RADIO BROADCASTING ASSIGNMENTS WILL BE REDUCED TO 310

Federal Commission Makes Public New Plan Dividing Nation's Full Time Facilities Equally Among Five Zones

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31 (AP)—The federal radio commission today announced a new plan for dividing the nation's radio facilities equally among the five zones, and reducing the total number of full time broadcasting stations from 618 to 310 on October 1.

Commissioner Boyles signed the order as a condition when Chairman Robinson, who believes the new allocation to drangle a move to be undertaken summarily, refused to do so.

The commission determined that maintenance of a 10-kilocycle separation between frequencies is necessary to provide good reception.

The 62 assignments in each zone are divided into three classes: 20 for stations of 5000 watts and above; 26 for 500 and 1000-watt stations and 30 for 100-watt stations.

SUPERIOR, Wis., Aug. 31 (AP)—Continuing his survey of political conditions in the middle West, President Coolidge was assured today by Walter Brown, assistant secretary of commerce, that Ohio and Indiana would elect a republican in the November elections.

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JUNIOR HUGO STINNES IN PRISON IN BERLIN

Son of Late German Post-War Industrial Baron Claims In- nocence of Illegal Practice

BERLIN, Aug. 31 (AP)—Hugo Stinnes, jr., son of the late German post-war industrial baron, claims an examining court today with complete acquiescence and denied knowledge that money he had given his secretary, von Waldow, had been used for illegal purposes.

Following his confrontation yesterday with von Waldow, Stinnes suffered a fit of depression which led to a restless night in prison, and to the administration of tonics today to put him at ease.

Today he gave an explanation of his implication in the von Waldow case, saying that he trusted his secretary's suggestion a French group which possessed a large amount of the German money.

Stinnes had advanced the group's story and he learned he said that the group consisted of three foreigners who had founded their company in Paris for the sole purpose of buying German government securities.

Claims Innocence

Stinnes professed to have no knowledge of illegal manipulations, and said he had been duped by the players and consequently had committed no offense.

In the meantime von Waldow has been released without bail, only obliging himself to report at regular intervals to the examining judge. In securing his release his attorney's chief argument was that Stinnes was as innocent as possible and involved him in the affair only when the court learned from other sources of his financial position. As yet there has been no attempt by Stinnes' lawyers to secure his release, but it is known that they are continuing to maintain his freedom and that the evidence against him does not warrant his detention.

During his interrogation today Stinnes is reported as still questioning to have made the sensational allegations recently had been made by him and told that Herr Hoffmann, the commissioner who has charge of all dealings in the original case, had probably been duped by Stinnes against him, provided he agreed to pay a Paris banker named Callinus 50,000 marks.

Stinnes informed von Waldow, whom Callinus's proposal was made, that he regarded the offer as pure blackmail and rejected it.

Herr Hoffmann was called to the court and questioned by the judge, but is said to have denied all knowledge of such a transaction. Hoffmann, however, confirmed Stinnes' story, and said that Callinus had made the offer to him.

HEARST PREDICTING FAILURE OF SMITH

Newspaper Publisher Foresees New Yorker's Defeat Because of Tammany and Wet Views

NEW YORK, Aug. 31 (AP)—William Randolph Hearst, newspaper publisher, today predicted the defeat of Governor Smith on the prohibition issue, and because of the connection with Tammany hall.

"I do not think the Democrats will win this election," he said, "because of the anti-prohibition issue which Mr. Smith injected into the campaign after he had received the nomination of the Republican party."

"Of course, one traveling in Paris or sojourning in London might get the impression that Hearst is running straight. But when Mr. Hearst returns to America, where Americans think along straight lines, they will find his conclusions are wrong."

REPUBLICANS SATISFIED

"We welcome Mr. Hearst's support," said Senator George H. Moses, New Hampshire, chief whip-elect.

Asked if his party's leaders would welcome Mr. Hearst into the fold, Mr. Huggins, Republican national committee chairman, said: "We are always glad to welcome Mr. Hearst to the fold."

Santa Fe Again in Hands of Spanish; Re-enact Conquest

SANTA FE, N. M., Aug. 31 (AP)—An old Spanish with wrinkled brow plucked his guitar and in a rather high-pitched voice sang the ballads of his forefathers on Santa Fe plaza today.

Crowds of Spanish-speaking people looked about him with white faces, and some of the children sat here and there lent an unbecoming ear. Santa Fe was again in the hands of the Spanish.

Diego De Vargas, the governor and captain general represented in a citizen of the present year, had been the first to capture Santa Fe sixteen years ago—the conquest of Santa Fe.

