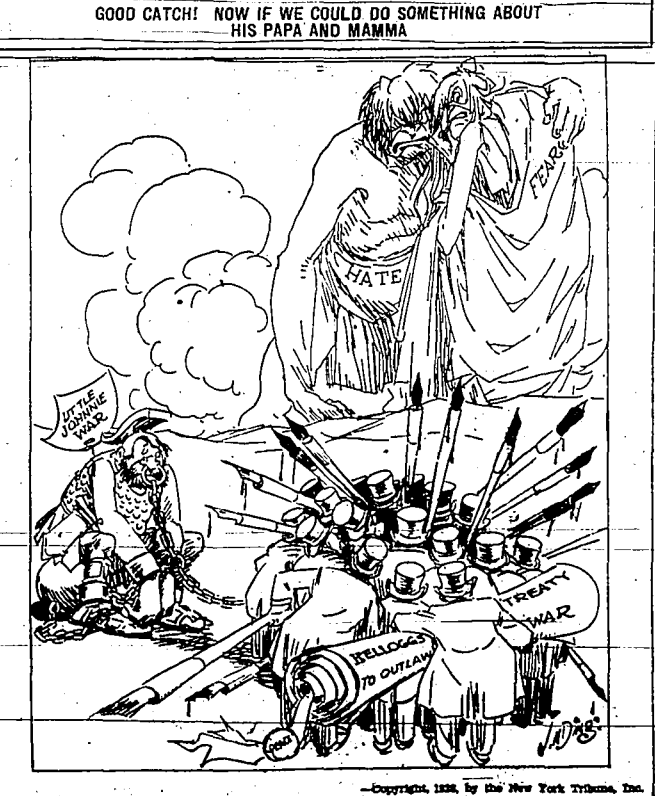

GREENS COMMITTEE SLASHES HANDICAPS

Golfers in Elimination Tournament to Play With Narrower Margin for Oldry and Balls

able this may be offset or more than offset by decreased production in the season beginning July 1, 1929. Looking further ahead, the department said American farmers must face the prospect of continued keen competition from Canada, Australia and Argentina where expansion in acreage seems likely to continue for some time.

Based on intentions to plant 46,523,000 acres of winter wheat, the department estimated next year's crop at 610,000,000 bushels, with average abandonment and average yields. This was termed sufficient for an exportable surplus of all types.

While these intentions show a reduction from last year's sowings the report said "there is still apparent a general tendency to maintain a large acreage of wheat in the great wheat states, where yield is relatively high but return is comparatively low. In these states present indications are 2,800,000.