While Indians and Spanish youngsters set the pace for their English friends in scurrying about the horse's hoofs in and out of the procession, the Fiesta De Vargas and his company descended upon the city and in a pageant which followed closely De Vargas' own account of the occupation, took possession of the city before the opening of the fiesta was almost as negligible as in the day of De Vargas himself. Because of the narrowness of Santa Fe streets, pedestrians were given no possession and automobiles were prohibited within several blocks of the plaza. The fiesta was established 216 years ago by the Marquis De Valera.

FASCISM'S ARCH-FOE FAILS TO EVADE JAIL

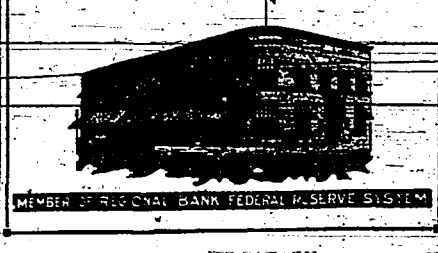

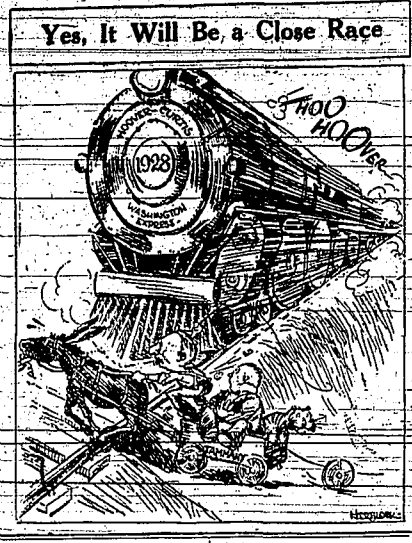

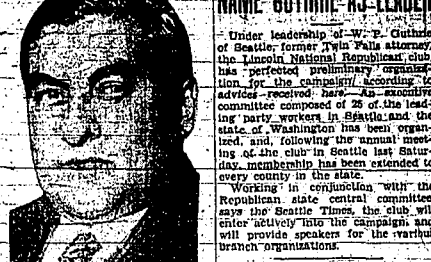
Decision to bring the famous exponent of the "four square gospel" creed before the inquisitorial body followed closely upon the visit of a group of alleged "victims" of her realty activities to the prosecutor's office.

Attorney Benjamin Lewis, leading the party, demanded a criminal complaint against the evangelist. All of his clients described themselves as members of the Angelus temple congregation.

After a brief conference at which they were alleged that Mrs. McPherson sold them property near the northern California resort, through intermediaries, Deputy District Attorney Hugh McFosses announced that the matter would be turned over to the grand jury.

Yesterday two suits asking damages from the evangelist totaling more than \$20,000 were filed by two members of her congregation. Simultaneously came an announcement from McFosses that he had the evangelist's realty operations under inquiry for more than two weeks.

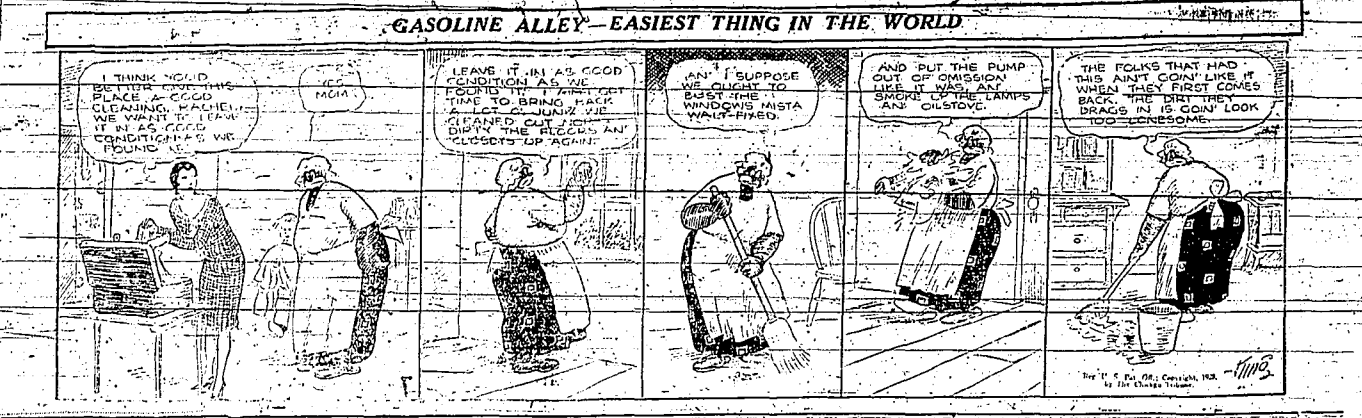
